'Core' Introduced As Junior High System Course

A system of education which has been under experimentation and revision for 15 years has this year become a part of the Roseburg school system for the seventh and eighth grades.

Termed "Core" by educators, the method of teaching Junior when he reaches his early teens is designed to "fit the education to Junior rather than Junior to the education," Clifford Norris, Roseburg's Central Junior High School principal states.

Today's student has two hours of Core, which includes studies in social living, English grammar, history and geography. Three hours of study are given to mathematics, science and physical education. All other subjects are called "elective" subjects and are intended for those students who have an inclination for art, music, or drama. Manual arts are also included in these.

"The Core program allows freedom not only for the student," Norris said, "but also permits the teacher to use his or her individuality to teach and to carry out a training program. I believe the modern teacher should compare with the old family doctor, in that he is a general practitioner, rather than a specialist. Children of this age group have minds like sponges, and they absorb more than we realize."

An integral part of the Core program is the audio-visual methods of teaching. Becoming a familiar sight in classrooms are the film strips, the opaque projectors and the tape recorders. The tape recorders are used in many instances to record the voice of speakers from the area who can bring the students closer to a project on which they are working. Norris cited the example of the study of oil which several classes have recently been making. Since it was impractical to assemble all classes together, a representative of the current oil-drilling project now going on in the Melrose area, spoke to one group. His remarks were tape recorded and played back to other groups who were not able to be present.

In order to further acquaint parents with the Core program, the Central Junior High School Parent-Teacher Assn. group used classroom work examples at a

Mediator Will Closely Watch Oak Ridge Affair

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. (AP)—A federal mediator says he will remain in close contact with union and management officials this week after Sunday's meeting failed to crack the long labor dispute at two atomic energy plants.

E. F. Hitchcock, federal labor mediator of Knoxville, added that he had arranged no further joint sessions.

By rejecting a 6-cent hourly wage increase offer, CIO atomic workers here and at Paducah, Ky., are free to call a strike when an injunction expires Saturday, Oct. 30.

The 4,500 CIO United Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers' Union members at the two plants are seeking a 15-cent hourly boost, but Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Co.
