Penalty For Rape Upset On Appeal

DENVER — The Colorado Supreme Court reversed Monday the conviction of John Herbert Bane of Salem, Ore., who is serving a four to seven year sentence in the state penitentiary for rape.

There was no dissent from the opinion by Justice Francis J. Knaus. Bane was convicted in Arapahoe County, Denver suburb, of raping Dorothy H. Gall, who died Sept. 20, 1953, at a hospital from an allergic reaction to novocaine administered to her while she was under treatment following the alleged attack.

Justice Knaus held that information given by the woman to a physician and a deputy sheriff had to be classed as "hearsay" evidence. Eliminating that, he said, it cannot be said there is evidence on which a verdict of guilty could be predicated. Bane was arrested at Kansas City and returned to Denver voluntarily.

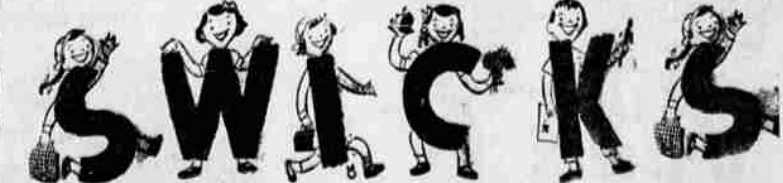
