Roseburg Medics To Attend Clinic

Two Roseburg doctors are expected to attend the University of Oregon Medical School's clinics in treatment of arthritis and rheumatism the first of the week.

Dr. Ray Hanford and Dr. John Welch are among the advance registrants for the clinics at the medical school, Nov. 29 and 30. This is the first time such a course has been offered. Northwest physicians by the medical school.

One cannot discuss acidosis without an appreciation of its opposite condition, which is called alkalosis. The chemical quality of the blood and tissue fluids is normally neutral, or perhaps slightly alkaline. This is known as nature's acid-alkali equilibrium. When one is in good health this equilibrium is usually maintained in such a manner that if too much acid is taken into the system, or too much alkali, the blood tissue fluids are capable of neutralizing whichever of these chemical substances happens to be in excess. This is often called the buffer action.

This buffer action, the acid base equilibrium or the acid alkali equilibrium, is essential to life. The buffer action reaction is maintained by the carbon dioxide elimination by the lungs; by the acid elimination by the kidneys; by neutralization of the acids in the blood by ammonium and also by the intake of alkaline foods.

It is important, however, that the taking of too much alkaline substances is just as dangerous as having too much acid in the system.

Among the causes of acidosis is liver damage, loss of hydrochloric acid of the stomach by vomiting, such as vomiting of pregnancy

U. S. Opens Campaign To Free 15 Americans

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mand for "punishment of the Chinese Communist officials responsible" and for compensation for the "wrong" done the U.S. Authorities said today they are studying all avenues of following up the initial demand, apparently in the belief that even the Chinese Reds, isolated as they are from the Western world, can not ignore the mounting pressures of public opinion.

Among these pressures already developing is the stand taken by the British government, which in comments at the U.N. and in London denounced the treatment of the Americans as "outrageous."

The Chinese Reds announced Tuesday that the 13, captured during the Korean War, had been given sentences ranging from four years to life on spy charges. The 13 already had been held about two years.

The two civilians, listed by the Pentagon as U. S. Army employees, were on a civilian Air transport plane under lease to the Air Force which the United States contends was attacked over international waters. The 11 airmen were on a plane which the United States says was shot down about 15 miles south of the rail river in January, 1953.

Peiping Radio Friday broadcast what it termed extracts from their trial record, saying the "U. S. spies admitted having received specialist training in espionage and guerrilla warfare." It said the two civilians confessed they were trained as agents by the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency.

Red Claims Refuted

The American note told Peiping, in demanding the release of the men "forthwith," that the prison sentences were based "on political charges which are without foundation."

The United States charged that sentencing of U. S. military personnel was "grossly contrary" to all international standards respecting protection of prisoners of war. It said the "maltreatment" of the two civilians was "equally reprehensible."

It accused the Chinese Reds of having "willfully and deceitfully" withheld the civilians' names from the list of American civilians provided at the time of the Asian peace talks at Geneva last June.

"The Chinese Communist authorities," the note added, "are under an obligation to redress insofar as possible the wrong they have inflicted on these American nationals and their families. The United States government reserves the right to claim compensation as may be determined appropriate, and to demand the punishment of the Chinese Communist officials responsible for the denial of the rights of these persons."

"The Chinese Communist authorities should bear in mind that the long list of Chinese Communist outrages against American nationals, which the American people have borne with restraint thus far, is significantly extended by the Chinese Communist announcement of Nov. 23."
