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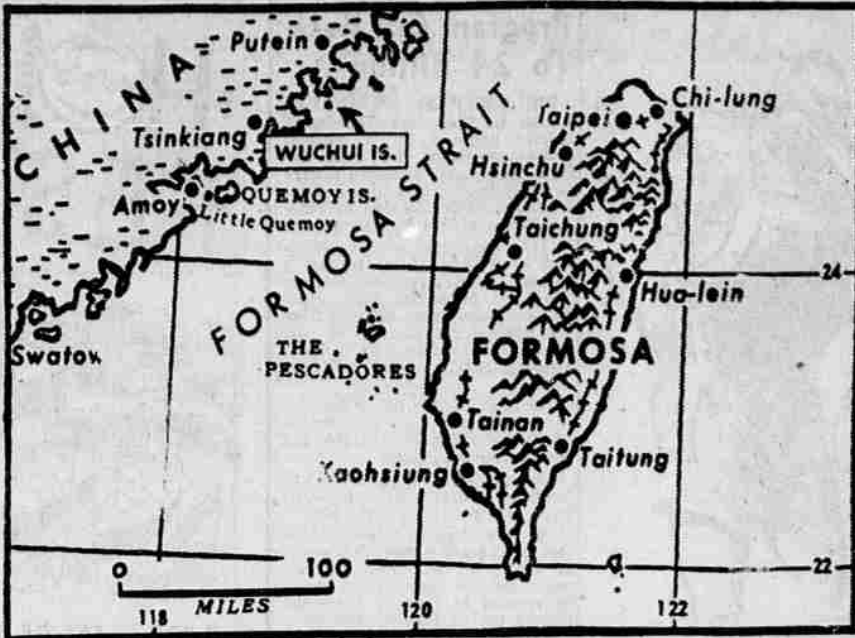

Montgomery Says West Air Power Is Now Inadequate

LOS ANGELES — Field Marshal Montgomery says the West "will never win the war in the air with the organization for air command and control that we have at present."

Britain's hero in the World War II conquest of the Nazi Gen. Rommel added: "The present organization is unworthy of a group of nations who claim to have some knowledge of war."

Speaking Monday night to California Institute of Technology scientists, Montgomery prefaced his remarks on a possible future world hot war by saying: "I want to make it absolutely clear that we at Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers, Europe, are basing all our operational planning on using atomic and thermo-nuclear weapons in our defense."

The reason, he said, is that "We can not match the strength that could be brought against us unless we use nuclear weapons; and our political chiefs have never shown

any great enthusiasm in giving us the number to be able to do this without using such weapons."

He envisioned three stages of a war: World wide struggle for mastery in the air and of the oceans; destruction of the remaining enemy land forces, and the bargaining phase when the enemy's homeland is at the mercy of Western air power.

Leading up to his criticism of Western planning, Montgomery said "The dominant factor in future war will be air power. The greatest asset of air power is its flexibility. Flexibility and centralized control of all the air forces in a theater of war are vital to success." Then he continued:

"But the West has sacrificed much of its flexibility by basing the air command organization on the requirements of the 'direct support' of the land forces, whereas it should be based on the organization necessary to gain the greatest measure of control in the air."

Truman Claims He Could Have Ended Korean War

WASHINGTON — Former President Harry Truman says he could have ended the Korean War before the 1952 election "if I had been willing to agree to the Russian terms, which I was not."

Asked if he could have signed a truce before the 1952 election, Truman said he could have done so "any time before that, several weeks before that..." But he didn't believe it should be "a political matter."

During the recent congressional election campaign, a number of Republicans said the Korean truce of 1953 was reached as a result of GOP administration efforts.

Truman spoke in a filmed television interview with columnist Drew Pearson, released here in advance.

ple market for the forest products that are produced in the inland Umpqua basin and Douglas County. This dependable market has been established in the last decade, and is permanent.

Hay And Forage Crop Market

Being a livestock producing region the tame and wild hay including alfalfa, clover, timothy, small grain hay and wild grass hay has established markets through the feeding yards and livestock growers. Very little hay is sold on the open market as the majority is used for feeding livestock during the winter months.

Horticultural crops including pears, peaches, filberts, peaches, apples and berries are produced in commercial quantities. This area has grown, more or less, famous for the early production of truck crops including melons. The most dependable market for the outlet of these products is through the local buyers and the food stores, in the region. The growers of horticultural crops have been able to dispose of their production, at a reasonable profit, in the past, with an annual return of over \$1-million dollars.

Everyone interested in the stability of Douglas County and Roseburg should be concerned with offering to the farmers the most profitable and economical means possible for the disposition of his products. What results in profit for the farmers will bring a greater degree of profit to the commercial firms located in the region.
