logical forest development program," the district forester said. The 1955 plan was presented to and concurred with by the BLM Advisory Board, composed of local citizens.

The timber sale plan is the sixth of its kind to be issued in the district. It is published to assist timber purchasers in planning their operations and is useful to the district as a guide to offering timber in a "logical and orderly manner."

Each tract included in the plan will be listed in a timber sale notice issued several weeks in advance of the sales date. Each will be sent to purchasers on the BLM mailing list at the time of regular advertising.

Most sales will be conducted in the district on the first Wednesday of each month during the year.

Inquiries concerning the plan or individual sales will be answered by the bureau, located in the Marion Building, 132 S. Jackson St., Roseburg.

Airliner Crew Reports Plane Was Fired Upon

TOKYO (AP) — The crew of a Northwest Orient Airliner which arrived Wednesday night from Hong Kong reported seeing distant shellbursts after leaving Taipei, Formosa, Wednesday for Okinawa.

"It was nothing to get concerned about, it was so far away," said Walter Bullock of Lakeview, Minn., veteran pilot of the four-engine DC4. He said his plane was over water when he saw three shellbursts to the right, two about five miles away and one about a mile away after his plane carrying 23 passengers left Taipei.

Northwest headquarters in St. Paul, Minn., had been notified the Okinawa-bound plane was fired on and a Northwest official in Tokyo said it was by Chinese Nationalist guns.

After hearing Capt. Bullock's report, a Northwest official here said "it must have been either practice or some trigger happy Chinese. It was over Chinese Nationalist territory at the time."

Chief Olson said the men, knowing they had been out-maneuvered, returned to their car.

Another resident of the area said the police later came down the tree. When last seen it was once again walking in Mrs. Wells' backyard.

The body was brought to Roseburg. Funeral arrangements will be announced later by Long & Orr Mortuary.

growth of Roseburg and this section of Oregon should be sufficient to inspire the present inhabitants to earnest, urgent and conscientious efforts to prepare for this additional draft upon the city's facilities to fit the normal increase decade.

The natural resources existing in Douglas County for future development include forests, agricultural lands, and minerals with a decided necessity for the expansion of the transportation facilities. This is especially true of the mineral occurrences of the county consisting of nickel. It is factually reported that Douglas County has one refractory-nickel source of potential importance. This source is near Riddle. A large eastern concern has acquired the ore body and is engaged in making preparations for recovering several million pounds of nickel annually.

Need For Optimistic Hopes
Therefore, it should be fully realized that by greater effort, ambition, ideals and optimistic hopes, favorably situated as it is, the economic, industrial and supply center of this section of Oregon, Roseburg may be made to draw to itself a greater portion of the increase in population than its natural factors would bring to it. Community growth spells prosperity for it means more building, more capital in the community, new industries, better homes and a broader view of life.

Emerson said in effect: "If a man make a better mouse-trap than anyone else can make, though he live in a wilderness, the world will make a path to his door." If Roseburg's united efforts and moving spirits will show to the world that this community offers better things than are offered in many other comparable communities in the Pacific Northwest, the region will grow and prosper.

Eliminating the fulsome flattery, which so frequently has characterized the portrayal of a region's resources, a series of articles has been published in the Tuesday issues of the Roseburg News-Review, during the last few months. These articles have been written from the standpoint of showing the stability of the past, present and possible future economy of the city and county. 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Church Planning Safety Program For Youngsters

Working on the proposition that children need protection on city streets on Sundays as well as weekdays, the First Christian Church of Roseburg is instituting a safety program for its Sunday school youngsters.

A meeting is scheduled at 8:45 tonight at which time a church committee will meet with special patrolman Warren Graham to put the final touches on a patrol program.

Spokesman Glen Murdock, a church elder and member of the committee, said the public must be made aware of the need for safeguards on Sunday as well as any other day. He reported that the Roseburg Police Dept. is lending full support to the movement.

Patrolman Graham was appointed by Chief Stan Olson.

The program will be used during Bible School hours each Sunday at the church, on the corner of Kane and Washington streets.

A loading zone for parents stopping to pick up children will be set up on Kane Street, and full efforts will be made to provide organized movement across both streets.

Murdock criticized one practice in which parents are often at fault: When they double park across the street and children get into the car. The loading zone should eliminate the dangerous practice.

Jury Says Dr. Sheppard Guilty; Gets Life Term

nant. Sheppard told police, when daylight came, that a powerful built marauder committed the crime and knocked him out when he ran into the bedroom.

A detective, that same morning, told him, "I think you did it." It took nine weeks, thereafter, to try the case.

The state said Sheppard was involved with three women. One of them, Susan Hayes, came from California to testify as a prosecution witness. She is 24, slim, auburn-haired and attractive. She admitted intimate relations with the doctor. He denied them, at first, but also admitted later that what she said was true.

The prosecution asked two key questions during the trial:

1. If there was a maniacal killer standing by Marilyn Sheppard's bed when her husband ran into the bedroom, why didn't he strike down, and possibly murder, Sheppard as well?

2. Who arranged the downstairs rooms to give the appearance that a burglary had been committed, although nothing of value was missing? If Sheppard didn't do this, who did?

In reply, the defense repeatedly challenged the state's attorneys to show a motive. What reason, they asked, could Sheppard have had to murder his wife? Susan Hayes had testified that he told her he "loved his wife very dearly, but not as a wife."

ating table while her new-born son went the other way in his bassinets.

Shook a car off a grease rack. Topped a statue of St. Anthony and the Christ Child in a Roman Catholic church.

Flung Mrs. Fred Hess down the steps of her home at Scotia, breaking both her ankles.

Sprang a major leak in the city's water supply and left its pipeline closed with only a week's supply of water in local tanks.

Shook stores so violently in a six-block area in downtown Eureka that bottled and canned goods were spilled about in costly confusion.

Buildings were so weakened that the area was closed.

Topped a storage tank at Ferndale, narrowly missing an office full of workers.

Pacific Gas and Electric Co. reported last night it had restored electric service to all areas and gas service to all but two small areas after all electric service had been cut off and gas mains damaged in several places.

Twelve small fires started by short circuits were quickly extinguished. Nearly every building in town was damaged, but due to wooden construction the loss was much smaller than it would otherwise have been. The stone and brick City Hall and the Humboldt County Courthouse were so cracked that they were evacuated and closed.

The quake was the worst here in 25 years and was the second heaviest of a series of tremors which have shaken California and Nevada recently.
