Missing Woman Found With Minor Injuries

The report of woman who had been injured in a fall on Stephens Street had both city police and Mohr Ambulance in a dither early Monday morning.

City police were called to the Shalimar at 4:15 a.m. to find Mrs. Roger Bartlett of 340 Eastwood Ave. beside herself. She insisted that a woman "had died or was dying," the police report.

A major problem, however, was finding the woman. Mrs. Bartlett didn't know where the woman was, police said. Both hospitals had no reports, and Mohr Ambulance was waiting on Stephens for the injured woman.

Mr. Bartlett was finally found coming back to the Shalimar to pick up his wife, the report said. He told police that Rita L. Rose, 1131 Giles St., Roseburg, was resting at his house after she had fallen and hurt herself on the pavement on Stephens.

Both police and ambulance rushed to the Bartlett house, according to the report. They found the injured woman, and she was taken to Douglas Community. The extent of her injuries was a bad cut and a bump on the back of her head.

Still missing is the woman's purse.

Encyclical Issued By Pope Pius To Catholic Bishops

VATICAN CITY (U. S. P.)—Pope Pius XII has issued an encyclical to the Roman Catholic bishops proclaiming the feastday of the Virgin Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth.

The encyclical sets May 31 as the day for annual observance of the feast—a day, it says, when humanity should be consecrated to "the immaculate heart of the blessed Virgin Mary."

The encyclical, made public Saturday is dated Oct. 11, 1954. It formally proclaiming the feast of Mary's regality, the Pontiff put in encyclical form a tenet that Roman Catholics generally have held for centuries.

The Pontiff will further give it formalization on Nov. 1, when in a ceremony in St. Peter's Basilica he will place a golden diadem on an image of the Virgin Mary.

The ceremony will be the highlight of the Marian year services, marking the centenary of the dogma that proclaimed Mary's immaculate conception. This is the Catholic belief that she alone of all mankind was born without original sin, whose stain marks all other men because of the sin of disobedience of Adam and Eve in the garden of paradise.

PITTSFIELD, Maine (U. S. P.)—Thirteen sisters gained a brother Sunday and lost their claim on being the nation's largest all-girl family.

Leslie Benjamin Brooks, 6 pounds, 8 ounces, crossed up some of the plans when he was born to Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Brooks at their Snake Root Rd. farmhouse.

But he got a warm welcome nonetheless from the 38-year-old couple and the 13 Brooks daughters, aged 1 1/2 to 16.

"Now that I have a boy I hope it will be the end," said Brooks, a \$30-a-week truck driver.

Sen. Cordon Supported By Public Power Group

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Northern Wasco PUD; Louis Courtemanche, a commissioner of the City of McMinnville Water and Light Dept.; J. D. He said that John C. Higgins, Ralph Cate, former Oregon Republican national committeeman for Oregon; and Gov. Thomas Dewey of New York, are members of the "Republican 'power crowd' who were responsible for Douglas McKay's appointment as secretary of the Interior."

New System Of Reserve Officers Training Fixed

WASHINGTON (U. S. P.)—The Army announced Monday the establishment of a schools division of the Reserve Officers Training Corps with membership limited to 8 Junior colleges and 34 military institutes.

The new system will go into effect in the 1955-56 school year. By then, the Army, working with the schools, expects to have a military program specifically designed to fit the needs of military preparatory schools and junior colleges.

Monday's announcement marked a partial reversal of an Army decision last year which would have limited military training leading to a commission to men in four-year, senior colleges. The revised program, inspired in part by strong criticism of that decision from military academies, entitles a man to a reserve commission if he completes six years' training in preparatory school and junior college, then goes on to get a college degree.

Another requirement for a commission under the new system is that the man attend summer camp between his junior and senior college terms.

In order to retain eligibility for membership in the military schools division, each institution must maintain a minimum enrollment of 100 students.

American officials regard the new agreement not only as vital to the defense of Western Europe but also as providing a basis of strength from which the Allies may enter into new negotiations with the Soviet Union on great European issues like conclusion of an Austrian treaty and the unification of East and West Germany.

Soviet Tries For Wreck

A Soviet call for a foreign ministers conference next month was issued in a note Saturday to the United States, Britain and France. Moscow's maneuver was designed to stall or wreck those plans which still must be acted on by the French Assembly. The German Parliament and other legislative bodies, including the U.S. Senate. But it was regarded as posing no threat since Russia made no new offers of substance toward settlement of great European issues.

The various agreements reached Saturday would end the Allied occupation and rearm West Germany under safeguards within a seven-year Western European Union and NATO. Twelve German divisions would take their place in the Allied defense line.

The United States, Britain and France were reported standing by two conditions for any such conference as outlined in notes to Moscow last month.

1. Russia must agree in advance to holding free, supervised, German-wide elections for an all-German government.

2. Russia must act in advance to conclude a treaty of independence for occupied Austria.

VIENNA (U. S. P.)—The Polish newspaper Zycie Warszawy said Monday 10 Polish children were killed when one of them stepped on an unexploded World War II bomb near Warsaw.

TEHRAN, Iran (U. S. P.)—An Army court sentenced five Army and Air Force officers to death Monday on charges of participating in a Soviet spy network.

The sentences brought to 21 the number of condemned officers who will face firing squads soon unless an appeal court or the Shah intervenes.

MOSCOW (U. S. P.)—U. S. Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine) spent a musical Sunday in Moscow. She attended a recital by the Red Army chorus in the afternoon and went to a ballet performance at the ballet theater Sunday night.

The senator said she had received no reply as yet on her request for an interview with Premier Georgi Malenkov. She said she plans to leave the Soviet Union Thursday.
