

County Loses Two State Contenders

Braves Fall To St. Helens In 26-0 Game

Led by all-state back Duane Marshall, St. Helens shooed Reedsport out of the A-2 playoffs for a second straight year Friday night, outpointing the Braves 26-0 on the loser's field.

Marshall almost personally beat the Douglas County entry with three touchdowns, including a 75 yard punt return and an 83 yard run from scrimmage. The winners tallied in each of the first three quarters and held Reedsport from threatening until the second half.

Scoring twice in the first quarter while a teammate added a second period touchdown, the St. Helens team led by 13-0 and 19-0 quarter counts.

Marshall returned a punt 75 yards two minutes after the opening kickoff and a few minutes later scored again from the 10-yard line after the visitors had taken the ball on the Reedsport 25 following a bad drive. Chuck Nolte placed kicked after the second score.

Seconds before halftime, Dave Fish capped a 70-yard sustained drive with a one yard scoring plunge. Four plays into the third quarter, Marshall sprinted 83 yards around left end to tally again. Nolte converted.

Reedsport drove within the winners' 14-yard line twice in the second half but lost the ball on fumbles.

The clever and strong Gob will be giving away 13 pounds to his foe but fireworks are expected to erupt in what looks as a top event.

Two fast, clean boys, Dick Torio and Danny O'Rourke, meet in the evening's 20-minute special event. Torio, recently a star in the muscle bowl football game in Tacoma, is rated a comer and is generally favored to whip O'Rourke.

Spokane Baseball Club Incorporating

SPOKANE — Articles of incorporation were signed and mailed to Olympia Friday for a community-owned Spokane professional baseball club in the proposed new Class B Northwest League.

Attorney Maurice Cooper, one of the signers, said the club is being incorporated for \$250,000, with 100,000 shares of common, nonassessable stock with a par value of \$25 a share.

The organization will be known as Spokane Indians Baseball Club, Inc., and it plans to sell the 100,000 shares to fans in this city of 175,000 persons.

The signers included Dr. Pete Jonas, a Spokane dentist who once pitched for Spokane in the now defunct Class A Western International League, and Frank B. Herron, an announcer who broadcast Spokane games last year.

The 1954 Spokane entry in the WFL, owned by Roy Hotchkiss, was the first to drop out of the league because of poor attendance.

The league later folded. The new league would include Spokane, Tri-City, Yakima, Lewiston, Wenatchee and Salem from the old league, and Eugene, Ore., plus one other city.

Nearly 200 miles of small tributary streams were treated before the reservoir itself was treated. The Game Commission reported that in the big Diamond Lake treatment of a few weeks ago, nets have failed to find any live fish. The water still is contaminated and it is uncertain whether restocking with Kamloops trout can be done before spring.

Yardage Gain Tips Oakland In 6-6 Contest

Oakland probably would have been outdistanced in net yardage anyway, but a couple late-game mental miscues cost the Oakers a chance to beat Monroe on the scoreboard and stay in the running for the B school state championship.

As it was, Monroe outyardaged the Oakers 188-106 net after the two teams ended regulation play in a 6-6 deadlock in a quarterfinal game at Oakland Friday afternoon.

Oakland was in front 6-0 in the fourth quarter.

With fourth and two yards to go on their own 42-yard line and about four minutes remaining to play, as they did against Sutherland last week, the Oakers played the long shot. They went for it and for a second straight game failed to pick up the necessary yardage.

The visitors could pick up but a couple yards on the first play and then were penalized to their own 42 for holding on the next attempt. A 27-yard pass play made it back and then some. There were four minutes remaining when big Jerry Wall got behind defender Bob Tabor to snare quarterback Ollie Kindade's 29-yard wobbly arrow. Wall caught the leather on the five and was floored out of bounds on the three by Tabor.

Monroe's biggest ground-gainer, Melvin Marquardt, picked up one at right end, and then Kindade quarterbacked for the tie. The off-tackle slant for conversion was felled by the tough Oakland line.

It remained 6-6 through the remaining two minutes and 30 seconds of play with the Oakers vigorously trying to overcome the yardage deficit they knew was theirs, opening up with passes, and simultaneously trying to score.

They had 11 plays in which to do it, completing two passes, making one first down and picking up 13 yards. They reached their own 49 to lose the ball on downs and then intercepted a pass which the visitors, evidently unaware they were on the brink of victory, uncorked for insurance.

Chesley McKinnie picked off the flat-passed aerial and was downed on the Monroe 42. Quarterback Toby Moore, who enjoyed fair success in the second half after being badly rushed in the first two quarters, drove a pass to a broken up near the goal line in the closing 20 seconds.

Both teams threatened twice in the first half. Oakland reached the Monroe eight after taking the opening kickoff and driving 59 yards to lose possession on downs.

Monroe drove 35 yards to the Oaker 17 before giving over on downs later in the period.

Early in the second quarter the Oakers' alert McKinnie recovered a Monroe fumble of Moore's punt. McKinnie recovered on the Monroe 25 from where the home team moved down to the nine on running plays before losing the ball on downs again.

In two plays, from there, the visitors made almost the difference in yardage which ultimately decided the game. A sweep piked up 21 yards to the 30 and then fullback Marquardt spot-passed to end Wall who carried all the way to the Oakland nine yard line.

But the sturdy Oakers held and three plays later recovered a fumble to end the threat.

With quarterback Moore handing off masterfully, Oakland scored right after taking the second half kickoff. They moved 57 yards in 15 plays including a play where they lost the ball on a fumble and an immediate recovery on the next play on the Monroe 14.

Right half Carl Rice smashed over from the two but the conversion running attempt was quelled by a fumble.

The Oakers seemed to have command at this stage of the game, containing the visitors on the Oaker 34, 10 and 35 yard lines on different occasions.

Then Rice intercepted on the 33 and in three plays Oakland moved out to the 42 where it was fourth and two to go. The line play gamble didn't pay off.

The winners led by 69 net yards at halftime and 98 at game's end. The three long pass completions gained 117 yards for them. Oakland's line was outweighed but

The other two quarter-final games Friday night surprised the experts, as Beaverton and Lincoln of Portland turned in upset victories over Milwaukie and Pendleton.

Undeclared and untied Marshfield, ranked No. 1 in the state in the final Associated Press poll, kept its perfect record with a 19-6 win over Medford.

The Coos Bay team scored twice in the first period, with Denny

Rams Hope To End Jinx In Card Tilt

LOS ANGELES — Quarterback Norman Van Brocklin and the Los Angeles Rams are favored to whip the Chicago Cardinals in Memorial Coliseum Sunday, but the Rams will have to overcome a strange jinx to do that.

The Rams, still on the rim of contention in the 'hot National Football League' race, have beaten the Cardinals but once in the last seven league games.

In the somewhat personal feud between the Rams' coach, Hampton Pool, and the Cardinals' coach, Joe Stydahar, the record reads:

One exhibition victory apiece and a tie last year in league competition.

The 24-24 tie at Chicago bounced the Rams out of the title race and added fuel to the rivalry between the two clubs.

Some 40,000 or more spectators are expected for the tilt, if good weather prevails. The kickoff is set for 2 p.m. PST.

MILWAUKIE — The Green Bay Packers, surprise team of the National Football League under rookie coach Linc Blackbourn, met the Baltimore Colts tonight at County Stadium in the opener of a week-end of pro football.

A crowd of perhaps 20,000 augmented by the fact that all of Wisconsin will be blacked out on the national television network, is expected to watch the Packers try to even their current record at 4-4. The Colts, two-touchdown underdogs, have won only once in league play this fall.

Leadership in both divisions of the pro circuit will be at stake in top games tomorrow. The New York Giants and Philadelphia Eagles, tied for the Eastern Conference lead on 5-2 records, clash at the Polo Grounds in their first meeting of the year. At Detroit, the defending champion Lions enter the San Francisco 49ers to wipe out a 37-31 upset of three weeks ago and retain top spot in the Western section. The Lions sport a 5-1 record, the 49ers 4-2-1.

The Cleveland Browns, battling to get into title contention, face the Bears at Chicago; Pittsburgh will be at Washington; and the Chicago Cardinals at Los Angeles in other games.

Pendleton turned to a tricky passing attack despite the mud to score its first touchdown. Earl Jambura ran the final four yards, and also plunged for the losers' other TD.

Perhaps the biggest Friday night surprise was Prineville's 13-12 loss to Vale in the class 2-A quarterfinals. Prineville had won the 2-A state championship the past two years and was the only 2-A school to make the AP's top ten.

Vale won the game in the final seconds with Tony Arana the hero. Arana passed to Darrell Swift for the tying touchdown and then converted the game-winning point.

Both teams went into the contest undefeated, but Prineville twice was held to ties this year. Prineville had not been beaten in 26 games.

SHILL UNBEATEN
St. Helens, another 2-A team with a perfect record, Coquille and Dallas won the other semi-final playoff spots. St. Helens downed Reedsport, 26-0, with halfback Duane Marshall getting three touchdowns.

A 137-pound halfback, Bob (Scooter) Helmer, was the whole show as Dallas came from behind in the last quarter to beat Central of Monmouth-Independence 19-13 at Dallas. Helmer got all three 35-yard dashes with five minutes to play. He scooted 90 yards on a kickoff return for the first score.

Coquille blanked Junction City in the other 2-A quarter-final game. Daryl Atkinson and Jack Jacobsen each scored twice for the winners.

In next weekend's semi-finals, it will be Vale vs. Coquille and St. Helens vs. Dallas.

NEW YORK — "America — it's wonderful."

That's what Trinidad's Hector Constance was saying Saturday after beating favored Ralph (Tiger) Jones and his enthusiasm was unbounded.

"The crowd cheers me here," said the puzzled but happy 28-year-old welterweight contender. "In England they booed me for fighting this kind of a fight."

Hector was referring to his close quarter exchanges with the aggressive but sluggish Tiger in the last half of their 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden Friday night.

Through the first five rounds, the rangy West Indian fought a retreating, side-stepping, counter-punching fight. Jones would come in and Hector would move, popping his incoming rival whenever he could. For this type of fight, he trailed on the scorecards of two of the three officials.

But from the fifth on, Constance played it Jones's way and beat the Tiger at his own game. Constance had been trapped and whaled at the ropes in the fifth frame. Apparently he learned his lesson. He swept the seventh, eighth and ninth rounds from the puffing, tired Yonkers, N.Y., middleweight to gain a split decision in the almost clinch-free bout. There were no knockdowns but a lot of leather was thrown. The fans liked it.

Referee Al Berl and Arthur Susskind each voted for Constance, 6-4. Judge Frank Forbes had it a draw, giving each five rounds and six points. The AP had Constance ahead, 6-3-1.

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
