State's Control Of Oregon Water Use Is Proposed

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Water Resources Committee has recommended that the next Legislature pass two bills designed to give the state strict control over Oregon's water supply.

Lyle F. Watts, who heads the committee which has studied the state's water problems for the past two years, said the group recommended: (1) establishment of a permanent Water Resources Board and (2) a state-wide ground water code.

Rep. Charles A. Tom of Rufus has announced he will introduce the two bills at the next session which opens Jan. 10.

The two recommendations will be discussed Jan. 5 at a meeting in Salem between members of the Legislature and members of the committee.

The Water Resources Board, to be made up of seven members appointed by the governor and approved by the Legislature, would replace the Willamette River Basin Commission and the Upper Columbia River Basin Commission.

It also would take over the duties of the State Irrigation Board and the Reclamation Commission.

The administrative duties of the irrigation board and reclamation commission would be transferred to the state engineer.

The proposed board would administer a state-wide plan for coordinated use of the state's water resources. This plan would be determined by the Legislature.

The ground water bill, aimed at replacing the present code which applies only to the area east of the Cascade Mountains, proposes, among other things, that the state supervise and control the use of all ground waters within its boundaries through a system of registered and adjudicated appropriation and permissive use restricted to beneficial purposes within the capacity of available resources.

order by its presiding officer, Andre Lefebvre.

Outside, many others, including thousands of Communist demonstrators hostile to West German rearmament, thronged against barricades waiting a turn to get inside.

Hundreds of police stood on guard at strategic points around the assembly building, the Bourbon Palace, to maintain order.

Shortly before the session opened, most of the political groups were holding last minute caucuses, and the odds appeared to favor the Premier by a slim margin.

The executive committee of the Independent Republicans, most of whom were hostile to the government last week, advised party members Monday to vote for the Premier. This, it said, should be done to support the Atlantic Alliance and not as a gesture for Mendes-France personally.

Children Gladden Father In U.S. After 7 Years

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Mike Katsanevas, 66, took his children shopping today—but he wasn't looking for after-Christmas bargains.

He wanted practical coats and trousers and dresses and shoes, all right. But at the same time, he was showing six of his children a new way to live, the way he has learned to live in America.

The children arrived Sunday from Greece—Mike's Christmas present from his coworkers at the Clearfield Naval Supply Depot, where he is a janitor.

This was the first time he had seen them in seven years, since he left Crete.

Three children came with Mike. He had to leave his wife and seven other sons and daughters behind. He got a job as a janitor at the naval supply depot north of here. He prayed and he saved—but he never could get together enough money to bring the rest of the family over.

Then Mike's fellow workers decided on his Christmas present. They raised \$2,500, and that was enough.

Illness Detains Wife
The family started, but in Athens Mrs. Katsanevas was detained for about a month because of a minor illness. The six children came on by plane. Another son, George, 21, will join the family when he finishes a hitch in the Greek army.

Mike couldn't say much when the airliner landed and his children ran out—he just laughed and cried. His friends standing behind the runway fence didn't say much either—they just grinned.

The thin little father tried to gather all six children into his arms at once. Then he and the other three—James, a U. S. airman first class now home on leave; a daughter, Kalope, 18; and Manuel, 16—posed for pictures with them. And between shots they turned and hugged Leonidas, 17, Irene, 14, Nicholas, 13, Arcelo, 11, Stylianos, 10, and Stavroula, 8.

As soon as he could, Mike got his children into friends' cars and took them out of the cold to his warm, brick home.

Today Mike starts a week vacation and has his nine children to share it with him.

Death Takes Tenmile Woman, 80, Saturday

Mrs. Hilda Christina Nicklason, 80, resident of Tenmile, died at her home early Saturday morning following a short illness.

She was born June 26, 1874, in Sweden and came to the United States in 1892. She lived in Minnesota until 1905. She moved to Fresno, Calif., to make her home until 1925, when she and her husband moved to Douglas County. She had been married to John A. Nicklason in Minnesota, Dec. 27, 1895. He preceded her in death in September 1946.

Surviving are seven children, Mrs. Gerda Johnson, Edwin and Carl Nicklason, all of Tenmile; Mrs. Ruth Lindberg and Mrs. Anna Bergquist, both of Oakland, Calif.; Mrs. Nora Johnson of Madras, Calif.; and Elder Nicklason of Fresno. She is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Emma Boline of Spokane, Wash.; 11 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

Her body has been removed to Long & Orr Mortuary, Roseburg, and will be forwarded Monday night to Fresno for services and interment there.

McCarthy Plans Drive Against Chinese Trade

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said Sunday the flow of goods from the free world to Communist China is steadily increasing and that he plans to intensify his campaign against it.

McCarthy said in an interview he plans to do "a lot of public speaking after the first of the year" to emphasize his contention that Red China should be blockaded—"not a naval blockade by U. S. warships," he added, "but a blockade brought about by cutting off aid to nations which do trade with the Reds."

Your Income Tax Form To Reach You In Few Days

WASHINGTON (AP)—Right on the heels of Santa Claus this year will come a less welcome visitor—millions of American homes—a mailman with your 1954 income tax form.

The Internal Revenue Service is mailing out some 63 million forms before New Year's Day. Many will be delivered in time to give the recipient a headache even before the morning of Jan. 1.

One possible bright spot: An extra month to pay. Under the new law, the deadline for final returns is April 15.

Likewise, if you're one of those people required to file advance estimates of your income, and to pay the tax in quarterly installments, the deadline for your first estimate and payment is moved from March 15 to April 15. The dates for the remaining installments are unchanged, however—June 15, Sept. 15 and Jan. 15.

Whom It Concerns

You now fall into this category if:

1. Your total income is \$5,000 or more if you are single, \$10,000 or more if married couples or heads of families.

2. Your income includes more than \$100 which is not subject to withholding. In that case you're supposed to file estimates if you expect your total income to be more than \$400, plus \$600 for each exemption.

What about those who should have filed estimates and made quarterly payments this year—but didn't do so? Will the T-men get after them?

Officials say no—such people can square accounts by filing a 1954 form and paying in full by Jan. 31. You can do the same thing if you paid your first three installments for 1954 but want two weeks of grace in making the payment normally due Jan. 15.

Farmers get a bit more time. They can wait until Feb. 15, instead of the previous Jan. 31, to file their final return on 1954 income.

at the price of surrendering territorial claims.

He called the recently signed mutual defense treaty under which the United States promises to defend Formosa and the nearby Pescadores as "a great menace to peace in the Far East and Asia."

Spies "Justly" Convicted
The Chinese Communist leader charged that the United States attempted "to cover up the aggressive substance of the 'Treaty' by creating 'a great clamor about the U. S. spies that had been justly convicted in China.'"

That was Chou's only reference to the 11 U. S. airmen imprisoned by the Reds on spy charges. He made no mention of U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's projected trip to Peking to seek the airmen's release.

Chou, in what appeared to be a sweeping review of recent worldwide diplomatic events, also told the conference his government feels "great regret" over recent actions by Great Britain.

He said relations between Britain and Red China improved during the Geneva conference. But he added that of late Britain "has been vigorously following the dangerous policy of the United States aggressive bloc on certain major issues." He mentioned Formosa as being one of these "issues."

Hunter Found Dead
The body of a Portland advertising artist, fatally wounded while hunting Sunday, was found early Monday in a rugged area south of Hood River.

The victim, Charles Eaton, 30, had been the object of a wide-spread search since late Sunday after a companion, Joseph Ferguson, reported him missing. They had become separated while hunting small game about six miles south of Mosier.

Wasco County Coroner Kenneth D. Libby said the fatal bullet was discharged from Eaton's .22 caliber rifle. He said the gun may have fired when it became caught on a tree limb as Eaton trudged through heavy brush. He ordered an investigation by the State Crime Laboratory and expected a report by late Monday.

Charge Of Non-Support Jails Two More Men

Two more men charged with non-support were lodged in the county jail at Roseburg Friday, Sheriff Cal Baird reports.

Horace Nelson Hamm, 37, Blachley, Ore., also faces a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, Baird said. The other man is Huey Chaires, 40, Reedsport. He was arrested by a deputy sheriff on a circuit court bench warrant.

Divorcee Blames U.S. For Eviction From England

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)—An American divorcee ordered out of Britain sought temporary haven here today and blamed American "pressure" for her plight. U. S. officials denied any part in the case.

The woman, 32-year-old Mrs. Jean Butler, flew here Sunday with her British fiancé, Clive Jenkins, a British trade union official. She plans to marry him here when her divorce becomes final in February, then return with him to England as a British citizen.

Mrs. Butler was divorced Dec. 22 from J. Jordan Butler, an American archaeologist living in Britain. She said previously "there is certainly no question of security involved, and there ever before has been any question about extending my permit to stay in Britain."

Friend Of Negroes
Mrs. Butler has said she did not want to return to the United States because of former trade union affiliations. She said that 10 years ago she had been an organizer with the CIO (Congress of Industrial Organizations), "and had Negroes and whites in the same union in the South."

"Also at my state university (Missouri) I ran a campaign to allow Negroes to be admitted to the university," she added.

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Terrific Winds Deal Damage In California

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Winds up to 70 miles an hour whipped Southern California Monday, toppling power lines and billboards and slowing traffic.

As the winds rose, humidity dropped and the Los Angeles Fire Department described the fire hazard as "really dangerous."

A \$2,500,000 blaze burned through the Fullerton citrus warehouse district.

The 70-mile-an-hour blasts were recorded at Ontario. The wind whistling west from the desert virtually stalled traffic on highways in the Beaumont-Banning area. Gales lashed Cajon Pass and upper canyons of the San Bernardino and San Gabriel Mountains.

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Eviction Of Tenants Leads To Bloody Riot

BOMBAY, India (AP)—Deaths in rioting at Valod, 160 miles north of Bombay, rose to eight Monday as another victim died from wounds received in the clash between police and a mob of 1,200. Another injured person was reported in a critical condition.
