

J. Roosevelt's Wife Complains About Prowler

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Rep. Elect James Roosevelt's estranged wife told police Wednesday of a prowler being at her windows at least twice. She expressed fear for the safety of the couple's three children.

Officers said they had placed her house under surveillance.

Mrs. Romelle Roosevelt, 37, said she and the children, James Jr., 8; Michael, 7, and Anna Eleanor, 6, live alone in the home.

She said a next-door neighbor, Mrs. W. D. Rankin, told her of seeing a man standing in the rain at 1:30 a. m. last Thursday, peering into a side window of Mrs. Roosevelt's home. The man wore slacks and a light sport coat, Mrs. Rankin said.

Later that day the two women found a man's footprints under the living room window.

Monday, Mrs. Roosevelt told police, she found additional strange footprints in the flower beds at the rear of the house.

Mrs. Roosevelt also reported seeing a man sitting in an automobile in front of her home last Friday afternoon. She jotted down the license number, and detectives told her they agreed on a private settlement and that he would pay \$1,825 a month for support of her and the children.

Letters Running Against Censure Of Sen. McCarthy

WASHINGTON (AP)—By letter, telegram and postcard, senators are being advised how to vote on the bitterly contested issue of whether to censure Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

A check with a number of senators on both sides of the controversy, as well as with others who have not announced a vote, brought reports that their mail has been running heavily against censure. There were some exceptions, however.

Some senators reported an unusually heavy volume of mail, but others said they have been getting far less than they expected.

In the absence of McCarthy, who went to a hospital yesterday with an injured elbow, his secretary said she was not authorized to report on his mail.

An aide of Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), chairman of the special bipartisan committee that recommended McCarthy be censured, said Watkins has been receiving as many as 750 to 1,000 letters and telegrams a day.

In the first week of debate, he said, this mail was about 8-1 for McCarthy, but that at the start of this week the pro-McCarthy ratio had dropped to 4-1 or 5-1.

pose rooms in the new elementary schools. (4) 1, 2 and 3 plus facilities for science, music, art, shop, hot-lunch, home-making and guidance.

By unanimous vote they approved adoption of a paid 10-day sick leave policy for regularly certified and contracted instructors in the district.

Board members also granted permission for use of information relating to the purpose of assisting the pupil, teacher and administration in the educational process of the pupil; such use to be limited to authorized persons.

Under old business, they unanimously refused to grant a request for \$250 in lieu of transportation by the parents of a pupil living beyond the school bus route.

The also appointed Warren Engdahl a member of the budget board and accepted an invitation from Rose PTA to hold their regular Jan. 12 meeting at the school.

Drunken Driving Case Appealed By Defendant

A 30-year-old Roseburg man Wednesday appealed his municipal court jury conviction on a drunken driving charge after Municipal Judge Randolph Slocum recommended that his driver's license be suspended for life.

It was the third offense for Ernest Earl Reson, 1915 Myrtle Ave.

Slocum also fined Reson \$200 and sentenced him to 10 days in the county jail. After the convicted man's appeal, the judge set bail at \$350.

Reson was arrested by Roseburg police on Stephens Street Oct. 30. Officers reported he was blowing his car's horn, and when asked why he had been blowing the horn, Reson replied to move cars ahead of him.

There were no other cars in front of his, police pointed out.

ary schools. The vote was no by 50 percent, yes by 53 percent, and no opinion was registered by 11 percent.

Completion of facilities to provide art in the two junior high schools in the district was spanked harder. 58 percent said no, 31 percent said yes and 11 percent voiced no opinion.

The tie vote came with the question of providing an instrumental and vocal music program at the two junior high schools. Forty-two percent voted yes, the same percentage voted no. Sixteen percent expressed no opinion.

A percentage vote on the remaining issues went as follows: Would you support a building program that would eliminate transporting elementary pupils out of areas where they could walk to school? Yes, 54; no, 38; no opinion 8. In addition to classrooms will you support building to make possible the following programs: hot lunch program, yes, 58; no, 38; no opinion, 4; help for handicapped children, yes, 72; no, 27; no opinion, 5; physical education, yes, 48; no, 46; no opinion 6; small health room, yes, 48; no, 45; no opinion, 7.

Forty-seven percent favored support of a multipurpose room to be used for a lunch room, a physical education room and auditorium. Forty-six percent voted no, and 7 percent voiced no opinion.

The fifth question in the survey asked: will you support a completion of facilities in the two junior high schools of the district to provide for: (different facilities were then listed). The answers are given in percentages. Manual arts, yes, 53; no, 41; no opinion, 6; home making, yes, 53; no, 42; no opinion, 5; at Joseph Lane—a gymnasium, yes, 50; no, 44; no opinion, 6; at Joseph Lane—science rooms, yes, 50; no, 39; no opinion, 11.

At Joseph Lane—a kitchen to prepare hot lunches, yes, 56; no, 39; no opinion, 5; and at Joseph Lane—completion of playground, yes, 63; no, 29; no opinion, 8.

The voters penned several heartfelt notes on the postal card. One said, "I would support the sale or trade of the present junior high school so as to get it out of downtown. Another would 'vote according to the needs and not the wants when the time comes.'"

One called for "less office help, fewer superintendent managers, district owned buses." Many believed too great an emphasis was placed on sports. Others called for a sales tax for educational purposes. One was "against anything that will raise my taxes."

"I am willing to support any and all measures to better the schools," was the comment of a citizen. Another asked for more time to study the program.

Green Sanitary District Plans Said Progressing

Mrs. Jack Lucas, spokesman for the presently-forming Green Sanitary District, reports that over half the money for the initial survey has been collected already.

She told Green correspondent Mary Weikum that half of the proposed district still has to be contacted.

Archie Rice, engineer for the firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield of Corvallis, said it would take at least two years from the time of such a survey before the sewage disposal unit could be put into working condition.

An engineer from the Oregon State Board of Health prompted the moving spirits of the district to greater effort by stating that a sewage disposal plant in the vicinity would be necessary. He said the continued growth and bolstered property values depended on such a plant.

Committee members of the proposed district met Wednesday night to null the immediate work of financing the survey.

National Guard Inspection Set For November 30

Annual federal inspection for Roseburg's National Guard company is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 30 at the Roseburg Armory.

Inspecting the local unit, Co. D, 186 Inf. Reg., will be Lt. Col. Harwell T. Bynum, assistant IG, Sixth Army. He will conduct the check-up in afternoon and evening phases.

Public attendance has been cordially invited to the evening ceremonies by First Lt. Horace J. Pendergrass, commanding officer of Co. D.

Ceremonies will begin at 8 p. m. with individual inspection of the 100-man unit in ranks immediately following roll call. Troops will appear in dress uniform bearing individual weapons.

The evening's second hour of inspection will be devoted to the normal training schedule, modified to allow for additional individual inspection.

During both hours of the evening phase, the inspector will test selected individuals orally to determine the proficiency of the unit in subjects covered in the unit's schedule during the year.

The IG will also hold a complaint period when personnel are free to present grievances to him.

Afternoon phase of the inspection will consist of a complete check and appraisal of armory facilities and company equipment. Supply and administration records will be examined as well as transportation facilities, armory storage rooms and the indoor target range.

Ship Believed Out Of Danger In Stormy Seas

SEATTLE (AP)—Subsiding though still strong winds and arrival of a Canadian weather ship allayed fears Thursday for the spill-deck freighter P & T Trader and her 48-man crew.

The 7,058-ton freighter, traveling in ballast from Yokohama to Yakima Bay, Ore., was reached by the St. Catherine's at 10 p. m. Wednesday night, approximately 17 hours after the Trader reported a 15-foot crack had opened down its port side while 800 miles off the Washington coast.

She was hove to in a 45 mile an hour wind in no immediate danger when the Canadian ship arrived. Capt. D. E. Wilson of San Francisco reported he felt his ship could ride it out.

Iron braces have been welded across the crack and chains and cables are being used to strengthen the cracked deck.

Meanwhile, however, the weather ship is standing by and two United States Coast Guard cutters, the Storis and Klamath are en route to the scene.

The Storis, from Southeastern Alaska, is expected to reach the Trader about midnight Thursday.

Chamber Views Free Enterprise Special Movie

Some 25 persons attending a hurriedly-called, special Chamber of Commerce meeting Wednesday noon viewed a new film entitled "It's Everybody's Business." The group included representatives of schools, businesses and professional services.

The animated, "cartoon motion picture they saw was prepared this year by the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Co. at the request of the National Chamber of Commerce. It told, in 22 minutes, the story of free enterprise.

Showing the film was Harry Lintz, Pacific Northwest manager of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. Lintz gave the first showing of the picture nationally in Vernonia about three months ago.

He preceded the picture showing with a flannel board presentation designed to help employers tell the story of their business to employees and others.

"Business people believe in free enterprise, but haven't explained the system adequately. This lack of explanation has ruined free enterprise in many countries," Lintz said. He termed the U.S.A. "an island in a sea of socialism," and added that unless the free enterprise system is made known to all it could easily break down.

The Chamber executive stressed teamwork between labor and management.

Following the film a brief discussion concerning the feasibility of the local Chamber purchasing a copy of the film took place. The picture, if purchased, would be made available to groups in the county wishing to view it.

Lintz was introduced by Wayne Crooch, president of the local Chamber of Commerce.
