Telegram From President Urges Big Election Vote

A telegram from Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower has been received in Roseburg by James Aiken. Aiken is chairman of the Citizens for Eisenhower Committee of the Fourth Congressional Dist.

In the lengthy night letter, some 300 words, the President expressed his regrets in not being able to personally visit Oregon before Nov. 2. He requested that Aiken inform the residents of the district of the contents of the communication.

In part the President said: (that) my conviction (is) that voting is not only a privilege of every citizen but his first duty. Only if every qualified voter casts a ballot can public servants have certain knowledge that their acts reflect the will of the people. This is the first essential of free government.

"Yet, I hear constantly about complacency and apathy toward this critical election. Friends tell me this is because the people are satisfied, on the whole, with the kind of government and kind of program that we have. I find this unbelievable to me that good government cannot command as much zealous support as bad government commands opposition.

"Let us, therefore, do everything we possibly can to persuade every voter to express himself on election day. So let's roll up a tremendous vote — confident that the overwhelming majority of the American people support good government and will vote accordingly."

The President commended the work of Aiken and his committee.

Aiken said Thursday that the Citizens for Eisenhower Committee was non-partisan in nature. "We're working to get people in Congress who'll support Eisenhower," he said, "and we're not trying to antagonize anyone. E. V. Lincoln, Roseburg, is Douglas County Chairman of the committee.

Roseburg To Host Order Of Cooties At Spring Meet

Roseburg's Poseyville Pup Tent 2, VFW, Military Order of Cooties, will play host to the Grand Council Administration, Grand Pup Tent of Oregon when the group meets for a state-wide convocation next spring.

Bus Williams, grand past commander, announced that the decision came at a meeting of the order earlier this week in Eugene. No exact date has been set for the Saturday night and Sunday meeting, but as soon as details have been settled, a date will be announced.

Eskimos Given Rescue Effort Commendation

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — Eskimo villagers who risked their lives and lost four dogs while on a rescue mission that saved the life of an airman were commended Friday by Air Force officials.

The rescue occurred after a jet trainer plane from Eielson Air Force Base exploded Oct. 16 over Norton Sound on the northwest coast of Alaska.

Eskimos of the remote village of Koyuk on the sound sighted smoke and notified their village school teacher, Edward Rogan, who made a sight on the smoke and estimated it was 20 miles southeast of the village.

Guided by his pinpoint estimate, Air Force officials said, rescue squadron planes quickly located one survivor 2nd Lt. Nicholas Howell of Lompac, Calif. Howell had landed in the sound and waded ashore, where he was picked up the next day.

Meanwhile, the Eskimos of Koyuk harnessed dog teams and headed out on the ice covering the sound to search for the other man about the plane shore in an area of open drift ice which had not yet frozen solid and was quite treacherous.

One of the Eskimos, Roger Nasauk, fell into the frigid water with his team. He was in the water 15 minutes before being pulled out. Four of his dogs froze to death.

The Eskimos slept at night on the broken ice flows in sub-freezing weather and continued searching for the other airman, 2nd Lt. Richard Lill of Chicago, until hope was given up. Lt. Lill now is presumed dead.

The commendation was given the village in a letter addressed to its residents. It said "Your efforts prove that the small villages of Alaska make up part of the first line of defense of America. Your alertness in spotting this plane could have been a warning of the approach of enemy aircraft."
