Sen. Jenner, Flanders Clash In Senate Row

he used the terms "brothers" and "friends" in speaking of the Soviet peoples.

Sen. Cotton (R-NH) who was presiding, pounded his gavel in an effort to halt Jenner, but the Indiana said no attention.

Flanders told Jenner that essentially what he was trying to do in the broadcast was to make an appeal to the Russian peoples for friendship over the heads of the Russian government.

Flanders said the broadcast was based on a two-year old script embodying a message he had been trying for a long time to get across to the Russian people.

He said he had written it as "Russian people," but that for some reason of protocol his script was changed by others whom he did not identify to "Soviet peoples."

Jenner told the Senate Flanders' broadcast had "many of the earmarks of the peaceful coexistence propaganda."

He turned to Flanders and said "you may censure me for this, senator, if you want to."

Flanders then ended the exchange by asking all senators to read the transcript of his broadcast and saying he would leave it to their judgment.

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Sir Winston's Spirits High On 80th Birthday

LONDON — Sir Winston Churchill celebrated his 80th birthday Tuesday with the fervent hope he still has "some service to render."

The Prime Minister, always a man of many sides, was both jovial and somber as the nation paid tribute to him and millions of admirers, at home and overseas, marked the anniversary as a personal affair.

Looking especially fit for his age, Churchill beamed eulogies from all factions in the House of Commons at a new session of parliament opened by Queen Elizabeth II with a speech from the throne declaring—in his words—"that world survival depends on a continued intimate association of Britain and the United States."

He accepted the eulogies "with pride and humility."

And to those looking for a hint of his future plans, the Old War hero described himself as "a party politician who has not retired and may at any time become involved in controversy."

He made only one reference to his age in the House:

"Ladies and gentlemen, I am now nearing the end of my journey, hope still have some service to render. However that may be and whatever may befall, I am sure I shall never forget the emotion of this day—this wonderful honor done me."

Charles H. James Funeral Services Slated Wednesday

Graveside funeral services for Charles H. James, 80, of Roseburg, will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the funeral home of Long & Orr Mortuary.

James was born at Aden, Mo., Oct. 20, 1874, the son of James Henry and Elizabeth McClure James, pioneers of that area. He came to Douglas County when a small child, residing at Elk Head for a number of years.

Later he moved to Parkersburg and Coquille where he resided from 1892 to 1901, when he moved to Bandon, where he and a brother owned and operated the river steamer, Venus.

He moved to Myrtle Point in 1904 and operated two river steamers, the Echo and the Welcome, on the Coquille River until 1908.

Following that time, he moved to eastern Oregon and later came to Roseburg in 1927. James was married in Coquille on June 18, 1899, to Pearl Zevely.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Pearl James, Yoncalla; 11 children, Mrs. Louis (Gertrude) Chieski, Yoncalla; Mrs. Harry (Audrey) Gabriel, Drew; Royce James, Wonder; Mrs. H. D. Lafferty Goes To Capital For Hearing On OGC Suit

PORTLAND — A. W. Lafferty, the attorney who is representing Clackamas County in its O and C Land suit, left for the nation's capital Sunday to attend a federal court hearing on the case.

The hearing, to start Wednesday, is on the government's motion to dismiss the county's suit. This suit attacks the constitutionality of a law aimed at districting out of the 18 Western Oregon counties. The law also would place administration of certain O & C lands in the hands of the Forest Service.

The law was sponsored by Sen. Guy Cordon and Rep. Herb Ellisworth, both Oregon Republicans.

Days Creek Vote Set For Hiring Of New Teacher

Days Creek school district voters will be asked to go to the polls sometime before Christmas and vote on the election of a new teacher to replace the overworked second grade teacher at the Days Creek Elementary School.

The election will be held, according to Supt. Marlen Yoder, as soon as notice can be posted to allow the 20 days required by law. Yoder explained that the deficit sum would be used to pay the salary of the teacher, who will be employed to absorb the overage in the 36-student second grade class.

Also under discussion at the board meeting of the Days Creek School Board, was the problem of the low water supply in the school. The lack of water forced the closing of the school one day last week, but Yoder reports that the problem was solved by springing the shortage becomes more severe.

DETROIT — A Chrysler strike was averted Tuesday, making "a big three."

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School Census Shows Increase Of 4.3 Per Cent

Completion of the recently conducted census of school-age children in Roseburg's District 4 shows a 4.3 per cent growth over the count of last year, according to Jack Lucas, census director for the district.

Tabulations were completed last week. The census is the basis on which money is returned to the district from the state's basic school support fund.

The count shows 6,765 children between the ages of 4 and 19 living in the district. That figure compares to 6,488 a year ago.

In addition, children below the age of 4 were counted for the purpose of planning in future growth of the district. Lucas said 2,332 were recorded, compared to 2,294 last year, a gain of 1.7 per cent.

Jackson Succeeds Sullivan As Oil Company Head

A change in the guiding management of the present oil-drilling operation was reported at the Community Gas & Oil Co. stockholders meeting Monday night.

It was reported that H. V. Sullivan, one of the guiding lights in the Douglas County oil exploration of the last two years, had retired as chairman of Oil Developers Inc.

He has been replaced by Elton Jackson.

Sullivan, however, will remain on the board of directors of the group which guided drilling of the Coles Valley hole two years ago.

Since then, the company has interlocked with the Community Gas & Oil, which was formed to make it easier to float another issue of stock for the present drilling operation at Melrose.

Oil Developers blazed the trail in offering geological data and buying additional leases while the Community Gas & Oil was being formed.

Sullivan quit as chairman because of poor health.

The Coles Valley well never flowed oil, but it has been described as a priceless experiment in gaining geological data. It was one of the most costly of the present site was selected.

After almost the entire \$100,000 had been exhausted by Oil Developers in drilling the Coles Valley well, the site was sold to Union Oil Co. which agreed to finish the hole and drill three more, according to Dave Busenbark. It did not live up to the bargain. Busenbark said, although it spent an additional \$150,000 on the hole. He charged Union with selling "us down the river."

Republicans Open Investigation Of Senate Election

PORTLAND — The Republicans have opened an investigation of the close election in which Democrat Richard L. Neuberger defeated Republican Sen. Guy Cordon of Oregon, the state Republican chairman said Monday.

They are looking for irregularities that might lead to a demand for a recount, said Ed Boehnke, head of the Oregon Republicans.

Boehnke said the Republican national committee sent Stanley Beattie, Detroit attorney and special counsel for the party, to Oregon to conduct the investigation.

He arrived Saturday, but has not yet had time to reach any conclusions, Beattie said.

Neuberger's election gave the Democrats 48, the Republicans 47 seats in the Senate. With independent Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon promising to vote with the Democrats that gives control of the next Senate to the Democrats.

If a recount could overturn the result, it would throw the Senate into a tie vote. That would allow Vice President Nixon, presiding officer in the Senate, to cast a tie-breaking vote that would allow the Republicans to organize the next Senate.

The official canvass of votes gave Neuberger 285,775 to Cordon's 283,313, a margin of 2,462 for Neuberger. He was the first Democrat elected to the Senate from Oregon in 40 years.

What the closeness of the vote became apparent the day after election, Gov. Paul Patterson directed election officials to take special precautions to guard the ballot boxes.

There have been no reports of ballot-box tampering.
