LONDON (AP) — Anthony Nutting, minister of state for foreign affairs, will replace Selwyn Lloyd as head of the British delegation to the United Nations, the foreign office has announced.

Patent Medicine Remedies Scored By Sec. Benson

HARRISONVILLE, Mo. (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson rejected Thursday what he called "patent medicine" remedies for a depressed poultry industry which

he said is fully capable of curing its own ills. The Eisenhower administration's farm chief declared that proposals by some poultry growers for gov-

ernment price support programs for eggs and chickens would prolong rather than cure the present depressed poultry market.

In a speech prepared for a Cass County poultry day meeting, Benson said low poultry prices reflect overproduction and added that the only way to bring prices back to fairer levels is to cut back on production. He said a poultry industry advisory committee appointed by him opposed government price support operations.

Benson said that during and after World War II the department engaged in price support operations for eggs, but they "simply did not attain the objective" despite a government outlay and loss of 180 million dollars.

"Difficult though these days are for the poultry industry, I am convinced, as are your spokesmen, that the only solution lies in better balanced production, improved marketing, more intensive promotion and continued application of the great advances brought about through research and education," Benson said.

Crippled Youth And His Bicycle Finally Separated

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A 17-year-old crippled boy and the bicycle he loved are separated. Omer Cundiff Jr., ill two years with rheumatic heart disease, died Wednesday in the hospital where he has spent his last 21 days. He also had a calcium deficiency which forced him to walk on crutches.

Nevertheless, the bike was Omer's chief means of transportation. His former schoolmates would pedal while he sat on a special seat fastened to the handlebars.

One day last July, while Omer and a friend were sipping sodas at a corner drugstore, someone stole the bike. The day after the theft was publicized, Omer received a note from John E. Knadler, co-owner of an appliance store.

But Omer didn't get to ride the new bicycle much. His condition became worse soon after it arrived. "It really did make him happy, though," said his mother. "I don't know what to do with it now."

Nor does she know what to do with the money Omer was saving "to buy something special. He hadn't decided what it would be." Once a month, an envelope containing \$1 had arrived by mail for the youngster. There was no signature or return address.

All Bodies In Hotel Fire Are Recovered

COLORADO CITY, Tex. (AP) — All bodies believed in the fire blackened debris of the old Colorado Hotel had been recovered Thursday.

Lightning from a midnight thunderstorm Wednesday morning set fire to the old West Texas landmark. Thirteen guests in the 54 room, 70 year old hotel escaped.

Fire Chief Leonard Henderson said the bodies recovered were those of:

A. R. Trice, 76, retired farmer. Lonnie Mize, 34, a water well drilling company employee. Albert Cates, about 52, a cafe cook.

H. E. Ladd, 76, operator of a secondhand furniture store.

Former Mayor O'Dwyer Returns To New York

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Mayor William O'Dwyer returned to New York Wednesday night after an absence of three years and seven months.

He expressed no interest in politics and denied that "subpoenas" connected with a 1951 Senate probe had anything to do with his visit. He said he was here for "business and pleasure."

O'Dwyer, smiling and looking fit, arrived by plane from California where he testified before a Congressional committee probing Communist activities in Mexico, where he served as U. S. ambassador.



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Huge Blast Kills Four, Injures 24 At Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Three ranking fire department officers were killed and 24 other firemen and policemen injured Thursday in an explosion confined entirely to the rear yard of a north Philadelphia chemical manufacturing plant.

The violent blast, without any fire, occurred minutes after a telephone warning summoned the fire company to investigate the source of escaping fumes, thought

to be ammonia. A 15-foot-high steel tank mounted on a wooden platform in one corner of the yard exploded without warning as firemen searched for the source of the fumes.

Rescuers found the dead and injured lying grotesquely on the ground. The steel tank was torn in pieces. Several windows in nearby buildings were shattered.

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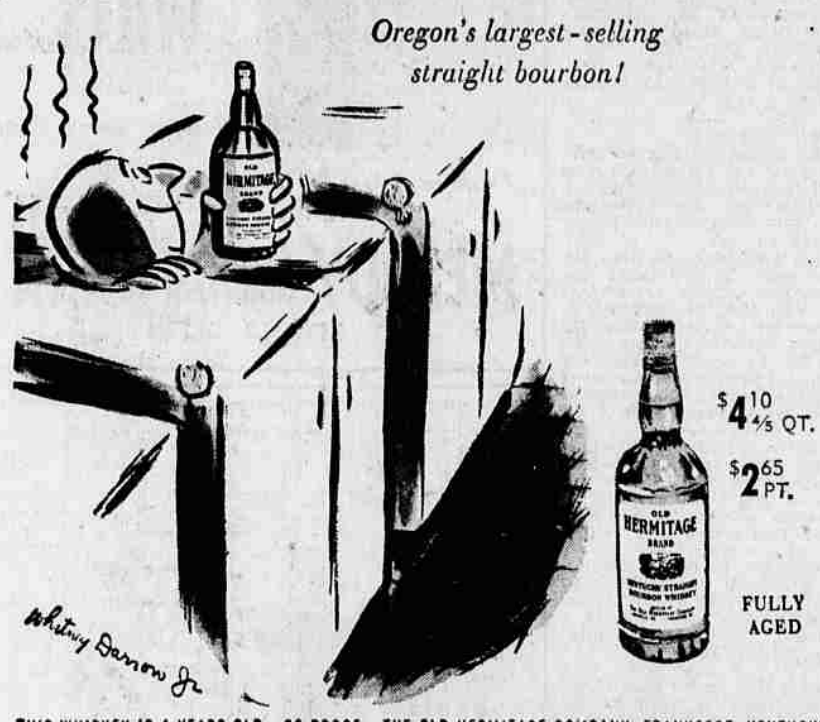
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
