## 33 Diet Members Bolt Yoshida's Cabinet In Japan

TOKYO (AP) — Thirty-three members of the Diet bolted Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's Liberal Party and a cabinet minister resigned Monday in a mounting drive to pressure the old prime minister to retire.

Masazumi Ando, who angrily resigned as minister of state in Yoshida's cabinet, and nine other Liberals announced they formally would quit the government party Tuesday.

Later Monday, the newspaper Asahi said Yoshida had dispatched a letter to his Liberal Party leaders asking them to discuss without prejudice what he should do in the political crisis.

The mass bolt could mean Liberal Party leaders had failed in efforts to persuade the 76-year-old premier to step down in the interest of maintaining conservative unity.

The dissident Liberals plan to join members of Japan's other conservative party — the Progressives — in forming a new anti-Yoshida Tory bloc later this week.

## Federal Highway Funds Said Almost Doubled

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Federal funds available to the states on a matching basis for highway construction were almost doubled by the federal highways act of 1954, the author of the act said Monday.

Rep. McGregor (R-Ohio) headed a seven-man group of congressmen making a four-day inspection trip of Florida's public roads.

McGregor said that under the highways act, all the money produced by the two-cent per gallon federal tax on gasoline would be made available to the states on a dollar for dollar matching basis.

The tax is expected to produce \$65 million dollars.

McGregor said his group, made up of members of the House Committee on Public Works, would wind up its inspections here by Thursday. Included were Reps. Mack (R-Wash.) and Angell (R-Ore.).

## Andre Vishinsky Dies Of Heart Attack Today

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mat was indisposed was made in the U.N. Political Committee by A. A. Sobolev of the Soviet delegation.

Lodge said he called an interpreter who told him Vishinsky was ill and Lodge said he inquired if there was anything he could do. He thanked him but said there was nothing. Then came the news of the death.

Sobolev stood at his chair after the meeting was adjourned and a line of delegates formed to extend their condolences. Some of the Soviet representatives were wiping their eyes as they left the committee chamber and appeared to be stunned by the news.

Word of the death of Vishinsky, as famed today for his blistering oratory as he was in the 1930s as Stalin's blood purge prosecutor, spread quickly throughout the United Nations.

While regular sessions of the U.N. were adjourned out of respect, the General Assembly arranged to meet Monday afternoon in tribute to the Soviet delegate.

Once a member of the right wing Russia's revolutionaries, a faction hated by the Bolsheviks, Vishinsky fitted himself to the Bolshevik majority-line and never deviated from the day he was accepted into the Communist Party more than three decades ago.

Vishinsky rose to fame as state prosecutor with a slashing, violent prosecution of old Bolshevik leaders in the Stalin blood purge of the middle 1930s. He went on to higher things, winding up as foreign minister.

The mishap occurred about seven miles from Highway 38.

Police, first-aid volunteers from the Reedsport Fire Dept. and passers-by worked until late in the afternoon at the huge task of bringing the injured and bodies of the victims up the side of the steep roadside bluff.

Police gave particular credit to the firemen, Cal Willis of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission and Kenneth Townsend, Reedsport, a reserve deputy, in aiding Unger Ambulance Service and the fire department removed the injured to Keizer Memorial Hospital, North Bend.

## First Highway Postoffice Due In City Today

Roseburg's first highway postoffice was to roll into town today. Postmaster Clyde Carstens said the mail-carrying truck from Portland was to arrive in Roseburg at 3:35 p.m. It left Portland at 7:55 a.m.

He said a number of railway mail cars are being withdrawn from trains. The highway postoffices are being substituted. They serve the same purpose as the railway mail cars. Clerks are able to sort letters while the truck is in motion.

As a result of the changeover to trucks on the Roseburg run from Portland, a star route from Eugene to Canyonville is being discontinued. Mail on this route has been arriving at Roseburg with first class mail at 1:30 p.m. in time for delivery on the second business district trip of the day by city carriers. Since the highway postoffice truck will not arrive until 3:35, this mail will no longer arrive in time for delivery the same afternoon.

Carstens said accommodations for parking the postoffice trucks will be cramped until a new driveway is constructed on the east side of the Roseburg Postoffice building. Todd Building Co. of Roseburg is expected to complete the job in about a month.

The experiment of transporting first-class mails by air which started today on the Pacific Coast will not directly affect Roseburg, according to Carstens. He said no material benefit would be derived because of present flight connections into Roseburg. Elsewhere on the coast, first-class letters prepaid at the three-cent rate will be carried on a "space available" basis between major cities.

## Mendes-France Willing To Hold Big 4 Meeting

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — French Premier Pierre Mendes-France expressed the willingness Monday to hold a Big Four meeting in Paris next May — after ratification of the London and Paris agreements.

In an address to the 60-nation U. N. General Assembly, the French leader declared firmly that he was opposed to any meeting between East and West until the Paris and London agreements are ratified.

He said, however, that after the agreements are approved France would be ready to take the initiative in organizing the Big Four conference, which Russia has been pressing for.

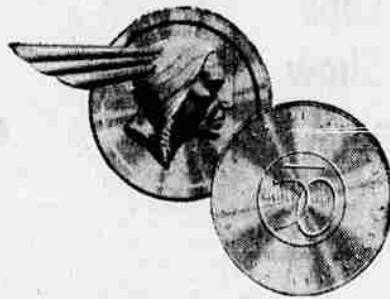
"Let us avoid a war of nerves," he said, "let us prepare in calm. Between now and May, we shall have to do everything to create a climate of confidence."

The London and Paris accords, providing for freeing and rearming West Germany, were submitted for ratification in treaty form to the French parliament Nov. 3. Mendes-France has asked for a vote by Dec. 17.

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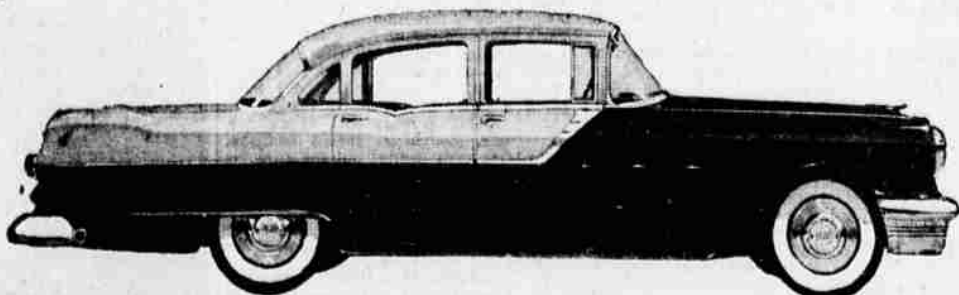
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
