

Robbins Retains Oregon Prep Cross-Country Title

Roseburg Third In Competition For Second Year

Unbeaten Roseburg cross-country champion Mark Robbins retained his individual state title Saturday but the Indian distance runner was forced to settle for a third-place finish in the state event.

Robbins toured the one and eight-tenths mile Lewis and Clark College course in Portland in 9:18.1, bettering by 6.2 seconds his 9:24.3 mark of last year. Robbins held the state record for the 1.4 mile junior varsity run but failed to rewrite the varsity record.

The Roseburg barrier finished immediately ahead of five Portland high school entries, but the list of high finishers did not include the Lincoln High threat Jim Grell, who finished far down the list in the closely contested event.

Roseburg's five-team entry accounted for 164 points while first-place Lincoln scored 73 and second-place Albany 116. Fourth place went to Grant with 170.

Charles Palmer and Larry Lawson, in 23rd and 24th places, were Roseburg's second and third finishers while Jim Friday in 57th and Dave Monger in 59th completed point-making for the local team.

Glide In Oregon 6-Man Semifinals After 51-20 Win

A six-man touchdown aerial barrage by Glides two-man air arm submerged Mapleton's Sailors 51-20 Saturday afternoon and whipped Glides' Wildcats into the semifinal round of the state six-man football playoffs.

Led by peppy sophomore halfback Dick Smith, Coach Jack Forsythe's power-laden county and district titlists ripped off a 21-point third quarter, breaking up a close game which had them leading 18-12 at halftime. The Wildcats bottled up Mapleton's ground attack in the second half, jamming the middle to recover three Sailors fumbles on the losers' 20.

Each recovery ultimately led to paydirt. In fact so thorough were the Wildcats when they had the ball, they went puntless throughout. Mapleton punted on two occasions through the course of the struggle.

Smith took a direct hand in each of the final six Wildcat touchdowns and in all three Glides extra points. The Wildcats courted a 12-6 margin in the second quarter before Smith's talent was inserted into the scoring.

Mapleton, coached by Dave Woodruff, and a slight pre-game favorite, started in rampage after receiving the opening kickoff. Several hard line charges moved the ball downfield 47 yards to the Glides 13 from where fullback Bob Bernhardt tossed a scoring pass to end Ed Farrell. The conversion attempt failed and the Sailors led 6-0.

An interested throng of several hundred then anticipated rebuttal. The Wildcats didn't tail them. They changed the scoring bell three times before the Sailors could find port again.

Junior quarterback Gene Polley, the other half of the Glides air weapon, grabbed the kickoff and rolled 29 yards upfield before he was upended at midfield. The Wildcats needed only two rushing plays to set up Polley's eight-yard TD pass to husky end Wayne Kennedy.

Shaw Shackled As UCLA Rambles Over Ducks, 41-0

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Unbeaten UCLA shackled Oregon's George Shaw, the nation's total offense leader, completely Saturday and rolled to a stunning 41-0 football victory on their march to a perfect season.

Oregon's deepest drive went to the UCLA 9 late in the second quarter after Hal Reeve's recovery of Primo Villaneuva's fumble. But on the next play, the Bruins' halfback Jim Decker romped around right end and 91 yards to a touchdown for the knockout blow as the conversion gave his team a 21-0 lead.

Shaw, until Saturday high among the nation's backs for offense, completed only three of 12 passes for 26 yards. He gained only three yards running, after being minus seven the first half, and wound up with a 29 yard gain for the day. UCLA led 14-0 when Reeves recovered Villaneuva's bob-up.

Shaw passed to Dick James for 12, lost 11 when smeared and got it back on a pass to Walt Gaffney. He ran five to reach the 11, but a fourth down drive by James failed and UCLA took over on the 9. Then Decker pulled his spectacular run.

Coach Red Sanders said after the game his team planned no special defenses against Shaw, but "used" the stuff we've used all season.

"He's great," Sanders continued. "But we found him easier to lay hands on than California's Paul Larson."

Oregon's helmets, Len Casanova, said the game was the poorest his team has played this season and also Shaw's worst exhibition. But he added UCLA was the best team his men have faced.

"We'd still have lost if we'd played our best," he added.

First off, we are getting a lot of inquiries about what is this "new" position round that's suddenly showing up on the schedules?

The first one in the Big League will be in the Merchants, Thursday night, and here's the dope: After each team has played each other team in its league once, or a full round of seven matches, a "position round" is interjected into the schedule. This means that team No. 1 in the standings will play against team No. 2. No. 3 will play No. 4. No. 5 will battle No. 6, and No. 7 takes on No. 8. In the Merchants, this pits the two leaders, Smoke-Eaters against Firmco; Yoncalla will battle Patterson Bakery; Coca-Cola and Self Service Laundry will go to the mat; and First Christian Church and Thatcher's Cleaners of Suberlin will scrap it out.

There are two very good reasons why this new innovation was decided on at the September City Assn. meeting. First, it gives one round in which, theoretically, every team will be fighting with its equal, and weak teams especially can get a chance to pick up an easier point. Secondly, it lengthens the season out to 52 weeks, and still makes each team play each other just four times, except for the "equalizer rounds."

Otherwise, we would have to cut short at 28 weeks, or go to 35 weeks. And 32 weeks seems to suit most every one better. All other leagues, except Classic Junior, will follow suit.

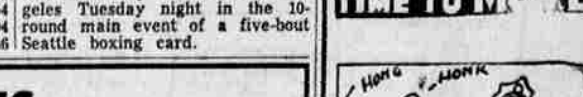
