Oregon's Traffic Deaths Now Over Total Of 1953

Thirty-five people were killed in Oregon traffic crashes during November to above the 11-month death toll to 363.

The November deaths were seven above those recorded for that month a year ago, and the year's count compares with 354 for the same period in 1953.

Two accidents, each of which killed four persons, were responsible for ending the month on a tragic note.

One occurred in Malheur county on Thanksgiving Day, killing four members of a family enroute to spend the holiday in Prineville.

The second multiple crash occurred the following Sunday when four teen-agers died when the car smashed into a truck at an intersection.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newby warned Oregon motorists that December may see an even higher death toll unless drivers adjust their driving to meet winter conditions.

Wet or icy highways, heavy holiday traffic and drinking drivers usually combine to make December the highest accident-producing month of the year.

Newby said he hoped that intensive campaigning for S-D Day on December 15, when drivers and pedestrians throughout the nation are being urged to go accident-free for 24 hours, may work to reduce accidents and deaths all month.

"If it doesn't," he said, "we expect the 1954 traffic death toll to hit 400."

Buffalo Slaughter Slated For Yule Food

OTTAWA, Ont. (U)—About 500 buffaloes in the world's largest herd are being slaughtered, and there'll be buffalo roasts on some Canadian tables this Christmas.

The herd numbers 12,000 to 15,000. It is at Wood Buffalo National Park, straddling the border between Alberta and the Northwest Territories. It is reduced every year by riflemen to keep it down to a size the range can support.

The meat will go to Indians in need of fresh meat, to church missions and Hudson's Bay Co. stores in the far north. And, for the first time, about half will go to pack-houses for sale outside the territories.

Vice President Nixon's Father Fractures Hip

FULLERTON, Calif. (U)—Frank Nixon, 76, father of Vice President Richard Nixon, is reported in good condition after an operation Sunday for the treatment of a broken hip.

He broke his left hip in a fall Thursday night at his La Habra home.

PORTLAND (U)—Police credited a 23-year-old, 125-pound woman with wrestling a burglary suspect to the ground and holding him until her husband and a neighbor arrived.

She is Mrs. Richard Sloop, a physical education instructor at a Portland high school.

Police said the Sloops were returning home when they saw a man jump from the window of their apartment and start to run. Mrs. Sloop caught him by the belt and seat of the pants and threw him down.

Police Saturday identified the man she caught as Cecil M. Meyers, 46. He weighed 140 pounds.

Atty. Gen. Thornton Will Probe Olton

PORTLAND (U)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Saturday that he plans to investigate the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

The probe will begin as soon as he returns from the National Attorneys General Assn. convention in West Virginia this week, he said.

Thornton said his decision was prompted by disclosures from a recent investigation of the commission by Gov. Paul Patterson. This led to the suspension of two liquor commission employees.

Patterson, asked to comment on Thornton's announcement, said: "I certainly feel that he should fulfill the duties of his office as they are provided by law. I intend to administer the affairs of the liquor commission out of this office where the responsibility for the same lies."

Stolen Money Repaid Under Conscience Goad

ABERDEEN, S. D. (U)—A Salem, Ore., man who had a guilty conscience about some small change he stole years ago probably was feeling better Monday.

A. L. Ward Jr., who operates a hotel here, said he had received the letter with a \$5 bill.

"I needed some money one time and I did not ring up a few dimes on two occasions, amounting to about one dollar."

"This happened, I think before you were born. I hope this will be satisfactory to you. I will feel I have done the right thing before God and man."

The writer said he had worked for Ward's father many years ago.
