A 20-year-old girl who has been in Roseburg just three weeks is working today. And she has attested to the power of the press as the result of a recent letter to the editor from her published in the News-Review.

The young woman, Mrs. James Davis, went to work in the Coffee Cup Restaurant the night her letter to the editor appeared in the newspaper.

The poignant letter had asked for employment after her husband had been sent to the county jail "indefinitely." She began her letter by saying "I am writing this letter in desperation."

She explained that she had no money with which to advertise because of the turn of events which had left her stranded. She said she had made forays around the city looking for work, but to no avail. Finally, she turned to the News-Review.

Pridefully, she said she would take any kind of employment.

Today, she said she began receiving calls immediately, and has been receiving many since, mostly for baby sitting jobs. She accepted the waitress job the day her letter appeared in print.

Bus Is Purchased By School Board At Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek School Board approved the purchase Wednesday evening of a Kenworth 73-passenger pusher-type school bus for the Myrtle Creek district at a cost of \$12,500. Delivery will be made in about a week.

Other bids were: Carpenter \$11,750, Superior 11,745, White \$14,321.52. The board told Myrtle Creek Correspondent Ruth M. Evans the Kenworth bid was accepted because the school has two similar buses in operation at the present time and officials are satisfied with their performance. Service and parts are obtainable on the west coast, they said.

Included in the business of the evening was the announcement that petitions are being circulated for the election on the consolidation of Myrtle Creek and Roberts Creek School districts. One hundred signatures are required. The board stated that information had been requested as to whether the Roberts Creek school would be closed, in the event the consolidation is approved, forcing Roberts Creek children to attend Myrtle Creek Schools.

In clarification, the board said that Roberts Creek School would be maintained as it is at present. The buses would continue to operate on present schedules and parents would arrange private transportation to the end of the bus line.

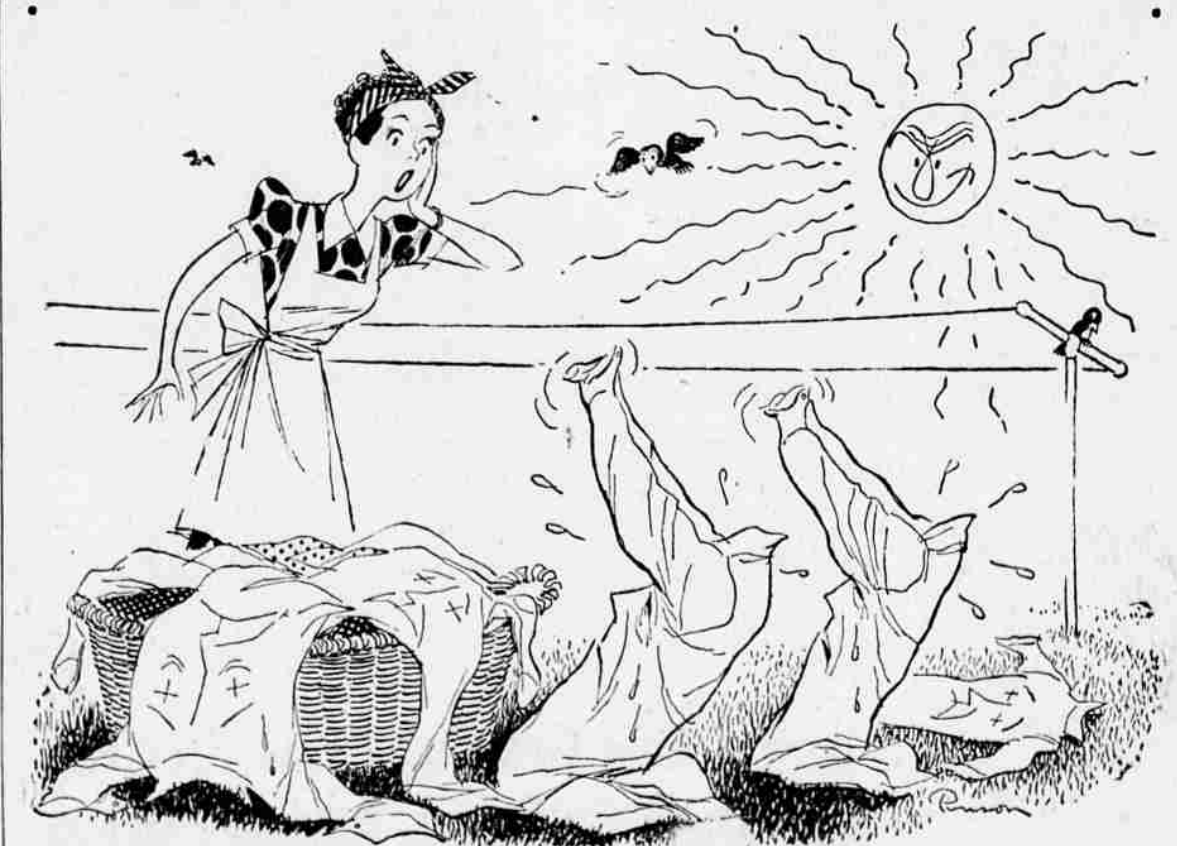

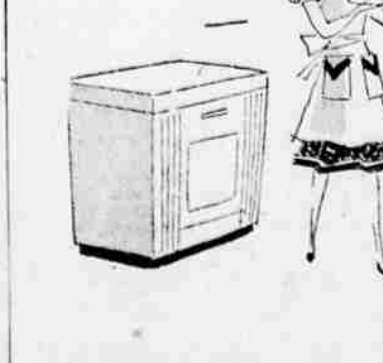
