here. He had won the democratic nomination for attorney general in a bitterly contested runoff primary June 1. Gamblers had spent untold thousands trying to defeat him.

In Birmingham, a grand jury found evidence of vote manipulation in an effort to count Patterson out of the race.

Patterson had announced only a few hours before his death that he would testify before the Birmingham jury.

Both Ferrell and Fuller pleaded guilty four days ago to vote fraud charges here, and Fuller was fined \$250, Ferrell \$300.

The swagging, 200-pound veteran chief deputy had already been convicted of taking payoff money to let a bawdy house operate unmolested during the era of easy night life in Phenix City, and was sentenced to seven years in prison.

Ferrell had acquired a reputation as a quick-tempered but keen-minded lawyer whose work in the American Legion brought him recognition as state commander in 1949. He was an infantry captain in World War II.

At one time, Ferrell and Patterson were close political friends and it was on Patterson's recommendation that former Gov. James E. Folsom appointed Ferrell circuit solicitor in 1948.

Electric Hazards Told At Meet Of Roseburg Lions

Electricity can kill and does. But thanks to safety precautions taken by power companies, total number of deaths from this cause in the United States is limited to less than one per cent of the approximate 90,000 accidental deaths annually.

These facts were brought out in a lecture—demonstration put on by Claud Haggard, California Oregon Power Co. safety engineer from the Medford office, at the weekly Roseburg Lions Club meeting Thursday night.

Making sparks fly aplenty, Haggard brought electricity into the banquet room to bear out how quickly electricity can kill or seriously injure, unless proper safety measures are taken at all times in dealing with this all-important household and industrial medium, which is now so commonplace. The safety program is aimed at reducing hazards.

Haggard enumerated four ways in which electricity can kill, by burning, by stopping of breathing, by disturbing the rhythm of the heart, or by indirect methods in which a mild shock may cause a person to become unbalanced and fall to his death from a height or into machinery, or such.

Symphony Concert Is Well Received By Small Audience

Hours of intensive rehearsal paid off for members of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra Thursday night. The group presented its winter concert, first of the season, before an enthusiastic Roseburg audience of more than 170.

Certainly the orchestra pleased the audience. Its interpretation of modern and classical numbers was, for the most part, well done. From the opening strains of the first Bach air through a suite from the Broadway musical "The King and I" audience members listened in evident appreciation.

Frankly, this reporter has always thought (tradition be damned) a few rousing drum beats would enliven many portions of the symphony. It should be noted the orchestra used only the classic symphony instruments in presenting the piece.

But, on an overall basis, it was a superb evening of musical entertainment, topped by an informal coffee session in the school library where audience and orchestra members met informally. The coffee meet was provided by members of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra Society.

system and to advise the public, the patrons of the schools.

6. To urge decentralization of the schools to the local school board level.

7. To urge the construction of future elementary schools in their natural walking attendance areas.

8. To urge the school buildings as community centers.

9. To examine and publicize the present studies, with the explanation of how they came into being.

10. To promote better understanding and harmony between the schools and the community.

Conn and Young said too many of the people understand little of what is transpiring in school district business.

They pointed out that should every person with a problem take it to the school board, that body would be thrown into hours-long meetings. The new organization, they explained, should be able to act as an intermediary body in laying questions and suggestions before the board.

They said it is planned to set up a system of committees for dealing with specific problems.

Young and Conn said that besides study of problems in economics in the district, scrutiny of courses of study in the schools will be part of the group's activities.

They said organizers of the association recognize the load placed on the school board and administration. Tracing back through the history of the district, they said it is also recognized that the huge growth in the district has brought about tremendous economic problems.

Both men said they felt school problems are mainly the problems of the people, since "we own the kids."

As for memberships, both explained that each person enrolling must give a sign that he will meet any problem encountered objectively. "We have no axes to grind," said Young. In fact, Conn said, he had refused three or four signatures because he felt the people wouldn't join with an open mind.

The organization will remain dues-free. Membership goal, the men stated, is "everyone in the community." Charter subscribers to the association will continue to

Court Owners Chose Roseburg For Convention

Official notification has been received here that the Oregon Motor Court Assn., representing a membership of 800 motel, trailer park and resort owners, will hold its 1955 convention in Roseburg.

The three-day convention, 11th in the association's history, is scheduled for fall, probably October, according to Harold Hickerson, secretary-manager of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Exact date will be set later. Roseburg was selected by the OMCA board of directors in a meeting concluded recently.

A resolution passed by the OMCA board commended the State Highway Commission for its program of road improvement throughout the state, but urged that highway signs be developed to "consider the comforts, needs and desires of motorists."

It suggested that relocators of highways and builders of bypasses take into consideration present established tax-paying roadside businesses.

H. Ray Henderson, executive secretary of the association, stressed that while the Highway Commission is constructing highways it should continue to build the state's tourist trade.

Henderson said motel, hotel, trailer park and resort operators receive only about 19 cents of each tourist dollar. Remainder of the tourist money goes to other businesses such as restaurants, service stations, garages, stores, markets and shops, he added.

The board also urged state police, before the next tourist season starts, to crack down on excessive highway noises caused mostly by faulty mufflers and unskilled diesel operators.

Youth In News Soon To Be Sent Back To Illinois

Donald Lee Hough, 22, of Walnut Hill, Ill., the youth who was shot in the arm by an errant bullet, started a big lawsuit and was arrested on an Illinois warrant, all in a little more than a month in Roseburg, will soon be on his way back to Illinois.

Kankakee, Ill., chief of police, Wallace Flannery, said he would send an officer to pick up Hough as soon as possible. He said warrants were out for Hough's arrest for burglaries of two stores in Kankakee. Flannery said the state's attorney has started extradition proceedings.

Flannery listed the burglaries as \$39.95 worth of merchandise from Alden's Dept. Store and \$52 worth of merchandise from Sears-Roebuck Dept. Store in the city.

Hough broke into the news Nov. 2 when he was involved in an accidental shooting in the Rose Hotel. A fellow employee of the Union Circulair Co., Jack Wirt, New York City, allegedly twirled a .45 caliber revolver on his finger and said it went off. The bullet reportedly struck Hough in the left arm.

On Nov. 26, Hough filed a \$151,350 lawsuit against both Wirt and the magazine circulating company. He charged the bullet had permanently damaged his arm.
