## How S. P. trains learned to talk

In the old days, communications at Southern Pacific were handled by telegraph, telephone, and the wonderful old wicker loop that handed instructions to engineers as the train rushed by.

Now, many of S.P.'s communications have gone electronic in a big way.

On some trains, the engineer in his modern Diesel cab merely picks up his radio-telephone when he wants to talk to his own caboose. Train crews are now able to report immediately to the dispatcher, through wayside stations, unusual incidents or conditions affecting the prompt or safe movement of trains, such as forest fires, heavy snow or fallen trees.

Last year we made our greatest strides in radio modernization. We now have 812 two-way radios, 155 walkie-talkies, and 25 auto-to-train sets.

This radio modernization program is merely indicative of the huge, over-all equipment-and-facility revolution that's been going on here at Southern Pacific since the war—all aimed at giving you and the communities we serve faster and finer freight and passenger service than ever before.
