Wall-To-Wall Carpeting Is Permanent Fixture

EUGENE (AP) — Is wall-to-wall carpeting part of a dwelling? The state tax commission took that question under advisement at a public hearing here this week when Frank Kinney, a Eugene realtor, protested that the Lane County assessor had assessed his carpeting as part of the house. He contended that wall-to-wall carpeting is readily removable and should be considered as personal property, just like furniture.

Since the state instituted a reappraisal program in Lane County, two years ago, wall-to-wall carpeting has been considered a permanent fixture in a house and treated as real property.

Kinney told Examiner Al Thomas he wants the Tax Commission to make a state-wide ruling on the matter.
