TOKYO (AP) — Socialist Party leaders from six Asian nations Tuesday came out against "economic aid with militaristic strings." The sentiment was expressed in the first session of the second Asian Socialist conference.

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Railroad Labor Dispute To Go To Mediators

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A labor dispute between the Southern Pacific Railroad and locomotive engineers employed on its Pacific System will go before the National Mediation Service.

That has been announced by Arthur F. Kummer, assistant grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. He said no strike can be called while NMS maintains jurisdiction.

Earlier Monday night, Brotherhood headquarters in Cleveland announced a strike authorization had been voted by more than 97 per cent of about 2,800 engineers employed by Southern Pacific.

Kummer said the strike vote was taken after the road refused to consider changes in working conditions for engineers and made a counter proposal that would "destroy working conditions which have been enjoyed for many years by the engineers."

A walkout, if called, would affect the Pacific System of the SP, including San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Ogden, Tumacacari, N. M.; and El Paso, Texas. Passenger trains such as the City of San Francisco on the Overland route and the Golden State Limited on the Sunset Route would be hit.

Board Of Control Sticks To Site

SALEM (AP) — The State Board of Control stuck Tuesday to its original recommendation that the state buy the 400-acre Williams and Hart ranch, near St. Paul, as the site of the new state reformatory.

It will submit the recommendation again to the State Emergency Board, which decided 10 days ago that the Board of Control should reconsider its decision.

The Emergency Board indicated it wants a 430-acre site near Gervais, known as the Kippinger properties, which would cost \$174,000. The site near St. Paul would be \$104,000 less.

While the Board of Control is supposed to choose the site, the Emergency Board has power to veto any decision.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson, chairman of the board, said the two sites are equal, and that the Board of Control couldn't justify spending the extra sum for the Gervais site.

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Oregon Forest Fire Season Ended Monday

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's forest fire season ended Monday, and burning permits are no longer needed, Gov. Paul L. Patterson announced.

In making his proclamation, the governor praised citizens, forestry organizations and loggers for making the fire loss this year the second smallest on record. The smallest was in 1913.

The fire season begins April 1 of each year, and ends when the governor decides the fire danger is over.

CRASH KILLS SEVEN

LILLINGTON, N.C. (AP) — Two automobiles collided at high speed on a highway near here early Tuesday and killed seven persons.

Two were seriously injured. Highway Patrolman R. B. Leonard said a car driven by Sgt. Eugene F. Holder, 24, of Ft. Bragg collided with one driven by William Carl Johnson, 33, of Lillington and killed Holder and six of eight passengers in the Johnson car.
