

Slave Descendant Becomes General

WASHINGTON (AP) — It took Benjamin Oliver Davis Sr., a descendant of slaves, 41 years to become a brigadier general. His son, Benjamin Jr., made it Wednesday after 18 years.

"And that's as it should be," said the senior Davis, now retired. "If my boy couldn't do better than I did, I'd feel that I had failed as a father."

When the elder Davis became a brigadier on Oct. 20, 1940, at the age of 68, he was the first Negro to become a U.S. Army general.

Now, 14 years and a week later, his son is the first Negro brigadier general in the Air Force.

"There are no other Negro generals. I am sorry to say," Davis told reporters. "Not are there any admirals of my race. But these things are coming, what with the recent Supreme Court decision on segregation."

SCHOOL CHILDREN In Northwest To Get Salk Vaccine

SEATTLE (AP) — Some 150,000 school children in the three Northwest states and Alaska may receive free immunization against polio with the new Salk vaccine next summer.

Dr. H. A. Press of San Francisco, western medical adviser for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, made the disclosure Thursday at a conference of March of Dimes Workers from Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

He said the actual vaccination would depend, however, upon studies now being made into the vaccine's effectiveness. Contracts for purchase of the vaccine have been signed, conditioned upon its licensing for distribution in 1955.

Dr. Press said every first-grader and all children who participated in the 1954 trials of the vaccine but were not actually inoculated with it would be eligible for free immunization.

Also eligible will be all women who are pregnant for 12 weeks or more in the "polio season" ending next September 30.

"If the Salk vaccine is proved effective against paralytic poliomyelitis the March of Dimes will offer the states enough vaccine to give three shots to each person eligible," said Dr. Press.

He estimated 75,000 children would be eligible in Washington, 45,000 in Oregon, 20,000 in Idaho.

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Portland KPTV Station Involved In Transaction

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Storer Broadcasting Co., one of the nation's major television-radio operators, was given permission Wednesday to acquire television station KPTV in Portland, Ore.

The Federal Communications Commission also authorized the firm to acquire TV station WXEL in Cleveland. Both stations are being purchased from Empire Coll Co. for \$1.5 million dollars.

Two commissioners—Robert T. Bartley and Frieda B. Hennebeck—dissenting, asserting they favored a public hearing on the matter since "the sum total of the transactions is greater concentration of the control of mass communications."

Storer was authorized to sell stations KGBS and KGBS-TV in San Antonio, Tex., to the Express Publishing Co. there for \$3.4 million.

The Storer firm, which has headquarters at Birmingham, Mich., also owns broadcasting outlets at Atlanta, Ga., Miami, Fla., Detroit, Mich., Toledo, Ohio, Wheeling, W. Va., and Birmingham, Ala. It also is applying for authority to buy radio stations WJW and WJW-FM in Cleveland.

In Portland the manager of KPTV, Russell Olsen, said KPTV plans to complete a new 540-foot tower by Nov. 15 and to install a newly developed UHF antenna next February.

Queen Mother Tours New York, Views Show

NEW YORK (AP) — Queen Mother Elizabeth of England spent her first day here much like other visitors to the big town—she toured the Metropolitan Museum of Art and saw a Broadway show in the evening.

The royal tourist also attended a luncheon given in her honor Wednesday by the Candian Club in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, and unveiled at the club a formal portrait of her daughter, Elizabeth, Queen of England.

The gracious, charming Queen Mother said her daughter "will be delighted to know that her portrait will hang here in this great country, Canada's close neighbor and friend."

Until she leaves for Washington on Nov. 4, the Queen Mother will be the house guest of Britain's permanent United Nations delegate, Sir Pierson Dixon, and Lady Dixon at their estate in the Riverdale section of the Bronx.

Demo Leaders Get Free Time

NEW YORK (AP) — Democratic leaders have a promise of free radio and television time from one network but their demands for time to balance recent speeches by President Eisenhower were rejected by two other networks.

The National Broadcasting Co. announced it had offered Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell a half hour of radio and television time this Saturday evening. The TV broadcast would be at 8:30 and the radio time at 10:30, it said.

NBC's announcement came in response to a request from Mitchell for free time to make up for recent speeches by the President. Mitchell said these speeches had "an unusual amount of partisan political content."

Mitchell suggested that the networks cover a speech by Adlai Stevenson, titular leader of the Democratic Party and its last nominee for the presidency, Thursday or Saturday night.

Mitchell's request was turned down by the Columbia Broadcasting System and the American Broadcasting Co.
