

# Indians Finally Upset Grants Pass Cavemen

## Tribe Ends 8-Year Rule In 12-0 Tilt

A rumor, fast becoming established as fact, started somewhere between Roseburg and Grants Pass this fall that the only guy in Oregon coaching circles that Mel Ingram is afraid of is Bob George.

Toddy, Ingram, the Cavemen's head football coach, probably is still jittering after George's instruction of his Roseburg Indians to empty a bag of tricks on Ingram's charges Friday night in Grants Pass.

The result, 12-0 for Roseburg, was sweet revenge for past humiliations as the Tribe overwhelmed the Grants Pass Cavemen, who last week were ranked third-best prep team in the state by AP sports writers. It was the first Indian victory over Grants Pass in eight years.

**Indians Spread**  
The main trick in George's bag was a variation of the T-formation that had the Indians spread all over the field. The result was that: (1) it broke open the Cavemen defense to give vent to half-back Nub Beamer's broken-field running talents, and (2) let Roseburg pass receivers barrel past beleaguered Grants Pass defenders.

Howard Backen, calling his best game of the season, handled all but one snap from center on plays other than punts. Beamer and Bill Oerding stood 30 yards apart at flankers, and Bob Thomas stood four yards behind Backen. That was the typical formation.

From that formation, every play was a thriller, with Backen laterally far to Beamer or Oerding, who then could either pass or run. Or a handoff to Thomas just for fun.

The system didn't pay off until the third quarter, for the Indians were set back twice in the first half by penalty.

With about 6:30 gone in the third, Beamer, who was all over the field all night, intercepted a pass from the arm of Chuck Newell, a Cavemen quarterback, on the Cavemen 45 and returned it 11 yards. Thomas lost a yard in a punch at the line. Then Backen stepped back and rifled a shot to the ace pass-catcher, end Fred Hargis, who outjumped a defender for possession of the ball on about the 15.

He whirled and was away for the first Indian TD. Gary Crenshaw missed the conversion on a place-kick.

**No First Downs**  
Up to this point, the Cavemen had shown nothing but doldrums. They had failed to make a first down during the entire first half, and gained only 31 yards from scrimmage, while the Tribe was rolling up 176 and seven first downs.

It was as weird a ball game as you'd want to see up to the half. Roseburg would pump deep for a first down, then lose the ball after a penalty. Grants Pass would be held and punt. Everyone was expecting Grants Pass to get going, but outwitted Roseburg at ways made the moves.

But after the Roseburg touchdown, Grants Pass took the kickoff and started booming. The kickoff was returned by Jim Reid 16 yards to his own 36. Eleven novices played and the Roseburg offense put the ball on the Roseburg 25.

At that point, Al Lindbloom, playing defensive halfback, turned into one of the heroes of the game. He tried his first pass of the series of downs, and a moment it appeared to be all over for the Indians as the receiver broke free momentarily. But Lindbloom sped out of nowhere like Willie Mays, leaped to catch the ball on the 50, where he was intercepted out of bounds. That was the only Grants Pass threat of the game.

An exchange of punts then gave Roseburg the leather on its own 44. Twelve plays later the score was 12-0.

Here was where George pulled out another trick, for he ordered his boys back into alter straight-T and wing-T formations. Beamer, Thomas and Backen ran the home team ragged in carrying the ball forward. Big play of the series was a 20-yard sprint by Beamer right up the middle. He rushed through a gate-sized hole in the Cavemen line, cut to the sidelines and rushed into the end zone. However, officials ruled he had stepped out of bounds on the six.

**Beamer Goes Over**  
It didn't matter. Three plays later, Beamer went over from the four.

Roseburg held the Cavemen after the kickoff, forcing them to punt, then ran out the clock on a succession of wide sweeping plays. When picking Roseburg stars, you have to start, of course, with Beamer. Playing the best game of his career, the 175-pound toughie ran up 180 yards passing and rushing.

That brought his season's total to 1,907 yards, as counted quickly after the game.

Another standout was Hargis whose circus catch probably isn't believed down south even yet. Al Lindbloom came in for his moment of glory on that important interception. Jack Landers, Jim Schaeffer, Denny Brundage, Ron Sanders—well, the whole line and line-backers on defense, made the vaunted Cavemen running attack look like hopscotch.

Marvin Fray, in the backfield on defense, continually had one paw in the way of Cavemen passing. He knocked down close to a half-dozen besides two he intercepted (one was nullified on a Roseburg penalty).

## Roseburg Players, Rooters Celebrate Grants Pass Win

The Roseburg Indian football team Friday night probably was the best grid aggregation in the state as it downed the Grants Pass Cavemen, 12-0, in an unsuspected upset.

And here's the feeling they imparted to those local rooters on hand: To heck with state championships. That's for Marshallfield and South Salem. We cleaned Grants Pass' mainspring.

A stream of Roseburg rooters took the hide off Coach Bob George's hand, and he nearly had to bull his way to the dressing room to see his boys.

In the dressing room, a person making conversation had to shout to be heard above the shouts.

Howard Backen, who called the shots through the game, commented on the last series of downs that brought the second touchdown. That was when Roseburg switched to a standard formation to power through the opposing line. "We fooled 'em," the low-headed athlete proclaimed. "Zoom! That was Beamer up the middle." He referred to Nub Beamer's 27-yard romp that gave the Indians a first-and-ten on the GP 6.

Beamer, told that he had passed the 1,000-yard net mark for offensive gaining for the season, grinned and had little to say. He was more surprised when told that the team had passed the 2,000-yard mark in gaining.

Fred Hargis, congratulated on his acrobatic snatch of Backen's pass for the first score, also just grinned. So many people were talking around him he couldn't get a word in.

The rest of the team merely whooped itself hoarse.

Taken later to the Redwoods Hotel for chow, the team to a

man refused proffered steaks, choosing instead a pair of hamburgers apiece and milk.

Then George and his coaching staff ushered them off to a high school dance.

The only bright thing about Grants Pass during the whole night was the performance put on at halftime by the high school's magnificent band, led by Ray McAllister. The band went through marching formations that would have brought tears to the eyes of Tommy Walker of USC fame.

The band was led by seven high-stepping majorettes. The music was brassy enough to drown out the sobs of partisan spectators.

Townpeople in the Climate City must be a hard lot, for they gave up and started going home at one significant point in the game. Need we mention it? Well, just once more. When Al Lindbloom swiped that pass that certainly looked like the score Grants Pass was after. Gosh, and that still was in the third quarter.

In mentioning the Grants Pass band, the Roseburg band shouldn't be overlooked. The GP people were well impressed by stunts of the local musicians when they performed during the half, and Tom Hall's students received a good ovation when it left the field.

It's good to see a town back its football team, and Grants Pass people verge on fanaticism in that respect. Greeting the eyes of Roseburg travelers on the north limits of the city was the predicted score of the game: Grants Pass 27, Roseburg 7. It was on a lighted sign usually reserved for grocery prices.

RIO DE JANEIRO — Basketball as played in the country of its origin is still the best as proved by the Peoria Ill. Catapillars in winning the world tournament Friday night.

The Caterpillars completed an all-victorious march through the tournament by defeating previously unbeaten Brazil 62-41 in the deciding game before a capacity crowd of 15,400.

The South Americans never were in Friday night's game after the first few minutes. The Cats broke away from a 12-11 margin to lead 35-19 at the half and continued to pull away in the second half. The U.S. scoring was divided among seven players with Ed Solomon dropping in 14 points to take offensive honors.

## Steelhead Migration Still High But Below Peak Runs

Summer steelhead migration in the Umpqua River was above average but was considerably below record runs of 1947 and 1952, reports Wm. E. Pitney, biologist in charge of Umpqua studies. The season arbitrarily ended Oct. 31. Steelheads passing over the counting board after that date and prior to May 1 are listed as winter species. There is considerable overlapping at each end, Pitney says, but arbitrary dates are set for the purpose of the study.

The fall movement of fish, silver salmon and salmon trout, has been very disappointing to date. The slow movement, however, is believed to be occasioned by the shortage of rain. A freshet, it is believed, will bring in large numbers of fish.
