Northern Division basketball teams hit the road again this week and next as the loop nears the end of its schedule of pre-season warmup games.

Oregon State travels to San Francisco for a pair of weekend games in the Cow Palace, while Washington flies to Manhattan, Kansas, for a single contest Saturday with Kansas State.

Oregon has the longest trip—a flight to Louisville for a game next Monday, then to Dayton, Ohio, for a single clash Tuesday, and to Detroit for a singleton Wednesday.

Idaho and Washington State will remain in or near their own backyards. Idaho entertains California Poly at Moscow Tuesday (tomorrow), and Montana Saturday. Washington State plays Eastern Washington College at Cheney Saturday.

OSC Faces Independents
 Oregon State's opponents in the Cow Palace will be the University of San Francisco and Santa Clara, two of California's toughest independents. The Beavers play USF Friday and Santa Clara Saturday, then return home for a game with Seattle University next Tuesday.

Weekend action saw Northern Division teams break even with three wins and three losses. Washington State beat Whitworth 68-62 and Idaho edged Utah State 90-88 in overtime. Washington and Brigham Young also went into overtime and BYU pulled out with a 69-64 victory to even the series at a win apiece. Washington won Friday 64-44. Southern California took two straight from Oregon State, 55-35 Saturday and 45-43 Friday.

Oregon Takes Rest
 Oregon was idle. In the Saturday game at Corvallis, OSC took an early lead but couldn't hold it. The Beavers went out in front 6-2 in the opening minutes but Soucal sank three straight baskets and was never headed. The Trojans led 27-15 at the half. Trojan guard Dick Welsh was high scorer with 19 points. Ron Robins led OSC with 10.

At Provo, Utah, a late Washington rally sparked by Doyle Perkins sent the game into overtime. With only seconds remaining, Perkins' jump shot gave the Huskies a 53-50 lead. Two BYU field goals and a Washington foul shot tied it at 54-54 at the end of the regular period. The Cougars dominated play in the overtime to hand the Huskies their first loss in four starts.

Washington State pulled a thriller out of the fire despite a 38-point scoring spree by Whitworth's 6-10 center Phil Jordan. The lead changed hands half a dozen times as the teams battled down to the wire. Whitworth led 21-13 midway of the first half but WSC rallied to lead 35-34 at the intermission. Sophomore forward Larry Beck paced the Cougar attack with 22 points.

Idaho and Utah State staged one of the highest scoring contests in years in the clash at Moscow. The score was tied 76-76 at the end scored a total of 28 points in the of the regular period and the teams overtime.
