

Alton Baker Jr. Named Editor Of Register Guard

EUGENE (AP)—Alton F. Baker, Jr., 35, Friday was appointed editor of the Eugene Register-Guard. He succeeds William M. Tugman, who resigned Thursday after 27 years with the newspaper to publish a weekly at Reedsport.

Alton F. Baker, publisher, also announced the appointment of Robert B. Frasier as associate editor. He said both his son and Frasier will write editorials for the paper.

The younger Baker had been managing editor since 1950.

Drain Man Cited After Accident

A Drain man was cited by state police Friday for violation of the basic rule after his car and another collided head-on on the Pruner Bridge near Riddle. There were no serious injuries.

Police said John Carr, 20, came on to the bridge at an estimated 50 miles per hour. The speed, mixed with frosty pavement and heavy fog, set the scene for the accident. Carr skidded 81 feet before his vehicle collided with one operated by Eula Maloy, 33, Riddle.

There were slight injuries to Mrs. Maloy and her two passengers, Jack Maloy 13, and Mollie Paraley, 54, police said. The three were shaken up and bruised.

No injuries were reported to Carr and his passengers, Minnie Dagg, 16, Yoncalia. There was heavy damage to the front of the car the Drain man drove. Slight damage was reported to the Maloy vehicle.

sponsibility on use of atomic weapons was not being delegated.

At the end of the 14-nation council session, the Western Big Three foreign ministers went into conference on a wide range of problems facing the United States, Britain and France throughout the world.

In light of Spaak's comment, the ministerial decision did not appear to bind the United States, as the principal atomic power in the Western world, to consult with its Allies in cases of grave emergency, nor to change any standing instructions which it may have already given to Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, Supreme Allied Commander in Europe.

The skin or outer covering of our bodies serves to protect the flesh and to fill important functions as an active organ. The skin consists of two layers, an external layer and an inner layer. These two layers are separated by a thin membrane. The outer layer has no blood vessels and is not sensitive, while the inner or true skin is permeated with nerves and veins and is highly sensitive.

The true skin is always protected by the outer layer, but is the thickest on the back, in the palm of the hand, and at the sole of the foot. Flat cells or scales compose the outer layer and these are shed constantly from the surface in the form of dandruff, or scurf, but are renewed regularly from the inner layer below.

The outer surface appears quite smooth to the naked eye, but when examined through a microscope the little scales may be seen plainly. The skin consists also of small elevations, called papillae, that serve important functions, some as organs concerned with the sense of touch and others as a basis for the growth of hair.

The inner layer contains the sebaceous, fat or oil glands, with ducts that pour their secretions into the hair follicle, a minute de-

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Lumber Strike Panel Schedules Meet Dec. 21

PORTLAND (AP)—The seven-man panel studying the Northwest lumber strike dispute has scheduled meetings here for Dec. 21 and 22 and the Oregon Journal speculated Friday it was the final session.

The committee indicated, the Journal said, "no provision has been made for an expense fund beyond Dec. 22."

Unions and operators share costs of the panel, set up by the governors of Oregon and Washington to investigate the causes of last summer's lumber strike, and to make recommendations.

Men went back to work pending the panel's decision, but the decision is not binding on either side.

off from the field, bound for Portage La Prairie, northwest of Winnipeg, where the Millers owned a cabin.

The craft hit the ground about 125 feet from a home seven blocks north of the field. The senior Miller was thrown out.

Miller, burned over a large portion of his body, his right leg broken and suffering internal injuries, was rushed to Johnston Emergency Hospital. Blood plasma was administered and part of the time he was conscious. He died five hours after the take-off crash.

He was president of the Miller Brewing Co., founded by his grandfather, and of the Milwaukee Assn. of Commerce.

Miller had been a star tackle at Notre Dame under the famed coach in 1931. Miller captained the Irish in 1928. He graduated a year later from the South Bend, Ind. school, where his son, Fred Jr., was a student.

Miller probably was best known for his support of big league baseball for Milwaukee. He sparked the drive to bring the Braves here from Boston and has since been a director of the baseball club and one of its most ardent backers. He was also a stockholder in the Green Bay Packers and a director of that National Football League club.

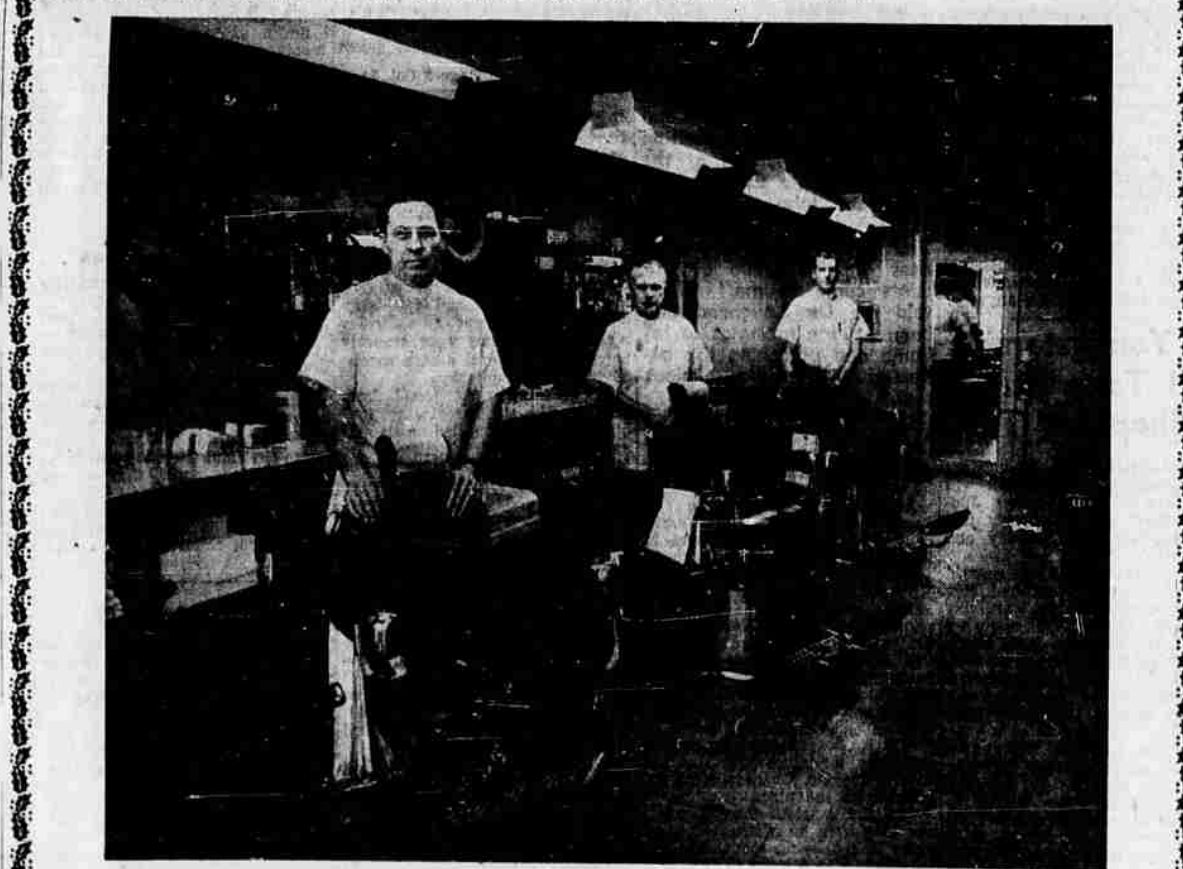
