

Two Ducks Named All-Coast

LOS ANGELES—The unbeaten Bruins of UCLA, as might have been expected, dominate the 1954 all-Pacific Coast Conference football team as selected by The Associated Press.

Champion of the conference for the second straight year, UCLA placed four players on the AP first team and four more on the mythical second team.

The overall selections, released Wednesday after a tabulation of votes by AP member football writers up and down the Coast:

The backfield:
Paul Larson, California; George Shaw, Oregon; Lindon Crow, Southern California, and Bob Davenport, UCLA.

The line:
Ends — Jim Hanifan, California, and Bob Long, UCLA.
Tackles — Jack Ellena, UCLA, and Ed Fouch, USC.

Guards — Jim Salsbury, UCLA, and Jack Patena, Oregon.
Center — Matt Hazeltine, California.

Top Heavy Choices
Eight of the players selected were top-heavy choices, and in the instances of Larson, Shaw, Davenport, Hanifan, Ellena and Salsbury, they were practically unanimous.

There was no reluctance by the voters in placing two T-quarterbacks, Shaw and Larson, in the first team backfield.

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Drain And Yoncalla Start Play Tonight

Drain will field one of the least experienced class A basketball teams in Douglas County this season when it opens against Elkton Wednesday night. The in-and-out Warriors who won 11 and lost 13 last year have only one returning letterman.

Coach Del Dungey's lone returning regular is 6-0 forward Bill Henderson, a one-year letterman senior. Missing from this year's line-up are four starters including high-scoring forward Jack Weaver and several capable reserves of a team that reached the sub-county finals last season.

But the Warriors can be expected to develop as the season progresses, playing more county teams than they have in other recent years. Three six-footers will lend their talents to the Warrior front line in what looms as a speedy starting quint.

Others who have won starting berths are Larry Brown, a 5-7 sophomore, and Don Brown, a 5-9 senior, at guards; Virgil Merrill, 6-0 sophomore, at center and Dale Dowdy, 6-0 junior, teaming with Henderson at forward.

Completing the rest of the roster are Ray Skiles, 5-7, and Bill Levins, 5-9, both guards, Ron

Georgia Tech Man Named AP Lineman

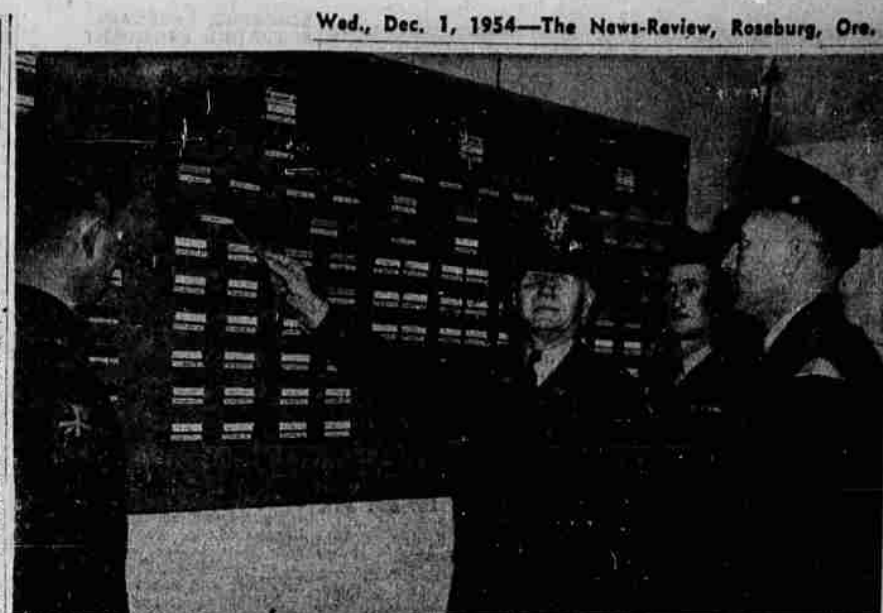

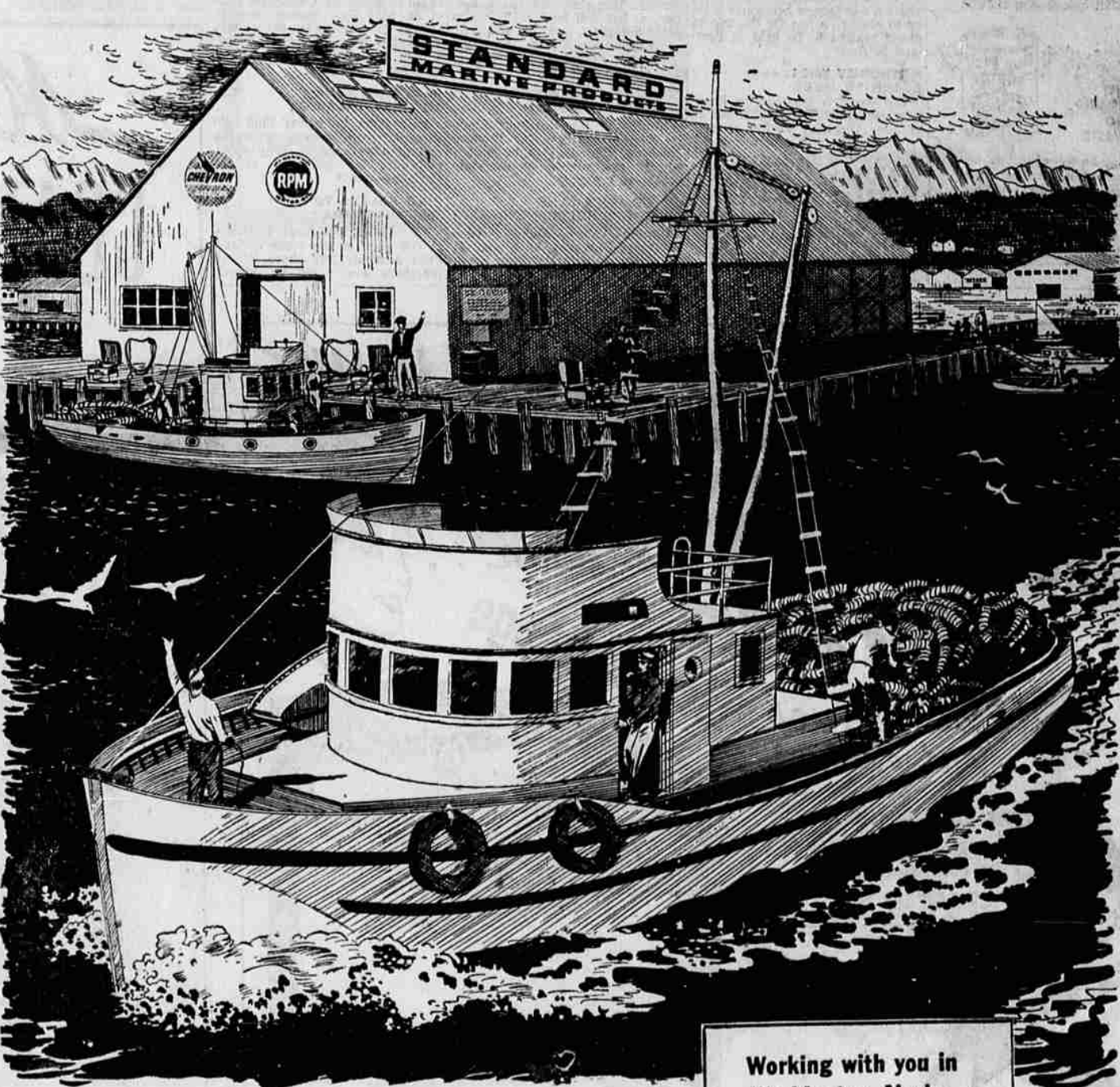
