Brown, who left their house last Friday and went to San Francisco, could not be reached for comment. The couple eloped to Las Vegas, Nev., on Oct. 31, 1951. Brown has since freely discussed the often stormy match.

He recalled that one violent spat ended when he pushed his wife into the swimming pool. She was in a wheelchair at the time, suffering from a leg ailment. Guests and servants fished her out.

The marriage was the first for the then 45-year-old actress. It was Brown's third. An automobile accident killed his first wife, the former Virginia Powell, in 1942. In 1947 he was divorced by Grace Tibbett, former wife of singer Lawrence Tibbett.

Gen. Gruenther States NATO Much Stronger

BERCHTESGADEN, Germany (AP) — Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther said Tuesday NATO is three or four times stronger than it was four years ago "and the increase in efficiency is greater still."

"While we still do not have the strength to resist successfully an all-out Russian aggression," said the supreme commander of the Allied powers in Europe, "we do have an alliance which has accepted the principles of collective security and shapes a strong shield against any aggression."

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP) — When 8-year-old Joseph del Fuentel went to play in the cave the neighborhood boys had dug, he took his 4-year-old sister along yesterday as a special favor. She wanted to see it.

Palmer Hoyt Award Winner

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Palmer Hoyt, editor and publisher of the Denver Post, will be awarded the first annual "John Peter Zenger Freedom of the Press Award," the University of Arizona announced Wednesday.

Dr. Richard A. Harvill, president of the university, said Hoyt's selection is in recognition of "professional work which has made an outstanding contribution to the preservation of the freedom of the press and the people's right to know."

The award will be presented at a meeting of the Arizona Press Club in Tucson Nov. 21.

Hoyt has been editor and publisher of the Post since 1946, when he left the post as publisher of the Portland Oregonian he had held since 1939. A native of Roseville, Ill., he moved to Oregon in 1912.

He saw 18 months service with the infantry in France in World War I and during World War II he served as domestic director of the Office of War Information.

10 Firms Are Charged With Combining Efforts

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Attorneys for two of 10 paper firms charged with combining to lessen competition planned to go before British Columbia Supreme Court Justice A. M. Manson Tuesday to argue a motion to quash the indictment.

Eight others pleaded guilty to the charge Monday.

Bartram Paper Products Ltd. and Crown Zellerbach (Canada) Ltd. declined to plead, however, and their attorneys said they would move to quash.

Firms pleading guilty were Columbia Paper Co., Ltd.; Norfolk Paper Co., Ltd.; J. C. Wilson, Ltd.; Kelly, Douglas Ltd.; W. H. Malkin Co., Ltd., and Westminster Paper Co.

The ten firms are charged with conspiring to lessen competition between November 1934 and December 1951.

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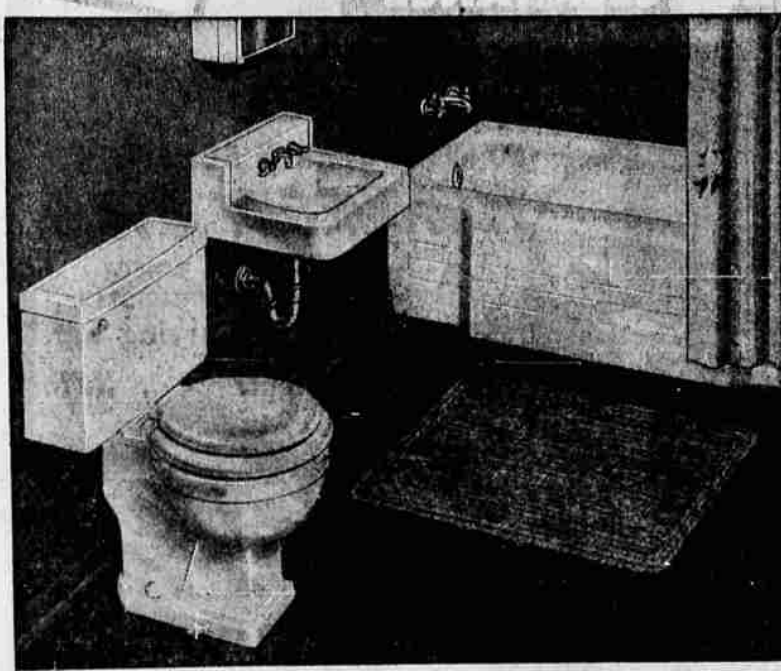
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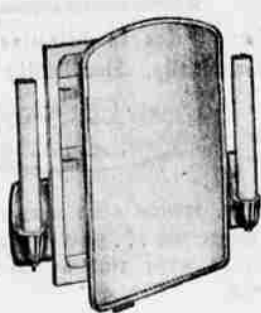
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
