

Total Of \$40,000 Asked Of Construction Firm

Three suits for a total of \$40,000 general damages have been filed in Douglas County Circuit Court against McNutt Brothers, a Eugene construction firm.

The suits are by Edna M. West and her minor daughters, Carol Ann Nichols and Peggy Nichols. Partners in the firm named in the suit are Earl L. McNutt, J. Ira McNutt, Ronald E. McNutt and Theo H. Schaefer.

It is alleged the mother and daughters received serious injuries in a car accident Oct. 29, 1952, on Highway 99 about three miles north of Oakland.

The plaintiffs claim the defendant company was at fault, when the car went over a bank, because a construction detour was not properly marked. Mrs. West seeks \$5,000 from each defendant. Carol Ann Nichols seeks \$1,500 from each, and Peggy Nichols seeks \$3,500 from each.
