Wet and cloudy weather prevailed over broad areas of the country Thursday but fairly mild November temperatures were in prospect for most sections.

Light rain or drizzle fell in areas from the Appalachians eastward to the Atlantic Coast. Showers or light rain extended over parts of the middle Mississippi Valley and the Northern Great Lakes region.

Skies were cloudy in the Pacific Northwest eastward across sections of the Northern Rockies. Light rain fell in Northwestern Oregon and Western Washington while snow was reported in higher elevations in Montana. A fall of six inches was reported in Mullen Pass.

The cooler air from Canada spread over the Midwest but temperatures still were above normal. However, some of the cool air dipped as far south as the Texas Panhandle. Wednesday's high of 60 at Amarillo compared to 80 on Tuesday.

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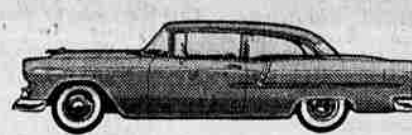
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
