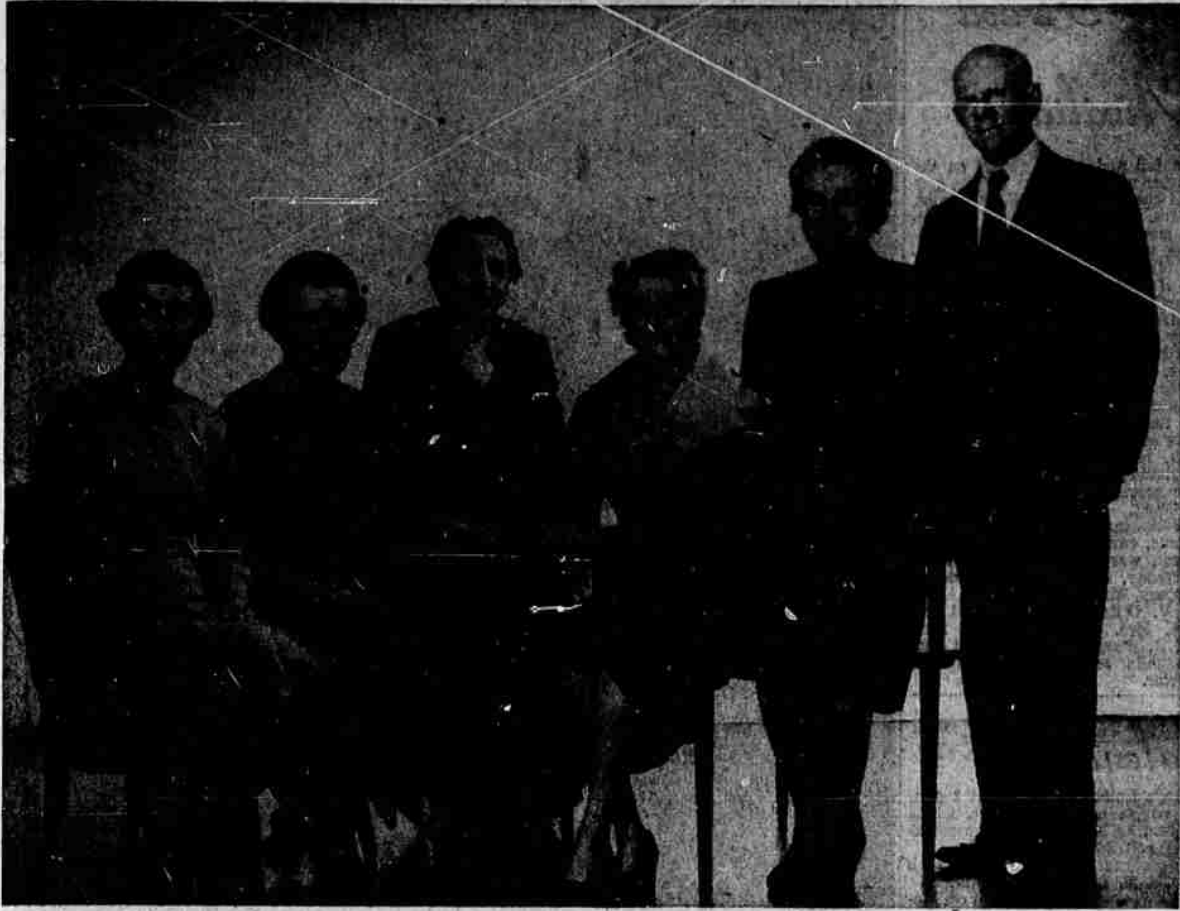

Three well-known Irish folk tunes have been included in the music which is being used as part of the production of "The Giant of Knockmany" being presented to Roseburg youngsters Friday, Nov. 5, at 7:45 p.m. in the Central Junior High School. The American Association of University Women is sponsoring the Irish play.

These tunes with excerpts from other music being used to set the mood of the play are currently being played for students in the Roseburg elementary schools by Mrs. Hallie Woodward, music supervisor, and in Central Junior High School by Miss Georgene Shanklin. The story of the old

Irish legend is also being told to the youngsters in connection with the music. The overture to the production is an orchestration of "The Rake of Mallow," a pert tune which evokes the high spirits of the young people of Mallow and their exuberant dancing and singing. "The Irish Washerwoman" is used in the play as the accompaniment to the Irish jig performed by Granuaile, sister-in-law of the hero of the play, Finn McCool. On the final curtain, the play ends with "The Girl I Left Behind Me," a haunting song which came from England but acquired a distinctly Irish accent after it

became acclimated to the Emerald Isle. Mr. Meebly, the leprechaun in the production, has a bit of "theme" music which is played every time he appears. For this purpose music from Mendelssohn's score to Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" has been selected. Other music used in the children's play is the opening string of Ibert's "Escapes," Richard Strauss' "Salome" and Respighi's "The Fountain of Rome." Tickets for the play will be sold to the school youngsters during the noon hour Thursday, Nov. 4, or may be obtained at the door the evening of the performance.
