Candidates File Expense Reports

Frank Ashley, who takes office as county commissioner at the end of the year, ran up campaign expenses totaling \$378.50 in the general election, a report to County Clerk Charles Doerner shows.

His opponent, incumbent Lynn V. Beckley, lists expenses of \$472.37, Doerner said.

The commissioner's race was one of the most hotly contested ones, but Ashley had little trouble at the polls. He received 10,363 votes to Beckley's 6,688, rolling up the top individual record in voting for local, contested positions.

Warren A. Woodruff, who won the district judgeship, spent \$773.46, including expenses of his committee. His opponent, Thomas C. Hartfield, lists \$520.36, with one bill still to come in.

Morris C. Bowker, unopposed for the post of county assessor; Norman Weatherly, unopposed for Port of Umpqua commissioner; and Robert H. Goodwin, unopposed for justice of peace of the Reedsport district, list no expenses in the campaign.

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Amateur Radio Operators Get Call From Army

The Army is seeking amateur radio operators in eight Western states for membership in the Military Amateur Radio System (MARS), Sixth Army Headquarters announces.

Stations in Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington are needed to strengthen the network, which provides a vitally needed "in place" communications system for use in time of emergency.

Anyone over 16 years of age (or 15, with parents' consent) who possesses a valid Federal Communications Commission (FCC) radio amateur license is eligible to join MARS, said Lt. Col. Charles J. Schuurs, MARS Director, Headquarters Sixth Army, Presidio of San Francisco, who can provide application blanks and further information.

Sprague Put On Board To Hear Rail Dispute

SALEM (AP)—Charles A. Sprague, publisher and former governor, will be one of three members of an emergency board investigating a strike threat on most of the country's railroads.

His appointment was announced by President Eisenhower. Other members of the board are Edward M. Sharpe, Michigan Supreme Court chief justice, and John T. Dunlop, Harvard economics professor.

The dispute is between the railroads and conductors and brakemen. Appointment of such a board under the National Railway Labor Act bars a strike for 60 days.
