Gout is a constitutional disorder arising from an excess of uric acid in the blood, caused by an impaired condition of the kidneys. It usually arises from excessive indulgence in fermented beverages, and inactivity, and is not uncommon among those who partake of undue quantities of nitrogenous foods. Gout is inherited by some individuals, that is, the tendency thereto is inherited, but seldom appears before the age of thirty.

Gout occurs almost entirely in middle-aged males. It is rare in women. Gout is apparently caused by defective kidney excretion of uric acid. At recurring intervals uric acid is retained in the blood, partly free and partly as a sodium salt. When this concentration reaches a certain level, there begins a deposition of sodium monurate crystals in and around the joints and tendons, which constitutes an acute attack of gout. In the blood of gouty individuals, the uric acid content is usually above normal.

Acute attacks of gout frequently occur at night. The first attack of gouty arthritis appears suddenly, lasts a few days or perhaps a week or two, then disappears completely. In the majority of persons the main joint of the big toe is the first to be affected, and in ninety percent of individuals either the big toe, heel, ankle or instep is involved in the first attack. Mining Union Sec-Treasurer Under Arrest

DENVER (AP) — Maurice E. Travis, secretary-treasurer and former president of the 100,000-member International Union of Mine, Mill & Smelter Workers (I.M.S.W.), has been arrested here on charges of lying when he said he was not a Communist Party member.

Travis was free Friday on \$10,000 bond posted immediately on being taken before U. S. Commissioner Joseph Neff late Thursday afternoon.

The arrest, announced by the Justice Department in Washington while U.S. marshals were picking up Travis at union headquarters here, stemmed from a 6-count indictment handed down Thursday by a 23-member federal grand jury in Denver.

The jury met in secret sessions dating from Oct. 18 to hear evidence presented by U.S. Attorney Donald E. Kelley. Witnesses were brought before the grand jury from Montana, Oklahoma, Arizona, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Kelley declined comment when asked if other union officials are under investigation.

The mine-mill union was ousted from the CIO in 1950 for alleged Communist domination.

BLM Mining Claims Hearing Held In Roseburg

Dieckman, Daniel Dimick, accused BLM of trying "to feather the nest of Umpqua Plywood Corp." by bringing the action against the mining claim owners. He inferred the government wants to make Craget a "trespasser on his own land" by dispossessing him.

Most of the land in the area involved is O & C, and a small part is public domain. A few years ago, BLM sold some of the O & C timber on the land to Umpqua Plywood Corp.

An alleged trespass and destruction of property in connection with the sale brought a suit by Craget and Victor Ingman, former husband of Mrs. Kuehn who is now dead. The company made \$1,500 settlement, but another suit has been filed because Craget claims the plywood corporation has not lived up to other terms of the settlement.

Also, the plywood company has a \$25,000 suit pending against Craget, alleging he had no right to refuse the company a chance to use the road, with payment for this use.

But to return to the government action, U. S. solicitors Eugene F. Wiles and Ulysses G. Plummer Jr., both of Portland, called as their main witness Collis Druey of Oswego, mineral examiner for BLM.

Druey gathered several ore samples at the mines in July 1953. His reports show the existence of gold as nil and of silver only in traces. It is Druey's opinion, based on the assay, that it is not economically feasible to develop the mining claims in the area.

Craget, when he was on the witness stand, said that the claims are in exploration of the minerals. However, exhibits were entered to show some of the gold which exists.

Attorney Dimick at one point asked Craget, "Is there still gold on the claim?" Craget answered, "It ain't been scratched."

Assays by the defendants showed the existence of many minerals. Druey testified, however, that the assays were qualitative rather than quantitative, like those made for the government.

He claimed all the assays show development of the mines would not pay because of the small quantity of worthwhile minerals.

Dimick and J. E. Russell of Phoenix, Ariz., another attorney for Craget and Dieckman, brought out testimony that one Myrtle Creek area in which the land in controversy is located, has produced \$150,000 in precious minerals in the last 75 years.

Dimick said the area cannot become a "mineral" because the government has ruled four times previously that the land was mineral land, but the rulings were in actions not directly involving the government.

William D. Green represented Mrs. Kuehn at the hearing, which actually was two hearings in one since her case is to be decided separately. Mrs. Kuehn claims half interest in the Almaden and Rambleshaft mines. Dieckman owns half of the Star mine.

Craget denies Mrs. Kuehn is now part owner, saying he is the only one who has kept up assessment. But this question did not enter into the government's action.

Felton, the hearings officer, said his decision may be appealed to the director of BLM or on to the secretary of interior if one side or both should desire to do so.

Traffic Violator Winds Up In Jail

William R. Lankford, Valley Hotel, Roseburg, was arrested by city police Thursday night as he drove a 1941 Ford pickup truck through the streets of Roseburg in what officers claim was an attempt to elude them.

When they stopped Lankford he piled up a total of five traffic charges. He was lodged in city jail and city police started checking the registration of the truck. Today Lankford is lodged in the county jail on charges of auto theft.

Checking through the state police, Police Chief Stan Olson found that Lockwood Motors had reported a pickup stolen from their lot Thursday. Lankford states he purchased the truck from a party in Glendale.

Lankford was arraigned in district court Saturday morning.

Young Policeman Credited With Capturing Ex-Convicts

The story of a young policeman who may have headed off a small crime wave in Douglas County was still unfolding today.

The hero is Sutherland police officer George Jacobs, who has been a policeman only about one month.

State police at Roseburg said Jacobs really did a professional job in apprehending two ex-convicts.

Bound over to the grand jury, with bail set at \$5,000 by District Judge Emer G. Baldwin, are Arthur Leroy Davidson, 26, Grants Pass, and Raymond Lee Anderson, 27, Coos Bay. They are charged with being ex-convicts in possession of a concealable firearm.

The story began Wednesday when officer Jacobs spotted and checked a car parked in Sutherland from Empire.

A call to state police verified the description. A short time later Jacobs located Davidson and Anderson in the Sutherland Hotel. One of them had been named as a suspect in a case, so Jacobs had tracked them down.

State police came into the case after the suspects had been taken to the Sutherland jail.

Police Chief Stan Olson Conducts Training Class

Roseburg Police Chief Stan Olson these days is busy every Thursday, for he has been named by the Oregon State Police as one of five trainers in a series of statewide police basic training schools.

The chief has been holding two classes each day on traffic law enforcement and accident investigation. The schools are sponsored jointly by the Oregon Assn. of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs Assn., in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Oregon State Police, Bureau of Municipal Research and Service of the University of Oregon and the League of Oregon Cities.

Two schools already have finished — at Bend two weeks ago and at The Dalles this past week. Next week the school will be at Corvallis, then classes will be held at Coos Bay, Salem, Astoria and Grants Pass in following weeks.

Roseburg will send three patrolmen to the school in Grants Pass. They are officers Sam Goss, Robert O'Brien and Berlyn Eaton.

Besides Olson's classes, courses include other phases of law enforcement, investigation, reports and court proceedings.

GOP Candidate's Auto Target Of Dynamiters

CHAGRIN FALLS, Ohio (AP) — A dynamiter tried to blow up Rep. George H. Bender's 1946 Cadillac early Saturday while the Republican candidate for Ohio senator was asleep in his home.

Bender's wife, Edna, found a seven inch, half pound stick of dynamite — broken in half but otherwise intact — on the rear floor of the car Saturday morning.

Only the detonator cap, said police, had exploded, showering the car with corrugated brown paper used for wrapping the bomb.

The Ohio congressman had driven into the driveway of his home on his 14-acre estate around 12:05 a.m., then had retired for the night in his bedroom on the opposite side of the house—40 feet away.

Bids To Request Postoffice Work

It includes alteration of a portion of the existing driveway, construction of a new driveway across the lawn on the east side of the building to Cass Street, removal of the flagpole to a new location at the southwest corner of the lot and construction of new curbs and pavement.

Sealed bids in triplicate would include furnishing all labor, equipment and materials and performing all work.

Featured on the panel will be State Sen. Paul Geddes, Brig. Gen. Curtis T. Beecher, county Young Republican Chairman Fred Bernau and David Busenbark. Busenbark is co-chairman of the county Cordon committee.

They will discuss the following topics: Sen. Geddes, oil and education; Gen. Beecher and Bernau, Sen. Cordon's seniority and value in the Congress and his support of President Eisenhower's program; Busenbark, O & C legislation.

The panel will be moderated by Robert Davis.

Fuchs Pleads Innocent To Drunken Driving

Edwin Joseph Fuchs, 36, Roseburg, was remanded to jail Friday after pleading innocent to a charge of drunken driving.

District Judge Elmer G. Baldwin set bail at \$500 on the charge, which grew out of a traffic accident Thursday night.

Earlier, Fuchs pleaded guilty to being drunk on a public highway, but the judge suspended imposition of sentence until disposition of the other charge is made.

Sutherland Police Dept. Employs New Officer

The Sutherland Police Dept. has hired a new officer. He is Tim Goodson, according to the Sutherland Police.

Goodson formerly worked under Sutherland Chief Richard Crumal in Porterville, Calif. He has been in police work 10 years. The Sun says he is a member of the American Detective Assn. and the Metropolitan Detective Assn.

Heavy Fog Causes Two Accidents Here Saturday

Heavy fog which has smothered most of Western Oregon and Washington for the past several days caused at least two accidents in Douglas County Saturday morning.

Two persons were in Community Hospital as a result. One had two broken legs. Both were reported in good condition this morning.

The victim with the broken legs was Edward Lewis, 50, of Glide. Lewis told investigating state police officers he was standing alongside his car when another vehicle struck him about 6:15 a.m. According to the police report, Lewis had called Mohr Towing to get his car out of the ditch, four miles north of Roseburg.

As Lewis stepped around by the left front fender of his automobile, in the fog, he was struck by a car operated by Gerald Kirkpatrick of Roseburg. No citations were issued. Minor damage to both cars were reported by state police.

Hours earlier at 1:30 a.m. a Sutherland driver missed a curve in the road in the fog and went over an embankment. The one car accident occurred at Calkins Road and Garden Valley Road, State police said.

Miss Joan Fennell, 17, was taken to Community Hospital. Hospital personnel said she received no apparent injuries. They said she'd probably go home today. Her passenger, Vance Smith of Sutherland, was apparently uninjured. The vehicle was totally demolished. No citations were issued. The demolished car was brought in by P&B Towing and Ambulance.

Earlier, at Pomona, Calif. Nixon said, "In 1954 the issue is 'keep the racials out'."

Orval Bayless, a Democrat and Kentucky state official, said Friday the Cooper-Barkley contest seems to be shaping up as "a horse race." Bayless said a poll conducted by Democrats "showed a slight majority" for Barkley.

In neighboring Ohio, Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson addressed a GOP rally at Dayton and said the Eisenhower administration is "protecting the real interests of workers, is ever conscious of the human problems of the individual citizen and his family."

In a New York television talk, GOP National Chairman Leonard Hall said he believes the step taken by the GOP in endorsing campaigning will result in a Republican victory.

"The people have confidence in President Eisenhower and his program," Hall said, and they don't want "to go back to Trumanism."

Democratic Chairman Mitchell said he believes Eisenhower is stumping up the voters but won't change the result.

(3) construction of adequate city buildings; (4) off-street parking; (5) additional street lighting; (6) street improvements; (7) additional parks and playgrounds; and (8) restriction of railroad switching during rush traffic hours.

Barker also came out as a strong proponent of a cross-state highway through Roseburg.

He further emphasized planning to keep Roseburg in the position of "shopping center" of the Umpqua basin. He also called it "vital importance" that the community be attractive to new industries.

He said he would institute an "adequate public information program" so that taxpayers of the city will be informed about official activities, plans for the future and current problems if elected.

Barker is making a bid to unseat Mayor Percy Croft, incumbent candidate, and Britt is running for one of the two positions open on the City Council from Ward II.
