Barneburg was not opposed to election of school superintendent. He stated, however, that the candidate for county school superintendent in Douglas County has run unopposed for the position since 1940.

The appointment of the superintendent for a four-year term by the board would not affect persons now in office who do not have necessary credentials the state requires, Barneburg said. This proposed election of incumbents, he said, among other duties, the proposed board would (1) levy tax on all property in the county for the purpose of providing funds to carry out the functions of the county education district board, and (2) make it possible to establish a regional center for cooperative purchasing of school supplies for districts wishing to participate. Such group buying could save considerable money, Barneburg said.

The state group of superintendents made other suggestions in addition to the general duties of the superintendents. One of them reads: "As far as practical provide education services to local school districts that cannot be provided by school districts because of cost or scope." Such a service, for example, could be psychological aid for children or special education helps, the superintendent explained.

The speaker was introduced to the council by his president, Mrs. Margarette Kern of Myrtle Creek. **PTA Action Advised**

PTA Council members will be meeting with their own members soon to discuss more thoroughly the proposed corrective school legislation. Barneburg asked the council to discuss the following possible resolutions with members.

A resolution of the local unit endorsing the principle of county equalization of educational opportunity by increasing the county school fund.

2. A resolution to endorse the principle of a county educational school board which would have no supervisory functions over local districts, but which would be to appoint a county school superintendent and his staff.

Any action on the proposed legislation by PTA groups will have to be made before January when the next state legislature meets, Barneburg advised.

levy, he said, and does not provide adequate educational facilities.

A study is now being conducted for the superintendents by a member of the University of Oregon school of education staff. It is to determine what figure would be needed to adequately replace the \$10 county school levy soon to take the place of the rural allotment.

Eventually, it would eliminate the rural school district levy Barneburg said. If voters approved, the state group proposes simultaneous levy of the county school fund with other taxes. It asks the per capita amount not be subject to provisions of the 6 percent limitation of the constitution. "We know the school census grows faster than the 6 percent limitation," Barneburg said.

"Money would be returned to the district on the basis of the school enumerations. The advantage would be no exceptions to the rule," he pointed out.

Proposed Change Explained

He discussed next the proposed county education district. It is a move to strengthen local district control, he said. "This is not a step to form a county unit system in Douglas County," he stressed.

As proposed, the county education district board would be set up in accordance with school population. In Douglas County (with between 10,000 and 60,000 school age children) there would be seven zones. Each of them, according to Barneburg, would have one board member and one budget member. The board member would be elected by voters for a four-year term. He would be subject to recall and would serve without pay.

Included in the duties of the board would be hiring and setting the salary of the school superintendent and his staff. The budget would be prepared under local budget law. Additionally, the county educational board may adjust the boundaries of the zones once a year thereafter.

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Cordon, Neuberger Split Over Private Loan For Dam Plan

PORTLAND (AP) — A loan of \$350,000 to the federal government was offered by three power firms Saturday.

The money would be used to get planning started for partnership construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River. The partnership proposal calls for privately owned utilities to pay for about half the construction costs, getting power generation in return.

The firms making the offer are Portland General Electric Co., Pacific Power and Light Co., and the Washington Water Power Co. James H. Polhemus, PGE president, said the money would permit the Army Engineers—who normally do planning work for big federal dams—to get started on planning at once and avoid a possible delay while awaiting congressional action.

The money could be returned without interest if funds eventually were appropriated for the project, Polhemus said.

Col. J. U. Moorhead, Portland district Army engineer, said he had forwarded the offer through channels to the Secretary of the Army. He said he had enclosed a recommendation on whether the offer should be accepted, but he declined to say what the recommendation was.

Cordon, Neuberger Disagree

Sen. Guy Cordon, who sponsored partnership legislation in the last session of Congress, said there was ample precedent for such a loan and that he endorsed the proposal on grounds that the planning would be of value, regardless of whether the dam was built by the federal government, local interests, or a combination of both.

But Senator-elect Richard L. Neuberger, who defeated Cordon in the recent election, said:

"On many occasions during the recent campaign, I stated my belief that dams on the main stem of the Columbia and Snake rivers should be public projects... I would be opposed to the government's incurring an obligation at John Day which could lead to a so-called 'partnership' in which private utilities dominated the turbines and the revenue from the dam."

"I also am a little dubious about the legality of the Corps of Engineers accepting funds from power companies for such a purpose. What will Col. Moorhead do to some other utilities want to get in on this John Day matter? Must he then ask for competitive bids? Has this proposal been breached to the President and the Secretary of the Army?"

Foreign News Briefs

HONOLULU (AP) — A spectacular fire, punctuated by booming explosions, destroyed a block of buildings in Honolulu's industrial area Sunday night.

Firemen said the cause was undetermined. They estimated damage at several hundred thousand dollars.

MANILA (AP) — A vicious late-season typhoon bore down on the Philippines Monday night, just a week after another lash of central Luzon killing eight, leaving thousands homeless and causing millions of dollars in property damage.

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Two racing cars collided and plunged into a crowd massed along the highway 45 miles west of here Sunday, killing nine persons and injuring five seriously.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican police investigated Monday to determine whether a Guatemalan diplomat was killed in a political murder or an auto-accident. The diplomat, Arnold Orantes, 25-year-old press attaché of Guatemala's embassy here and a close friend of President Carlos Castillo Armas, was shot to death when his car halted at a traffic light early Sunday.

TORONTO (AP) — Workers at the Ford Motor Co. of Canada's parts depot in suburban Etobicoke struck Monday, tying up the company's third and last manufacturing unit in Ontario.

Stabilization Service, Frank W. ImMasche, Washington, D. C., outlined provision of the national wool act, passed in the last Congress, to association members.

Production Incentive Told

Price on wool has been pegged at 40 cents, and an incentive program in the act provides for percentage payments from import duties on wool and wool manufacturers as a stimulus to produce more wool.

He advised producers that when they receive higher prices on wool, their incentive payments will be higher. The association, in a resolution, proposed to members that they seek the highest prices possible on their products.

Incentive payments will be made on bills of sale presented to county ASC offices, ImMasche said. The program goes into effect for wool production after Jan. 1, 1955, and sold after April 1, 1955. First payments will be received by farmers in the summer of 1956 after the end of the 1955 marketing year.

Johnson told delegates that an assessment of 2 cents per head for national promotion of lamb wool will not be asked this year because of the good condition of the association's treasury.

Red China Says Her Population Over 601 Million

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — Nationalist China's press Monday demanded prompt retaliation for the sinking of the 1,800-ton Nationalist destroyer escort Taiping by four Red Chinese torpedo boats.

The Taiping, a former U.S. warship transferred to the Nationalists in 1946, sank with guns blazing 215 miles north of Formosa at dawn Sunday.

Twenty-eight of her 180-man crew were missing. A rescue ship picked up the others.

No Americans were believed to have been aboard.

The sinking, Red China's biggest naval victory in the long battle with Chiang Kai-shek's forces, marked the Communists' first use of torpedo boats and was interpreted here as a stark warning of stronger Red measures to come.

An official newspaper, the Chung Hui Daily News, asserted that Soviet Russia is to blame for the sinking.

Russia, the newspaper said, turned over more than 40 torpedo boats to the Chinese Reds at Tsingtao, a North China port, several months ago.

One of the highlights of the public festival will be selection of a festival queen from among the girl students. Plans for other activities include a farmers' market featuring farm produce, home-made foodstuffs and handicrafts. Booths will offer a variety of games. Also scheduled are a white elephant bazaar, movies and refreshments.

Proceeds will go toward balancing the PTA budget for the year. One of the prospective projects for the PTA is purchase of lights for the school yard. Another is purchase of one or more record players for the school.

Portland Dailies Face Wage Increase Demand

PORTLAND (AP) — AFL Typographical Union employees of Portland dailies, the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian, voted Saturday to ask their international for permission to have a strike vote.

J. Jay Walton, president of the local, said the action was taken to back up the union's demands in contract negotiations. The present contract, which expired Sept. 15, provides for a weekly wage of \$109.50, he said. Walton said the union was asking a weekly increase of \$3.80.

Negotiators for the two newspapers reported they had offered a \$2.50 weekly increase, plus other benefits which in some cases would amount to 63 cents per week. They added that at the union's request they will resume negotiations Tuesday.

Morse Says He Will Run As Independent In '56

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore.), who has promised to vote to give Democrats control of the Senate next year, said Monday he intends to seek re-election in 1956 as an independent.

"It is my intention to run as an Independent," Morse said in a copyright interview with the magazine U. S. News and World Report.

"There is a group of Democrats in our state quite different from some Democrats in some other places. They are making a great fight against the reactionary Republican machine in Oregon, and if I could be convinced that the best hope of a sound, liberal cause would be to join forces with them, I would not hesitate to do it."

"However, that is not my present intention, but I shall always keep myself free to change my opinion. My present intention is to run as an independent."

Some weeks before this month's congressional elections, he announced he would vote with the Democrats on organization of the next Senate. Since they captured 48 Senate seats, that will provide the key 49th.
