Farm Bureau Session Hears New Ag. Head

MEDFORD (AP) — The Oregon Farm Bureau Federation began considering resolutions at the annual convention here Friday.

Delegates heard words of praise Thursday from James Short of Redmond, new agriculture director, in his first speech since taking office.

He said he "strongly supports" Farm Bureau policies and leadership.

"I hope to find authority to tie together promotional activities of commodity groups and farm organizations into a unified program to improve the lot of our farmers."

The repeal of state milk control drew the attention of E. W. Tiedman, Chicago, director of the dairy department of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

When farmers become dependent on a government agency such as the state milk board, "sooner or later the roof will fall in on us," he said.

"If the repeal of the milk control law, on which the dairy industry in Oregon has been leaning for a long time, wakes up dairymen to the necessity of building their own co-operative organizations, then the cost may be well worth it," he said.

Oregon membership in the Farm Bureau increased nearly 1,000 to a new high of 7,036 in the past year, Secretary George Dewey reported.

Suggested School Building Program Cost Estimated To Be \$306,000 To \$877,000

The suggested immediate building program in the Roseburg District would cost somewhere between \$306,000 and \$877,000, according to figures now under study by the Roseburg School Board.

Estimates of cost were submitted to the school board for consideration Wednesday night by Supt. M. C. Deller, who pointed

out the need for immediate building expansion in the district. Deller also has presented a five-alternative program for study by the board.

In its simplest form, the building recommendations call for construction of two six-room elementary schools, to be located in East Roseburg and in Huerfano North

Roseburg.

The buildings would be stripped of everything but classroom space. The cost would jump to \$186,000 in East Roseburg and \$183,000 at the other site.

The next plan calls for addition of physical education facilities at Joseph Lane Junior High School. No specific cost has been set on this, it having been lumped with other additions to the school, which would be below. The PE project would be in addition to the building of the two elementary schools.

The third alternate would provide multipurpose rooms at the two proposed schools. Again no specific figure was set, but was lumped with costs of kitchens.

The fourth proposal would include: Construction of the two grade schools, addition of PE at Joseph Lane, multipurpose rooms at the two schools and completion of standard facilities in the two junior high schools to make their program "comparable" with other junior highs in Oregon.

That would include an outlay of \$300,000 for physical education activity and dressing rooms, music,

art, shop and homemaking rooms at Joseph Lane, \$25,000 for equipment at the same school, \$38,000 for building alterations and equipment at Central Junior High School and \$15,000 for administrative and supervisory space in the Central Junior High building.

The fifth proposal would be for hot lunch programs at the two elementary schools, plus the programs contained in the first four proposals.

Total cost, should all be recommended and approved by the public, would come to \$747,000.

An added need, according to the suggestions, is a six-classroom elementary school in Green. Cost would be \$130,000, which would include site and sanitation. No provision is made in the figures for multipurpose room or kitchen.

Deller said any such building program would have to be financed through a bond issue.

In the event of a \$306,000 issue, the term of the bonds would be 20 years. Figured at 4 per cent, the amortization schedule would be an estimated \$27,540 for the first year, being reduced to \$15,912 in the year of retirement, 1974.

With the approval of an \$877,000 issue, again on a 20-year schedule at 4 per cent interest, it is estimated that first year payment would be \$78,930, decreasing to \$45,604 in 1974.

City's Work Program Ends With Much Accomplished

The city of Roseburg's summer construction program, delayed in its start because of failures in the spring budget elections, finished with a good record in October, according to City Manager George Farrell.

Farrell, in his monthly report to the city council, said \$200,000 worth of work on streets and sewers was finished during the summer. In addition, several intersections were widened to permit smoother and faster traffic flow. They were at Parrott and Oak, Douglas and Fowler, Chadwick and Lane, and Jackson and Mosher.

Plans for next year include storm sewer expansion and street widening, both of which will be

extended to the maximum permitted by available funds.

In the street program, Farrell stated, priority will be given on the basis of traffic needs and requirements.

In the storm sewer extension program, no installations or extensions will be made except at such locations and grades as will be an integral part of a complete system.

In programming construction activity, he said, the city expects to maintain a program which will permit a regular and uniform amount of construction each year.

"The city manager now is studying sanitary sewer plans as submitted by engineers, who made recommendations on the basis of city council orders. The plans are to be submitted to a citizens committee appointed by Mayor Percy Croft, and to the City Planning Commission for study and approval. Then they will be turned over for action by the city council and public."

The plans, Farrell explained, are comprehensive and involve many items of vital interest to the people of Roseburg. The city is planning a program of public relations to acquaint citizens with content of the report.

The report was delivered after the city council had authorized a city-wide survey on sanitation needs.

When asked if delay in the Senate's debate over possible censuring of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy would affect his plans, Sen. Cordon said "It doesn't change my plans because I have no plans."

Dave O'Hara, state elections division chief, told the AP that Cordon never will be notified of election results until the election. Certificates of election are sent to winners, he said.

Official tabulations show Neuberger received 285,775 votes and Cordon received 283,313 votes. Cordon carried 26 of Oregon's 36 counties. Neuberger's margin of victory was largely attributed to populous Multnomah County.

Ed Boehnke of Eugene, state GOP chairman, told the Associated Press he believes a recount demand is unlikely.

"In my 30 years in Oregon I have never heard of anyone monkeying with the ballots," he said. "A recount probably would disclose small inaccuracies but I don't think any wilful manipulation by boards or election officers would be discovered."

Tiller-Trail Road Job Let To J. C. Compton

PORTLAND (AP) — The Bureau of Public Roads awarded a \$69,089 contract to the J. C. Compton Co., McMinnville, Thursday to prepare bituminous paving for 3.9 miles of the Tiller-Trail Road in the Umpqua forest southeast of Roseburg.

Bids also were called for grading 10.1 miles of the Galice Creek Road, about 20 miles northeast of Grants Pass. Bids for that logging road will be opened here Dec. 2.

Reedsport School Completion Now Being Rushed

Completion of the Dist. 105-C (Reedsport) new elementary school was being rushed this week to alleviate overcrowding in the one school now serving students.

Supt. Fred Pilling said Thursday that Highland School was now completely roofed. Most of the glass skylights were in. He anticipated the move into the new institution would take place shortly after the first of the year.

Meanwhile, school personnel worked long hours to make old quarters serve the 704 enrolled students until the move is made.

Monday a record number of students were fed in the Pioneer school cafeteria during the usual lunch period. Supt. Pilling said 535 lunches were served. Previous daily lunch counts have been approximately 500.

Both the cafeteria size and facilities are inadequate to host the number, he said. To alleviate the situation youngsters from five classrooms are being fed daily in their classrooms.

Particular overcrowding is noted in primary department classrooms, the principal commented, where 283 students are enrolled. Instructors in larger rooms have an overload, he said, because the basement rooms are substandard.

Funeral services are scheduled at 1:30 p.m. Saturday for a Drain man who came to Oregon by covered wagon in 1875.

Joe Cellars, a resident of Drain and north Douglas County for 79 years, died Wednesday at the age of 82. He was born at Tarkio, Mo., March 8, 1872, and went to Drain from Missouri with his family at the age of 3, completing the last leg of a trip by covered wagon from San Francisco.

On July 4, 1897, he was married to Lona Sanders at Drain. She survives him. He had been a farmer and timber worker during his active years, and was a member of the Woodmen of the World at Yoncalla.

Besides his wife, he is survived by six sons, William of Drain, Montgomery of Seattle, Kyle of San Mateo, Calif., Elbert of Glendale, Fred of Fern Ridge, James of Yoncalla; four daughters, Mrs. Miss Elizabeth Cellars of Eugene, Mrs. Byrl Watson of Umatilla, Mrs. Sylvia Mattoon of Drain; two brothers, Albert Cellars of Buffalo, Wyo., Ben Cellars of Springfield; three sisters, Mrs. Marie Kinch of Drain, Mrs. Ella Applegate of Ashland, Mrs. Besse Dowdy of Spearfish, S.D.; 19 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren.

Petitions for an election to consider consolidation of Robert's Creek and Myrtle Creek school districts will soon be circulated in the Myrtle Creek district.

The decision came at a meeting Thursday night at the Robert's Creek school.

Myrtle Creek Supt. Al Neel, three board members and the district clerk were on hand to get an opinion on the matter from the Robert's Creek board.

The Robert's Creek board, headed by Mrs. Pearl Kruse, signified willingness to go ahead with a consolidation vote in the hope that voters of both districts will approve. After a petition is completed in the Myrtle Creek district, the county boundary board will have to set an election date.

Recent proposals to consolidate the small district southeast of Roseburg with the Glide or Roseburg districts have been turned down. In one vote, Roseburg voters approved, but Robert's Creek residents did not. In another, Robert's Creek voters approved, but Glide's voters said "no."

No Negligence Found In Death Of George Trent

A coroner's jury Thursday night found no negligence involved in the death Tuesday of George Trent, 62, Melrose, who swallowed a bone.

Coroner L. L. Powers said the six-man jury returned a verdict that death resulted when Trent swallowed a duck bone which lodged in his throat. The injury caused a hemorrhage and death followed, Powers said.

The verdict was given after an autopsy was performed earlier in the evening by a Eugene doctor. Relatives of the dead man had requested an autopsy and inquest, Powers said.

The coroner said his jury was made up of Nobel Goettel, Fred Herman, A. A. Wilder, John Runyan, Emil Ramberg and George Singleton.

Trent died Tuesday afternoon soon after returning home from Roseburg where a physician had removed the bone, first reported as a chicken bone. Soon after reaching home, Trent had a coughing attack and died before an ambulance arrived, Powers said.

It was first believed death came when Trent's breathing was cut off through swelling of his neck. The bone became lodged in his throat that morning, but Trent had gone to work that day. He was an employee of the Douglas County Road Dept.

Funeral services were scheduled at 2 p.m. today at The Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home.

GLIDE MAN INJURED

Claude John Edwards, 44, Glide, was taken to Douglas Community Hospital Thursday afternoon with back injuries after a tree limb fell on him. The accident occurred on Susan Creek while he was working for Cascade Construction Co.

Engineer Cites Sanitation Need In Fringe Areas

Sanitation in fringe areas is the number one problem today of the Oregon Sanitary Authority, according to Curtis M. Everts Jr., engineer for the State Board of Health, and secretary of the authority.

Everts spoke Thursday to the Roseburg Lions Club, outlining the history of early attempts at sanitation and long strides taken in Oregon toward water and food purification and disposal of sewage.

Fringe area population increases, without provision for proper sewage disposal, presents a tremendous challenge to a handful of state and county sanitarians in an effort to reduce health hazards, said Everts.

Oregon cities have spent some \$35 million dollars, plus another \$29 million by private industries toward proper sewage disposal methods, and another \$10 million needs to be spent, said Everts. An equal amount has been spent to bring pure water to cities.

Not only is health concerned with proper sanitation, but conservation of fish and wildlife, restoration of recreation facilities, and more important, protection of watersheds and underground flows. Water consumption is on the increase per person from 70 gallons per day to 140 now and an estimated 160 gallons in 1975, said Everts.

New communicable diseases, protection from atomic reactors, seen in the near future and air pollution control are other problems for study of sanitarians, said Everts.

Classification Of Land Hearing Slated Tuesday

SALEM (AP) — Classification of 330,000 acres of Douglas County forest lands will be considered at a hearing at the Roseburg post-office at 10 a. m. Tuesday.

The hearing will be before the Douglas County Forest Land Classification Committee, of which Elton Jackson is chairman.

No forest patrol assessments on these lands have ever been paid, the State Forestry Department said.

Timber-growing lands pay the regular forest patrol rate, while grazing lands in forests pay a maximum of 5 cents an acre.
