History Sought On Wolf Creek Boy Scout Camp

Adult Boy Scout leaders in the Douglas Fir District are seeking information on the history and past events of the Wolf Creek camp, and have appealed for help.

Walt Smith, district field executive, said information is needed to build up a tradition at the camp, which is now under renovation.

So far, it's known that the camp is one of the few in the United States devoted to the Boy Scouts of America by Congress. That was done in 1928. The camp was center of many activities in subsequent years, but has fallen from use in the past few years.

Smith asked that information be passed along to Charles S. Collins, district director, at the County Parks Dept. in the courthouse annex.

Southern Cal., Denmark Flight Is Successful

LOS ANGELES — Scandinavian travelers who participated in establishment of one-day air service between Southern California and Denmark prepared Wednesday for three days of civic hospitality.

The Scandinavian Airlines System plane, Helge Viking, brought Prince Axel of Denmark, Prime Ministers Hans Hedtoft, Oscar Torp and Tage Erlander of Denmark, Norway and Sweden, respectively, and newsmen from Copenhagen to Los Angeles in 27 hours, 10 minutes, arriving Tuesday afternoon.

A sister ship, the Royal Viking, carried Lt. Gov. Harold J. Powers of California, Mayor Norris Poulson of Los Angeles, actors Jean Hersholt and Walter Pidgeon and newsmen from Los Angeles to Copenhagen in 23 hours, 56 minutes, landing early Tuesday.

Deducting time for stops in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and in Greenland, the westbound flying time was 24 hours, 10 minutes and the eastbound, 23 hours, 56 minutes. Headwinds will consistently make the westbound flights longer than the eastbound.

Prince Axel commented on arrival that within six months the flights "will become a much-needed routine service."

Increased Road Moneys Needed

PORTLAND — Cities and counties throughout the nation may have to increase road expenditures by 81 per cent under President Eisenhower's multi-million dollar highway overhauling program, the League of Oregon Cities was told Tuesday.

Gov. Paul Patterson, a member of the governors' advisory committee on the program, said the federal government plans to spend \$50 to \$60 million dollars yearly for first-line state highways with the states matching that amount. An expenditure of 2 1/2 billion a year for interstate highways also is proposed, Patterson said.

Europe Behind U. S. In Salesmanship Ability

Merchandising in Europe generally is behind that in America but American businessmen still have a long way to go before they offer good service to the public, according to a former University of Oregon and Oregon State College business administration professor.

Dr. Neuvel H. Comish, who now heads his own business survey firm, spoke Tuesday noon to Roseburg Kiwanis Club in the Umpqua Hotel. He is conducting a three-evening clinic in salesmanship here, ending Thursday night.

Comish said Europeans are lax in selling methods, and have superiority to their American business counterparts only in window displays. At the same time, he declared, lazy salesmen here are hurting their employers' businesses.

Dollars Buying Human Souls, Says Y Leader

Dr. Robert F. Anderson, Salem YMCA director, told YMCA workshop members Tuesday night that their World Alliance dollars were buying "not tractors, or anything so material, but human souls."

Dr. Anderson, accompanied by Carl Greider, Salem Y membership director, spoke to the group about his journeys to European YMCA camps in 1952.

Greider, permanently blinded by a Jap sniper's bullet during World War II, is active in YMCA work in Salem. He was a Y physical instructor before the war. He gave the background of the Y movement, urging his listeners to do all they could to see that the program of the young people of the area.

Dr. Anderson showed a 10-minute film of his travels in the western zone of Germany, narrating the film himself. The film showed scenes in YMCA camps which have been set up to aid refugees from East Germany.

Following Dr. Anderson's talk, the members broke up into committees to discuss ways and means of better coordinating and utilizing the local YMCA program.

Watkins' Fiery Speech Makes Print On Senate

the dramatic events of Tuesday, Wednesday's Senate session got off to a slow start. It took half an hour and two rollcalls to assemble the 49 senators necessary to conduct business, and get on with the routine matters preceding censure debate.

Bennett's announcement followed an emotional appeal from the chairman of the special censure committee, Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), who asked his colleagues what they were going to do about McCarthy's statement that the Communist party had extended "its tentacles" into the Senate itself.

An indignant Watkins denounced as a "hit-and-run speech" McCarthy's accusation that the special committee had acted as an "unwitting handmaiden" of the Communist party in recommending censure. He said the Senate should make this a third count against McCarthy.

"It was the Senate who called upon us to perform this duty," said the 67-year-old Watkins, a man spare in speech and manner. "Therefore I ask what is going to be done about it?"

"How can the Senate of the United States hold up its head among other free deliberative bodies of the world unless it does something about this matter?"

Asked whether there was any discussion of how the President will handle foreign policy consultation with the Democrats, Wiley replied:

"The President says there will be absolute cooperation and collaboration."

At the Capitol Vice President Nixon told reporters he left the meeting before questioning started, so he could preside over the Senate.

But he said he heard the remarks of the President and Secretary of State Dulles, and commented they gave "an extremely comprehensive picture of our foreign and defensive policy in all areas of the world."

"Nothing was held back," Nixon said. Dulles commented upon leaving the White House, "It was a very good meeting."
