

Name Similarity Is Embarrassing To Roseburg Man

A coincidental similarity in names has caused a local man some embarrassment as the result of a story in Monday's News-Review.

Karl James Doering, Roberts Mountain Road, is not the man questioned by city police in connection with the jailing of a second man on a juvenile delinquency charge. The man questioned and released has a similar name. He is Carl F. Doering, 25, Roseburg Auto Court, who was arrested and questioned.

Karl Doering is known in the community as a rodeo performer and photographer.

Carl Doering was released from custody of city police after he gave a statement Sunday.

Held on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a juvenile is Mervyn Collins, 21, Idley Rd. Box 574. Collins entered an innocent plea before Dist. Judge Warren A. Woodruff Tuesday morning. He was remanded to jail in lieu of \$250 bail.

He is accused of supplying a 16-year-old girl with liquor early Sunday morning. The arrest was made by city police.

Work Of Stanford Research Institute Told

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have worked mainly on electronic development, the speaker said. They have done research on the DC-7 antenna, colored television and the electronic factory of the future.

Workers in the physical science division have undertaken classified nuclear research, investigated coffee smells and defined the meaning of smog.

In the economics research division institute members have, for example, prepared a long range report for Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. The report (1953-1975) deals with the demands for lumber products.

Funds to carry out the research are derived in two ways: (1) contract research with industry or government, and (2) through an associate plan.

Forthcoming projects include a special seminar on solar energy to be held in Arizona in 10 months. Its purpose is to determine future source of power from the sun, Dowling said.

Any profit, he said, goes into non-profit institute projects. Forty-one have thus been completed. A recent project was economic appraisal of Oregon's mid-Willamette Valley. It will be available in one month.

Dowling attributed the institute's success to efficient management, evident need and the respect held by the west for Stanford University. He was introduced by Chamber secretary Harold Hickerson.

Douglas Co. Residents Buy \$96,404 In Bonds

Douglas County residents purchased \$96,404 worth of U. S. savings bonds in October, according to county chairman George Luoma.

It was an increase of \$18,123 over the same month in 1953, Luoma said. Sales of bonds in the county for the first 10 months of 1954 totaled \$730,360. The amount was \$147,135 over the previous year's similar period figure of \$583,225.

Sales of U. S. Treasury savings bonds increased considerably throughout the state last month, Luoma said. Figures from E. C. Sammons, chairman of the state savings bonds committee, showed more than 50 per cent increase in October 1954 over October 1953. The sum was \$3,499,472 compared with \$2,328,292.

Sales thus far in 1954 are up more than \$6,000,000, according to Sammons.

Science, Machinery Have Top Rolls In Douglas Co.

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The average monthly bill for the use of electrical energy will average under \$8.00.

Modern Powered Farm Machinery Scientific farming has brought about the use of powered farm machinery on the farms in Douglas county, which supplants the slow but efficient power supplied, years ago, by horses and mules. The manufacturers of farm equipment have advanced with this scientific progress of the farmers and are creating a new type of farm machinery, adaptable to use in regional areas. In many cases harvesters have supplanted the hand methods of harvesting crops which have made the harvests more efficient with the use of less hired labor.

There are today some 1,600 modern motor trucks used on the farms in this county for the transportation of farm products to market and general utility use. Also over 2,000 modern tractors supply the power for machinery, and heavy-duty industrial work done by Douglas county farmers, and almost every family has a late model automobile. There are more than one-half of the farms in the county that enjoy telephone service.

Better Shopping Conditions

Modern transportation facilities have made it possible for the farmers to make more regular trips for supplies, which means that the families are not forced to keep a large volume of goods in storage. The expenditures for operating expenses and maintenance are made with the suppliers in Roseburg, and the other trading centers in the county. Need for poultry and live stock, in an average year, costs almost \$2-million dollars and is distributed among all of the feed dealers in the valley. Gasoline, lubricants and oils in an average year will cost the Douglas county farmer approximately \$400 thousand dollars. Tractor and farm machinery repairs, seeds, fertilizer and other necessary farm supplies will cost close to one-million dollars every year, and hired labor will create an equal amount in agricultural payroll.

The fact that the annual farm income to the farmers living in Douglas county today, is double what it was two decades ago, should support the statement that scientific advancement, livability and the pride of farm ownership have had an influence of the stability of the agricultural structure of Douglas county today.

Airliner Ends Arctic Flight In 24 Hours

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Los Angeles in a fog, the sun was shining brightly at Kastrup Airport as the big airliner taxied up the field. Prince Knud of Denmark and other Danish dignitaries were on hand to welcome the 32 passengers and crew of 10 on the flight.

Li. Gov. Harold G. Powers of California was the first to leave the plane. He was followed by actor Jean Hersholt, the only Danish-born passenger; movie star Walter Pidgeon, who was greeted with the question: "How is Marilyn Monroe?" and Los Angeles Mayor Norris Poulson, who held up a large sign "Los Angeles City Limits."

The Royal Viking made the first leg of its run, the 1,634 miles from Los Angeles to Winnipeg, in 5 hours and 43 minutes. Then it skipped 1,984 miles over the bleak Canada northlands and Hudson Bay to Greenland in 7 hours and 34 minutes.

Landing at Blue West 8 airfield—where a U. S. Air Force group is stationed—the plane was greeted by a crowd of American airmen in fur parkas.

It was 10 above zero on the Greenland field and the Southern Californians on the plane shivered. Since Greenland belongs to Denmark, a toast was drunk to SAS—in French champagne.

The last and longest leg of the flight—the 2,162 miles from Blue West 8 to Copenhagen took 7 hours and 22 minutes.

Spilled Lumber Halts Traffic On Tiller Road

A spilled load of 2 by 4s disrupted traffic on the road between Canyonville and Tiller Monday evening.

The accident occurred about 8 p.m. four miles east of Days Creek, according to News-Review Correspondent Jean Yoder. The road was cleared about midnight, she said.

Escape from the cab of the truck was made by the driver by his breaking the windshield, Mrs. Yoder was told. He was apparently uninjured.

Roberts Creek Will Again Consider Merger

The move stems from a move to eliminate a problem in Roberts Creek district: The district has no place to send its high school students. Proposals to consolidate with two other adjoining districts, Roseburg and Glide, have met defeat.
