Earthquake Hits Southern Part Of California

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A rumbling earthquake rolled north through Southern California from a center south of the Mexican border early Friday but caused no reported damage.

At 4:27 a.m., it woke thousands here, where it was rated the most severe tremor since 1940. It was felt north 140 miles to the San Fernando Valley, north of Los Angeles, and east 110 miles to El Centro in the Imperial Valley.

Seismologists said its intensity was strong enough at its center to cause considerable damage in a populated area. But the indicated center was about 100 miles southwest of here in an unpopulated section of the Mexican state and Lower California.

Reports from the Mexico city of Ensenada, 85 miles south of here, were that the quake had been felt strongly there but no damage was done.

It was strong enough here to rattle windows, make houses creak and set suspended objects swaying.

FAMILY KILLED

SALINA, Kan. (AP) — Five members of a family were found shot to death in their Salina home Friday and authorities said it apparently was a case of murder and suicide.

The victims were Roy Henry, about 35; his wife, Kay, about 30; and their children, Scott Thomas, 4; Ronnie Henry, 6 and Mary Lynne, about 2.

St. Joseph's To Join In Clothing Program

St. Joseph's parish will cooperate with other Catholic churches of western Oregon during the week of Nov. 21 in gathering serviceable clothing, blankets and shoes for Korea, refugees of Vietnam, China and Europe.

This was the announcement today by Fr. Edmund Hyland, pastor of the Roseburg parish. He said the campaign is part of a nationwide Thanksgiving week collection under the auspices of War Relief Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Wanted are all types of garments for men, women and children. Footwear should be tied in pairs. Donated articles will be distributed free of charge overseas through existing charitable agencies.

If cash is contributed Fr. Hyland said, checks should be made payable to "Thanksgiving Clothing Collection."
