Clubs, Leagues Study Moves In Minor Loops

HOUSTON (AP)—The New York Yankees' efforts to place their franchise in Kansas City, American League franchise in Denver and the St. Louis Cardinals' plan to shift their Columbus club to Omaha reached the "showdown" stage today as the minor leagues prepared to open their annual convention.

With the Dec. 1 deadline for any franchise shift only 48 hours away, officials of the clubs and leagues involved were knee-deep in special sessions and private caucuses hoping to bring baseball's newest and biggest headache to some sort of solution.

The American Assn. and the Western League scheduled separate meetings before tangling in a joint session later in the day. In the meantime, officials of the Yankees, Cardinals, Denver and Omaha clubs were engaged in private conferences.

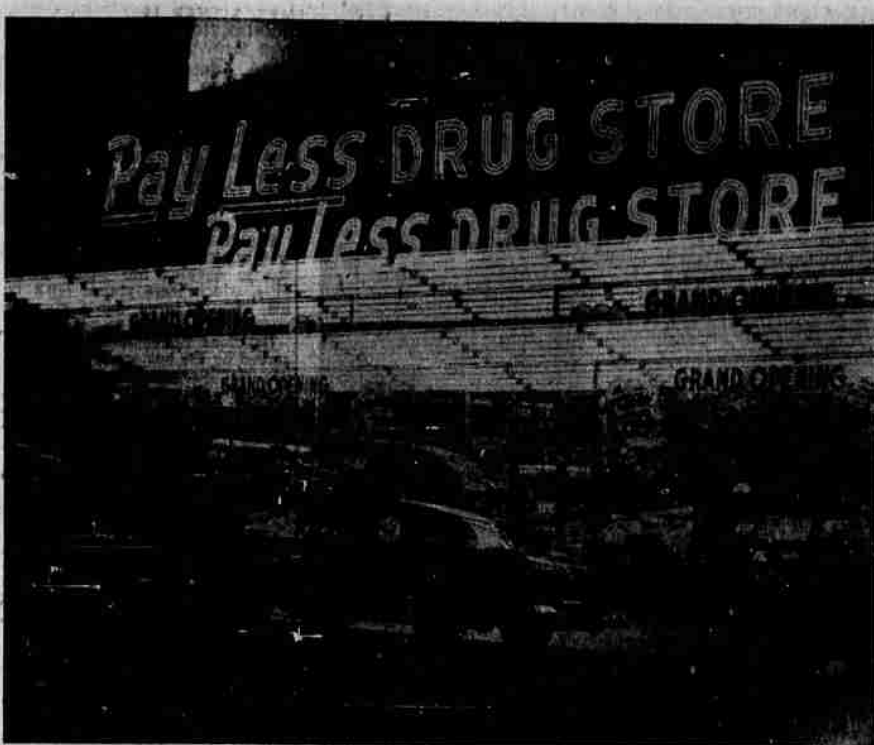

Torrential Rains Hit Hawaiian Islands Sunday

HONOLULU (AP)—Torrential rains, punctuated by lightning and whipped by gale winds, drenched Honolulu Sunday night and forced the evacuation of portions of four Navy housing areas and the closing of a main highway.

Police at nearby Pearl City said there was an unconfirmed report that an unidentified woman had drowned in a torrent of water cascading off the Koolau Mountain Range.

The U.S. Weather Bureau forecaster at Honolulu airport said it was the first real Kona, a stormy southwest wind peculiar to the Hawaiian Islands, since 1951.

In the space of seven hours the rainfall ranged from 8.65 inches at Lihue, coastal town on southwestern Kauai Island, to 5.6 inches at Barbers Point Naval Air Station on Oahu Island. The rain was considerably heavier in the mountains.

Little Polish Boy Joins His Mother

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Little Andy Prazik was well into a new chapter of his 11-year-old life today, far from his native Poland, where he parted from his mother 10 years ago.

The handsome youngster, who can't speak a word of English, hopped from an American airliner at Spokane yesterday into the arms of his mother.

Andy and his mother were separated in Warsaw in 1944. Andy went to live with his grandmother when his mother was taken to a Nazi concentration camp in Germany. His father was killed in street fighting then rocking Warsaw.

After the war, Andy's mother made her way to America, met and married an American, Matthew Garcia, now an engineering student at Washington State College.

Five years ago she applied for her son's release, but it was only several weeks ago that Andy's visa was granted and he was permitted to leave the country.

Aged French Farmer Now Facing Guillotine

DIGNE, France (AP)—The shadow of the guillotine hung Monday over 77-year-old Gaston Dominici, sentenced to death for murdering three holidaying Britons who had camped near his farm in the Alpine foothills.

A seven-man jury found the old farmer guilty Sunday of murdering Sir Jack Drummond, Lady Drummond's underling and his 11-year-old daughter. The sentence concluded: "Every man condemned to death shall have his head cut off."

The Drummonds were killed late on the night of Aug. 5, 1952. Two of Dominici's sons accused their father and he finally admitted the crimes.

The police said the old farmer in his original confession said he had passed the Drummond's car while out hunting, noticed Lady Drummond undressing and went closer to spy on her. Seeing or hearing him, the woman screamed. Her husband quarreled with the old man, they traded blows and Dominici opened fire on the couple, killing both.
