

Democrat, GOP Speakers Urge Respective Candidates' Election In State Talks

Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.), speaking at Eugene Friday night, urged the election of Richard L. Neuberger to the U. S. Senate from Oregon.

The Republican candidate for re-election, Sen. Guy Cordon, received the support of Fred G. Aandahl, assistant secretary of the Interior Department, in a speech at Baker.

Aandahl criticized the Eisenhower administration's flexible farm price support program and its "partnership" policies on hydro-electric power. He said that Republicans had continued the foreign policies of the Democratic administration. The promises to liberate the satellite countries of Eastern Europe have faded from the picture, he added.

Aandahl, praising Cordon's past performance in Washington, said the senator "works quietly, efficiently and with rare tact." He said the Eisenhower administration's plan for government is "no work hand in hand with the individual, aiding him by doing for him what the individual cannot do himself."

Meanwhile the two senatorial candidates continued critical of each other's policies. Cordon, speaking at Canby said Neuberger's electric power policies would be a "guarantee of bankruptcy" for Oregon. "Under his philosophy of preference, only 15 out of 100 electric power users in Oregon would have any hope of getting federal power. Eighty-five out of every 100 users in the state are served by private distribution systems," Cordon declared.

He said he did not think Congress would appropriate much additional money for Pacific Northwest power development. "We can't short-change a national defense. We can't continue to raise taxes and we can't increase the debt thereby writing IOUs on the bank accounts of our children," he said.

Neuberger, speaking at an Oregon Education Assn. meeting in Portland, said Cordon had voted against the so-called Hill "oil-for-education" amendment which was

endorsed by every major educational group in America. He said Cordon also had opposed a measure which would have given school teachers tax exemptions for the money spent in adding to their educations.

Nixon Puts Communism Into Political Issue

Stephen A. Mitchell yesterday accused the GOP of "a desperate last-minute smear, built designed to state off the defeat they feel in their hearts is facing them." His statement held Nixon and GOP Chairman Leonard Hall responsible.

Averell Harriman, Democratic candidate for governor of New York, was the target last night for a campaign blast from retiring Gov. Thomas E. Dewey. Dewey, in a radio-TV talk, accused Harriman of helping engineer in 1925 a securities deal in Poland "out of which Harriman and his associates made millions of dollars and the investors lost millions."

Harriman called Dewey's charge "more distortion and smear." John P. McGrath, Democratic state campaign manager, said payments to investors were halted by World War II because the properties involved were in German hands.

A new Republican charge also was made in the Rhode Island campaign for governor. Dean J. Lewis, the GOP candidate, said in a television speech that the Democratic attorney general, William E. Powers, had "desperately covered up" for the former chairman of a now insolvent insurance firm.

Democratic Gov. Dennis Roberts, who is seeking reelection, called this a deliberate falsehood. Powers termed it an "unscrupulous political smear."

In Pennsylvania, Eisenhower followed up the luncheon host at his Gettysburg farm to the state's Republican congressional candidates.

On Monday night, the White House announced, Eisenhower will make a nationally televised "non-partisan" speech on economic conditions.

Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay last night charged in St. Louis that "the Democrats have never yet solved the unemployment problem without war." McKay, addressing a GOP rally, said the Eisenhower administration has gone from a war to a peacetime economy with less unemployment than any Democratic regime can claim.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas, Senate Democratic leader, told an Albuquerque audience that if Democrats control the next Congress, his first program point would be a pledge of cooperation to Eisenhower on foreign policy.

Home Safety Director Visits At Health Office

Miss Janice Westaby of Portland, director of home safety, Oregon State Board of Health, was in the County Health Office Friday to confer with local officials.

Another meeting has been tentatively set for Nov. 18 in Roseburg, at which time various county people will gather to organize a home safety group.

Miss Westaby is director of a state program in home safety, backed with funds from the Kellogg Co., Battle Creek, Mich. Oregon ranks sixth in the nation for high incidence of home accidents. Douglas is one of two Oregon counties chosen to spearhead the program.

The Better Vision Institute estimates that 85 per cent of Americans over 60 years old have visual troubles.

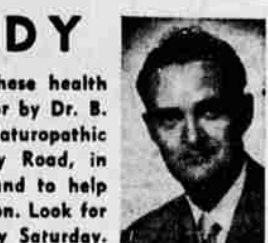

meeting" and attempted to liquidate the assets of the corporation by trying to assign the assets over to the Douglas County Fair Board.

Another period of negotiation followed, Baird said. Attorneys from both sides and the sheriff and member of the other side listed in the complaint "met to discuss the problem."

The letter produced in the News-Review Friday was then presented and "verbally answered at that time," Baird said.

A few days later, the sheriff and sheriff's posse issued a compromise agreement to those involved "offering them the opportunity to come back into the posse," Baird related. He said the agreement called for return "under conditions then prevailing in the posse and under officers holding offices at that time."

Baird said, an answer was never received to that offer. After more conferences between attorneys, it was finally decided that "all resources were exhausted for settling the dispute," Baird said.

The sheriff said he had "no alternative" then but file the suit to determine if the sheriff "was in command of his posse." He said it was a necessity "to get harmony in the posse."

Concluding, Baird said the complaint is not meant to be "personal," but merely to find out the sheriff's authority in future action and operation of the posse.

The sheriff's posse was formed during wartime as an emergency organization, Baird said. "From time to time it is used for emergencies. As such, it is necessary that sheriff have men in the posse who will work fully with him and cooperate," Baird concluded.

Allies Take W. Germany Into Fold For Defense

apprehensive Frenchmen—at the London conference late in September at which the basic outlines of Saturday's agreements were drawn.

European foreign ministers followed up the sovereignty agreement with the signing of amendments to the 1948 Brussels alliance which establish a "western European union" linking Britain, France, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, West Germany and Italy.

Their action, adding two former enemy states to the original five-power treaty, replaced the ill-fated European army plan (EDC) as a framework for West German rearmament, less than two months after the death of EDC in the French National Assembly in Saturday's treaty and with their new sovereignty, the Germans received the right to rearm.

The West Germans simultaneously renounced war as an instrument of national policy, particularly in connection with claims to lost areas in the East, and stepped willingly into an inter-allied system setting strict controls on the production of arms and the movement of troops in Germany for the rest of this century.

Another agreement fixed a ceiling of 12 divisions on the new German army and placed it tightly under the orders of the supreme Allied commander, Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther. The Germans also pledged themselves not to use force to achieve the deeply desired reunification of their country.
