Medford edged out the local distance men by a 39-40 score while Springfield came in third with 45 counters in the two and one-quarter mile event on the Vets grounds.

Locals grabbed second and fourth spots behind Robbins who toured the course in 10:30.5 Jim Friday was second and Dave Monger fourth behind Glenn Allison of Medford.

Remaining places in the top ten went to Les Lingsheit, Medford; Allen Peterson, Springfield; Jack Holt, Springfield; Jack Poole, Medford; Jim Howard, Springfield; Ralph Thompson, Springfield.

Other Roseburg scorers were Brown 19th, The Indian trackmen Bill Poole in 14th place and Dick under Coach Frank Purdy will run in the state cross country meet in Portland next Saturday.

Connie Blasts Loop, Sees Baseball In Kansas City

Mack blasted the American League for rejecting the bid of eight Philadelphians to buy control of his beloved Athletics and said he believed the team will play in Kansas City in 1955.

The 91-year-old president of the Athletics said last night that "the Kansas City setup wants the club. Everything works to that end. No matter what the Macks say or do, the answer will still be Kansas City, of course."

Mr. Baseball, as he is known to fans the world over, said American League club owners just didn't want the Philadelphia syndicate to have the team. "They simply didn't want those men to have the club. It's a runaround with an awful lot of pressure to take the A's to Kansas City."

Connie Would Object

"They wouldn't get away with that stuff on me. They'd have to show me," said baseball's elder statesman. He said if he were a member of the syndicate he would "demand" to know the objection to the group.

In an open letter to the Philadelphia fans read to newsmen by his wife, Katherine, the grand old man of baseball not only lashed out at the league, but rebuked his son, Roy, key man in the many proposed deals to decide the fate of the bankrupt franchise.

"He (Roy) has been behind everything since May, telling everybody one thing and doing something else," said Mack.

On the other hand, Connie had nothing but praise for his son, Earle, the other of the three owners of the team. "I don't think it's any fault of Earle's. He's been wonderful about everything."

Referring again to the local syndicate, Mack said:

"These good businessmen have the money and want the club but the league owners who voted against approval gave the answer that they weren't rejected — they just weren't approved."

Milwaukee Pitcher To Quit Basketball

BOSTON (AP) — Gene Conley, the 23-year-old Milwaukee Braves pitcher, has decided to quit professional basketball in order to devote full time to his promising baseball career.

A month after he turned out with the Boston Celtics and on the day before the Celtics opened their National Basketball Association schedule at Rochester, Conley announced his decision at a news conference Friday.

The 6 foot 8 inch former Washington State student who returned from service to post a 14-8 pitching record in his big league freshman season, said he made up his mind on his own. Conley pointed out he hadn't talked to Braves' officials prior to his statement and wanted it clear he had no disagreements with the club.

Conley said subconsciously he sometimes favored his pitching arm in playing basketball and in addition had to be fair to himself and the Celtics. He added he couldn't give his best to either sports if he tried to play both. And he said he wanted more time with his family.

Coach Red Auerbach of the Celtics had planned to start Conley at center Saturday night against the Royals and now must find sufficient backboard strength to make up for the value which Gene had exhibited on the exhibition tour.

Miami, Bowl-Banned, Grinds Fordham, 75-7

The NCAA's recent disciplinary order against the Florida school, banning post-season competition, puts a pretty sturdy roadblock between Miami and a bowl bid. And the way the Hurricanes are going, it looks like that order may be the only device capable of stopping Miami this season.

Miami, a newcomer at the No. 10 spot in this week's Associated Press poll after defeating Maryland, exploded in all directions for its sixth victory of the season last night, humiliating Fordham's Rams 75-7.

In other Friday action that got another big college weekend underway, Marquette defeated Detroit 14-13, the Citadel upset Wofford's six-game winning streak 14-13, Richmond knocked off George Washington 7-0 and Denver defeated New Mexico 19-6.

U. S., Brazil Unbeaten In Basketball Tourney

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The United States and Brazil were the only unbeaten teams Saturday in the world basketball tournament.

The Peoria (Ill.) Caterpillars, representing the U. S., and Brazil both won their third straight in the round-robin final round Friday.

The Caterpillars subdued a stubborn Uruguayan team whose fast-breaking tactics surprised the Americans. Peoria, leading at halftime 30-26, withstood a final period surge by Uruguay to win 64-59. B. H. Born, former Kansas luminary, topped the Caterpillars with 15 points.

Brazil whipped Canada 82-66 to hand the Canadians their first setback in the final round. Canada's record in the round-robin is 2-1.

The Caterpillars hope to continue their winning ways Saturday at the expense of Canada and take over undisputed possession of first place in the standings. Each victory counts two points and the U. S. can move two points in front of Brazil, which is idle Saturday.

The Philippines, which beat China 48-38 Friday, meets Israel and China plays France in other games Saturday.

Frosh 13, Rooks 6

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon Frosh, despite 14 fumbles, defeated the Oregon State Rooks 13-6 Friday night in the football opener for both freshman teams.

Stim Wesley of Honolulu passed to Bob Degrant in the end zone to put the Rooks ahead 6-0 in the first quarter.

The Frosh, who appeared strong defensively, were held scoreless until the last period when quarterback Jack Henkel scored two touchdowns—one on a 42-yard run and the other on a seven-yard plunge.

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Boycott Count Tossed At Gotham Ring Bosses

NEW YORK (AP) — The Manhattan Boxing Alliance, charging its fighters are being "boycotted" by Madison Square Garden and St. Nicholas Arena promoters, has been told to have affidavits and documented testimony ready for a hearing before the New York State Athletic Commission next Friday.

A delegation from the alliance, organized about three months ago, picketed the commission offices Friday and then hurled charges of "boycott" when they appeared with their lawyer, Harry Lee, at the commission meeting. Several alliance members recently were expelled from the powerful International Boxing Guild.

Al Braverman, president of the alliance, said the office of District Attorney Frank Hogan had taken cognizance of their charges and had subpoenaed some members of the rival guild (IBG). Hogan's office refused to confirm or deny the report. It was learned that some club records had been subpoenaed, however.

Pickets marched through the rain in front of the commission offices. Braverman said there were 47 of them. One sign read: "Why does the commission ignore the boycott?" Another carried by middleweight boxer Rinky Novato of Brooklyn who is managed by Braverman, read: "Won 25 of 26—blacklisted."

Duck Runners Win

EUGENE (AP) — The University of Oregon, winning first, second and third, defeated Oregon State College in a cross country race here Friday.

Bill Dellinger, NCAA mile champion, was first for Oregon with a time of 12 minutes, 32.7 seconds for the near-three-mile course. Ken Riser was second and Stan Rutherford third.

Phoenix Dumps Glendale, 39-0

Twenty and 13-point quarters in the first half gave Phoenix an insurmountable lead as they routed Glendale 39-0 at Phoenix Friday afternoon.

The Pirates played hard ball but were unable to pick up clutch first downs to get near the Phoenix goal.

Delmer Brood scored around end from the six and then booted the extra point to open Phoenix scoring. It was 20-0 at the end of the first quarter when Roger Puhl ran 20 yards off a statue of liberty for one score and John Garner plunged for another. Brood scored on a 30-yard pass play but missed the conversion. Another pass play to Ron Vreeken was good for 30 yards and a touchdown. Brood placekicked again.
