

LARGE CROWD HEARS INTERESTING PANEL DISCUSSION AT FULLERTON

In keeping with the year's theme, "Together We Work to Understand and Better Our Schools," the November meeting of Fullerton PTA was presented to an attentive audience of 150 Monday. The program for the evening was centered around the theme to be used for American Education Week, Nov. 7 to 13, being: "Good Schools Are Your Responsibility," expounding the idea that public schools belong to the people and are provided by them and not for them. This was done by means of a panel discussion with the Rev. Lowell Morgan acting as moderator. Members of the panel were: one Fullerton teacher, Mrs. Bonita Wyckoff; two Fullerton parents, Mrs. Marilyn Cox and Clifford Baxter; and two school administrators, Lyle Eddy, Fullerton principal, and M. Deller, superintendent of schools. Material for the panel was furnished by the parents themselves in the form of questions directed to members of the panel by the moderator. A lively discussion followed, and although time was limited, most of those present felt they had a better understanding of schools and school policies by the time they left the meeting, according to Mrs. Roy Hanford, program chairman.

Demonstrations and displays of schoolroom activities were presented by pupils from the sixth grade. Sixth grade teachers participating were Robert Korn, Miss Shirley Harrold and Walt Buss. These demonstrations and displays are presented at each PTA meeting by one of the grades in the school, thus interpreting different phases of the school program.

School board members were special guests of the evening and were introduced by Mr. Deller. Also introduced was Dr. Marvin E. Smith, assistant superintendent of schools. Several comments were then made by Mrs. C. E. Roberts, chairman of the school board, and an invitation was extended by her to all parents to attend school board meetings, which are open to the public.

After children in the audience were sent out to enjoy a movie, a surprise feature of the evening was presented pertaining to undesirable literature and comic books available to youth at stores and on news stands today. Actual scenes from some of these books were flashed on a screen by means of an opaque projector so that parents could see what the books contain. Comment was made to the effect that such things will remain available to our children until parents voice their protests strongly enough to have them removed. Not all comic books and literature for children come within this category, and it is toward those that are objectionable that parents are urged to object. A special discussion group to meet Monday evening, Nov. 8, was then announced for the purpose of studying further into this problem and to develop some form of action to combat it. The business meeting was presided over by the president, Mrs. Arthur Lamka. Inspirational thought in the spirit of Thanksgiving was presented by Lewis Sauter. Mrs. Ted Prusia, vice president, gave a report on the executive committee meeting held Oct. 25, and also reported that PTA year books for Fullerton would be available in two weeks. As youth chairman, Mrs. Prusia told of the need for adult leadership in the various

The results of such a survey were requested to be brought back to the school board meeting, Nov. 18.

Announcement was made that the December and January meetings will be held on the second Monday rather than the first Monday. The meeting was adjourned after which refreshments were served by the fifth grade parents. Next regular meeting will be Dec. 13.

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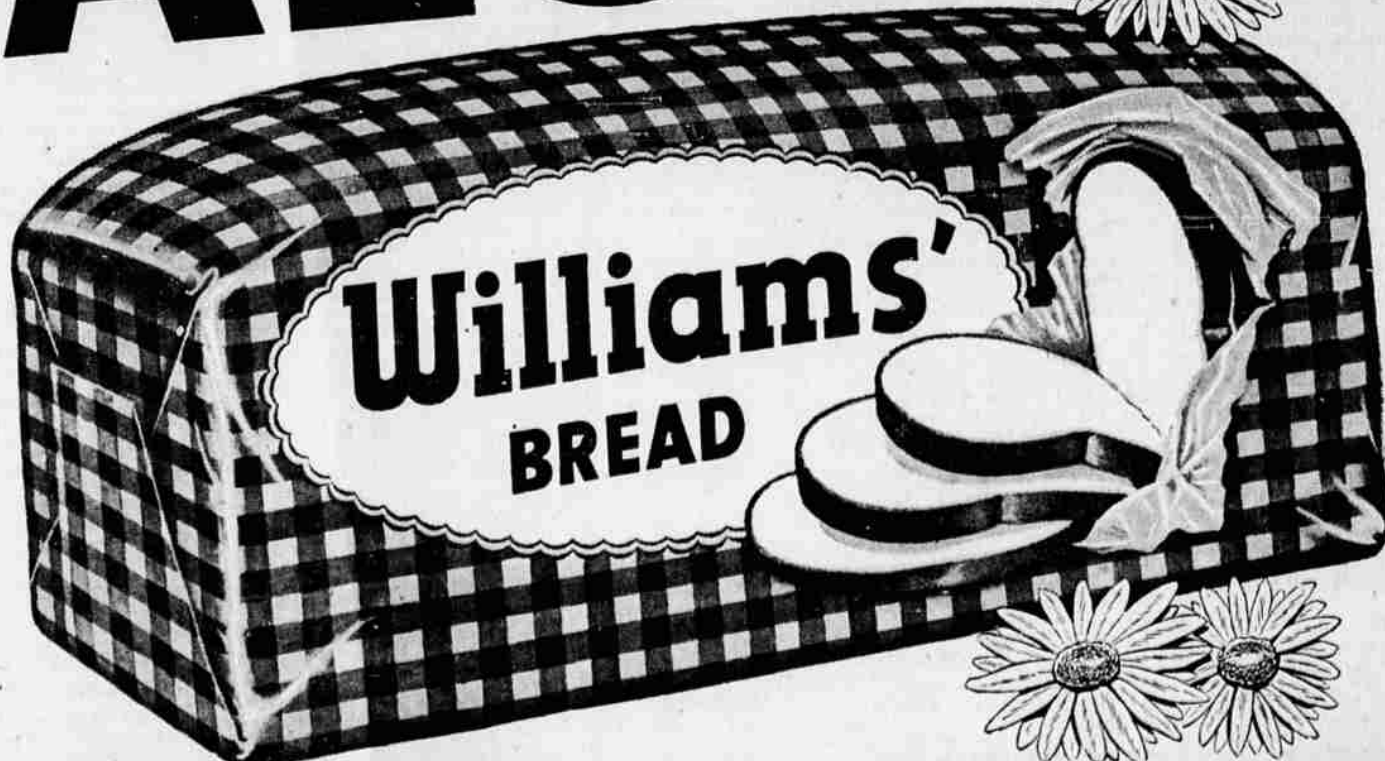
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
