

Third Quarter Welfare Budget Given Approval

Douglas County Public Welfare Commission members meeting Wednesday evening approved the third quarter budget for welfare work.

The budget, for financial purposes, was approximately \$280,000, according to Mrs. Lois Baker, administrator. The third quarter ends March 31, 1955.

In other action, the commission voted to renew the lease of its present quarters at 325 Main St. Permanent quarters of the commission will be in the Douglas County Courthouse Annex when the new additions are completed, Mrs. Baker said.

Commission members also approved two personnel replacements in the commission's office staff.

Mrs. June Sweeney replaces Mrs. Mary Ritchey in the stenographic department. Mrs. Ritchey left this month to join her husband in Japan.

Mrs. Lucille Mills, formerly of Salem, assumes the duties of Miss Nancy Dowdy. Miss Dowdy resigned her position to be married. Mrs. Mills is a transfer from the Oregon State Tax Department in Salem.

Other recent additions to the county welfare staff are caseworkers Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, formerly an extension agent in Portland, and Joe Bassett, who was a high school teacher and athletic coach in New Hampshire.

Alcohol Plant At Springfield Sold On High Bid

SEATTLE — Sale of the government-owned alcohol plant at Springfield, Ore., for \$227,000 was announced Wednesday by the General Services Administration.

The buyer of the "surplus" plant, built during World War II at a cost of \$3,083,000, is the Learner Investment Co. of San Francisco.

GSA regional Director O. C. Braden said the sale is subject to clearance by the Justice Department on anti-trust aspects.

The Willamette Valley Wood Chemical Co. plant was built in 1942 to test the feasibility of producing 190 proof ethyl alcohol and other by-products from waste woods.

Funeral Set Today For Gunshot Victim

Funeral services for Wyatt Lewis, 47, Roseburg, will be held in the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home Friday.

Irvin died Tuesday as the result of an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound, according to Coroner L. L. Powers. Irvin was the county's seventh apparent suicide victim. He was a private logging contractor.

The funeral is scheduled at 11 a.m. Father Alfred F. Tyson, rector of St. George's Episcopal Church, will officiate. After the funeral, the body will be shipped to Elmo, Wash., for interment.

Irvin was a member of the Masonic Lodge 328 of Roseburg, Hillside Temple of Ashland and Roseburg Shrine Club.

He is survived by his wife, Mae; a son, Gregory, both of Roseburg; and a daughter, Mrs. Paul Yovanovich, Van Nuys, Calif.

3 Persons Given Treatment After Head-on Crash

Three persons received emergency treatment Wednesday evening after a head-on collision on Highway 99 about one-half mile south of Dillard.

State police said Mrs. Mary E. Miles of Vancouver, B.C., received lacerations of the face, arms and legs and a sprained ankle. She was a passenger in a station wagon driven by her son, Barry L. Miles. He was not hurt.

Charles C. Callahan, Winston Motel, driver of a pickup, received a gash on the forehead. A passenger, Wayne Arthur of Hillsboro, also has bruises and cuts.

The three injured were treated at Winston Emergency Hospital and released. Later, Callahan and Arthur were checked also at Community Hospital in Roseburg.

Officers said Miles apparently was attempting to pass a truck when his vehicle met the Callahan pickup. The mishap occurred about 5:15 p.m.

V. T. Jackson Lists \$55 Campaign Costs

V. T. Jackson, a Democrat who received one of the biggest popular votes last week in his successful bid for re-election as state representative, has listed his campaign expenditures totaling \$55.

The filing was reported to the state elections division in Salem Wednesday.

Five contributions to the unsuccessful Guy Cordon campaign were also listed. They were: Henry Gray \$540, Jerry Norville \$180, Robert S. Miller \$137, Andrew Koerner \$100 and Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly \$100.

Ken E. Morgan, Drain Republican defeated in the state representative race, listed his expenditures as totaling \$10.

Jail Sentence Suspended If Probation Observed

A 70-year-old man, John Edgar Crandall of R. 2 Box 490, Roseburg, was released from the county jail Wednesday under probation granted by District Judge Elmer G. Baldwin.

Crandall was arrested by state police and charged with drunken driving. He was fined \$200 and given a 5-day sentence, but the judge suspended the sentence on condition Crandall abide by probation rules for six months.

Three Accidents Damage Vehicles; No One Injured

Three minor accidents in Roseburg Wednesday apparently caused no serious injuries to those involved, but two of the accidents were somewhat unusual.

An early morning tussle between a car and a South Pacific diesel engine caused an estimated \$200 damage to the car. A car driven by Mrs. Lester Board, 24, 1330 Harvard Avenue, struck the diesel about 9 a.m. The incident occurred on West Mosher Street at the railroad right of way. Police said no damage resulted to the engine, driven by engineer L. P. Derry.

No citations were issued by police.

City police cited Kermit Stanley Bunch, 40, general delivery, Roseburg, for making a left turn from the wrong lane about noon. They said he made a left turn from the right lane into the path of John Thomas Talburt, 19, 1145 Giles St. Estimated damage to Talburt's car was placed at \$125; damages to Bunch's car, \$50.

Police Wednesday issued no citations to the drivers of two cars that collided at Oak and Kane streets about 2:30 p.m. The driver of one, Vernon L. Perry, 302 Nebo, Roseburg, told officers he was traveling west on Oak.

He told police he tried to beat an oncoming car, driven by Dean Barclay, 32, Otis, when he saw he could not stop. Perry's car ricocheted off Barclay's, and struck a vehicle parked on the north side of Oak, police said. It then nearly turned around a third vehicle parked in front of The Chapel of the Roses. Police said about \$1,000 damage was done to the parked cars. Perry's vehicle received an estimated \$700 damages. Barclay's car received minor damages.

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Fire Destroys Glendale Home

The Phil Day residence in Glendale, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Mehl and three children, was destroyed in a fire Wednesday about 1:30 p.m. The family lost all furniture and belongings.

Mrs. Mehl and the children, who ordinarily slept upstairs during the afternoon, were in Glendale visiting Mrs. Mehl's mother, who was ill. Mrs. Charles Ellis, a neighbor, noted the smoke and informed other neighbors, who called for assistance.

Mrs. G. B. Fox, Glendale correspondent, reports that the Douglas Fire Protective Assn., was notified, but since the crew is kept at minimum force during wet weather, no one was available to answer the call.

Mehl, a partner in the firm, Day & Mehl, contractors, stated the house and furnishings are partially covered by fire insurance.

Witnesses reported the heat of the fire was so intense that clothes on a line 50 feet away and a fence, 75 feet away, were scorched. Neighbors fought flames that reached the garage, and were able to save that building. The origin of the fire was not determined.

Chavez Enters Debate With Senator McCarthy

"responsible to some extent" for the "loss of China."

He praised the Eisenhower administration for firing Davies but said the expulsion came "thousands of lives too late and years too late."

Chavez leaped up and said "millions" of Americans are "just as patriotic as the senator from Wisconsin." He said that wasn't saying much.

Chavez said he knew Davies and his family well and had the highest respect for their patriotism.

He said that the decision to fire Davies was made by one man — Secretary of State Dulles — who got "fired by millions of the voters of New York." This was apparently a reference to Dulles' defeat by Lehman in the 1950 senatorial race in New York.

Chavez said McCarthy tries to "take it on himself" to decide who is a Communist and who is not and "tries to get away with it by bringing in Eisenhower."

Sen. Case (R-SD), a member of the committee which recommended censure of McCarthy, expressed the hope McCarthy will give "Calm, reflective consideration before he makes further statements or asks questions which might further complicate his position."

This second day of debate resumed in an atmosphere of tension heightened by the descent of hundreds of McCarthy admirers on the capitol.

By trains, busses and private cars, partisans of the Wisconsin Republican senator flocked into the city for a "national rally for McCarthy" to be held in Constitutional Hall Thursday night.

William Lankford Gets Year In Pen

William R. Lankford, 30, was sentenced to a one-year term in the state penitentiary Wednesday when he appeared before Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Lankford pleaded guilty last Friday when he was arraigned on a district attorney's information charging him with taking a pickup truck from Lockwood Motors without permission. He was arrested by Roseburg police two weeks ago.

He admitted his guilt but said he remembered nothing of the incident because he had been drinking. Sentencing was delayed so the court could study Lankford's record.

Dennis K. Bunnell, 21, Roseburg, also was taken to the state prison after his probation was revoked because of drinking.

Bunnell's three-year sentence on probation will now take effect. The probation was granted March 7, 1952, on a charge of burglarizing a house near Canyonville.

Man Kills Boss Of His Ex-Wife, Then Shoots Self

OREGON CITY — A 39-year-old paper mill worker killed his ex-wife's employer and then himself as the woman watched helplessly here Wednesday.

The dead were Dr. H. Hudson Judd, 42, a chiropractor, and the ex-husband, Hurshel Willard Webb, 39, Oregon City.

Mrs. Fay Webb, who was receptionist at Judd's office here, said the husband she divorced Sept. 13, came to the office and talked with Judd about 20 minutes before suddenly drawing out a pistol.

He shot Judd three times, then pointed the gun at her, Mrs. Webb said.

"Go ahead and shoot, but I'm going to call police," she said she heard, but instead sat down on the floor and shot himself in the head, she said.

Roseburg Veteran Dies Wednesday

Fred Wesley Lazarus, 53, died Wednesday after a lingering illness. He was a resident of 2825 N. Stephens St.

He was born Dec. 13, 1900, at Kansas City, Mo., and a veteran of World War I. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Hoquiam, Wash.; Loyal Order of Moose 910, Hoquiam; Fraternal Order of Eagles 252, Hoquiam; and Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 1135, of which he was past commander. He was also a past commander of District 5 from his Hoquiam post. He was affiliated as a member of the Disabled American Veterans, Chapter 21, Aberdeen, Wash., of which he was a past commander; the Air Defense Command of Roseburg; and the Military Order of Coaches of which he was past grand inspector, Dept. of Washington.

Surviving are: His wife, Hazel, Roseburg; a son, Robert, of Portland; two daughters, Peggy Lazarus of Seattle, and Earla Ann Lazarus of Oakland, Calif.; a stepson, Richard Russell, of Crescent City, Calif.; his father, Silas A. Lazarus, of Gresham; two brothers, Col. W. W. Smith, commander of the Briggs Air Force Base at El Paso, Texas, and W. E. Lazarus of Portland; a sister, Mrs. Melva Nungesser of Portland; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Funeral services are scheduled in The Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, Friday at 4 p.m. The Rev. John York of the Church of Christ will officiate. The body will then be shipped to Portland for burial in the Willamette National Cemetery under full military honors. The firing squad and pall bearers will come from Hoquiam, Wash., to take charge of interment.

YAKIMA — A "lost" hunter enjoyed the comforts of home Wednesday while a worried weekend hunting companion and a deputy sheriff continued to search for him in the Swamp Lake area west of Yakima.

Hugh Wedgewood, 47, of Maryhill, Wash., had been reported lost by a companion, Joe Smith, Maryhill, late Tuesday at the Naches Ranger Station.

Deputy Sheriff Virginia Nelson said Wedgewood told her he walked out of the hills Monday night after being lost. A couple of hunters picked him up near the Chinook Pass Summit. He told the deputy he had stopped at a game checking station and reported that he had been lost and was on his way home.

The word just didn't get around. A relative had arranged to fly Dallas Bennett, Douglas County, Ore., sheriff's deputy and former boxer, and Bennett's pedigree bloodhound from Roseburg to Yakima to join the search if Wedgewood was still missing Wednesday night.

Bennett's St. Hubert's bloodhound, Gerald's Knackout, was purchased two months ago from Sheriff Arthur N. Jennison's Bloodhound Kennels, Cheshire County, N.H., for about \$1,000. It is owned by Bennett and maintained by the Douglas County Civil Defense organization.
