Phenix City Witness Killed In Street Fight

PHENIX CITY, Ala. (AP) — The son of slain Albert L. Patterson angrily demanded prompt grand jury indictment of his father's killer Friday after a witness who may have seen Patterson murdered was stabbed to death on a Phenix City street Thursday night.

Griffin was killed a day after he testified before an emergency grand jury which is considering murder indictments in the Patterson killing.

National guardsmen still patrolling the city five months after Patterson's death arrested a 16-year-old Negro, Jerry C. Washington, and said he confessed the stabbing, blaming Griffin for provoking the fight.

Col. James N. Brown, military chief of police, said there appeared to be no connection between Griffin's death and his appearance before the grand jury Wednesday.

INVESTIGATE SHOOTING — Police investigated Friday the gunshot death of Mrs. Enid Ebinger, 36, who was found dead in a parked car, a revolver by her side. Police said suicide was indicated.

Judge Dismisses Anti-Trust Suit Against Du Pont

CHICAGO (AP) — A civil anti-trust suit against the wealthy Du Pont family, its huge chemicals firm, General Motors and U. S. Rubber was dismissed Friday by U. S. District Judge Walter J. Labuy.

Judge Labuy, ending a long civil trial, held the government had "failed to prove conspiracy, monopolization, a restraint of trade, or any reasonable probability of a restraint."

The suit, filed in 1949, was described by a government attorney as an action which would "dwarf all previous (anti-trust) cases in its magnitude."

The decision was widely watched by business interests as a vital ruling in the current period of industrial corporation mergers.

In their presentation over a period of more than two years, the government attorneys had charged that the Du Ponts bought General Motors and U. S. Rubber Co. stock to set up captive markets for Du Pont products.

The defense contended the stock purchases were made only because they were good investments.

Cordon Votes Against Censure Of McCarthy

PORTLAND (AP) — Sen. Guy Cordon's stand against censure of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) brought criticism Thursday from Miss Shirley A. Field, Portland, national Young Republican officer.

She sent a telegram to Cordon, saying she was sorry she had helped him in his recent unsuccessful re-election campaign. She added:

"I was hopeful that after your experience of campaigning throughout the state of Oregon this fall it would have been made abundantly clear to you that the overwhelming majority of the people in Oregon are unsympathetic to Sen. McCarthy's methods and techniques."

His vote on final measure was recorded against.

are generally found in chapters. (400 chapters comprise the ARC Pacific area.)

Successfully training a volunteer after recruitment brought forth much discussion. Mrs. Gordon Shattuck, Salem, a member of the Marion County board, seemed to express many opinions. She called orientation "as good only as the people are willing to absorb it." All agreed on the need for recognition of good work by volunteers.

Col. Bob Dicey, vice chairman of the Douglas County Chapter, posed a problem as yet unsolved by the Red Cross. He suggested recognition of people who contribute money or blood (or both). Most of them he said are generally not contacted again until time for the next contribution. Area consultant Mrs. Gunther told the volunteers that national ARC was attempting to find a solution.

The volunteers, among other groups later in the afternoon, summarized questions concerning volunteers and Red Cross. They met at 6:30 in the Elks Club Ballroom for a dinner meeting featuring Brig. Gen. Curtis T. Beecher. Opening day sessions closed with group summaries. Mrs. Gunther directed their reading.

The volunteers, among other things, agreed volunteers were the lifeline of the Red Cross idea of people helping people. They stressed, too, the necessity of keeping volunteers who were in the program and of knowing recruitment needs in each category covered by the RC program.

Once again they re-emphasized the need to give the volunteer the job requested - if possible; train the volunteer for the job and recognize the work he or she does. "Let's raise our sights," one woman said, "and give more service to all."

U. S. Presses U. N. To Act To Free 13 Americans

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States pressed today for U.N. action to free 13 American airmen jailed by Red China on spy charges. The move brought quick response from America's 15 Korean Allies.

U.S. Chief Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., after a high-level meeting in Washington, called the Allies into emergency session last night to discuss the speediest course of action. He voiced confidence the U.N. would support any move the Americans might decide on.

President Eisenhower told newsmen in Washington yesterday he did not see "how the United Nations can possibly disabuse itself of a feeling of responsibility in this matter, and retain its self-respect." Similar views have been expressed by congressmen. The airmen flew under U.N. colors.

Informal sources said Eisenhower may underscore his interest in the case by sending Secretary of State Dulles here to take a personal hand.

F86 Sabrejet Fighter Crashes Near Hanford

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — An F86 Sabrejet fighter plane crashed and exploded in a restricted area of the Hanford atomic project Thursday but the pilot bailed out and landed safely.

An Army public information man here said the plane, from Larson Air Force Base, "disintegrated." There was no report of any damage to the atom project.

The pilot was identified as Lt. J. R. Ferguson of Caywood, N.Y.

Officials Hope To End Radiomen Ship Strike

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal mediators Friday explored means of ending a two-day-old strike by CIO radiomen that threatens to paralyze West Coast shipping.

U.S. Mediator George Hillenbrand said he was "a little optimistic" following a three-hour secret meeting with officials of the striking CIO American Radio Assn. and the shipowners' Pacific Maritime Assn.

Further talks are set Friday. Only a few vessels have been affected.
