BRIDLINGTON, England — A woman collapsed on the stage with an Indian arrow through her chest—and the crowd of 1,300 cheered and clapped. They thought it was part of the act.

The performance Monday night featured "Big Chief Beaver," a North American Indian, and his London-born wife, 22-year-old Marie.

The Indian threw knives and axes and shot arrow at his wife. For protection Marie had a small wooden shield she could shift across her body when a shot appeared to be coming too close.

Beaver shot steel-tipped arrows from about 20 yards. By a thousandth of a second, an arrow went through a hole in the shield made by a previous missile and penetrated the woman's chest, just missing her lung.

A doctor ordered Marie to withdraw from the show. But she went on as usual in a later performance Monday night and was ready to do it all again Tuesday.

Mystery Planes Buzz Near Korea, Touch Off Alert

TOKYO — U.S. fighters "intercepted" three mystery planes over Allied territory near the northwest Korean front Tuesday night but the intruders turned back before there was any shooting, a Far East Air Forces spokesman said.

Detection of the three propeller-driven planes on Allied radar screens touched off a 52-minute alert in Seoul.

The Air Force spokesman said the three planes were unidentified but added: "It's a cinch they weren't ours."

He said U. S. jets as well as propeller-driven fighters in undisclosed number rose to meet them, and "intercepted" or "made contact" in the air "but there was no combat."

The intruders turned and went back north, the spokesman said. The interception was located simply as north of Seoul.

Details were lacking on how far south into Allied territory the three detected planes reached, or whether they were fighters or bombers.

In Seoul the alert lasted 52 minutes.

The child died at a local hospital on Dec. 25. He was born Dec. 21.

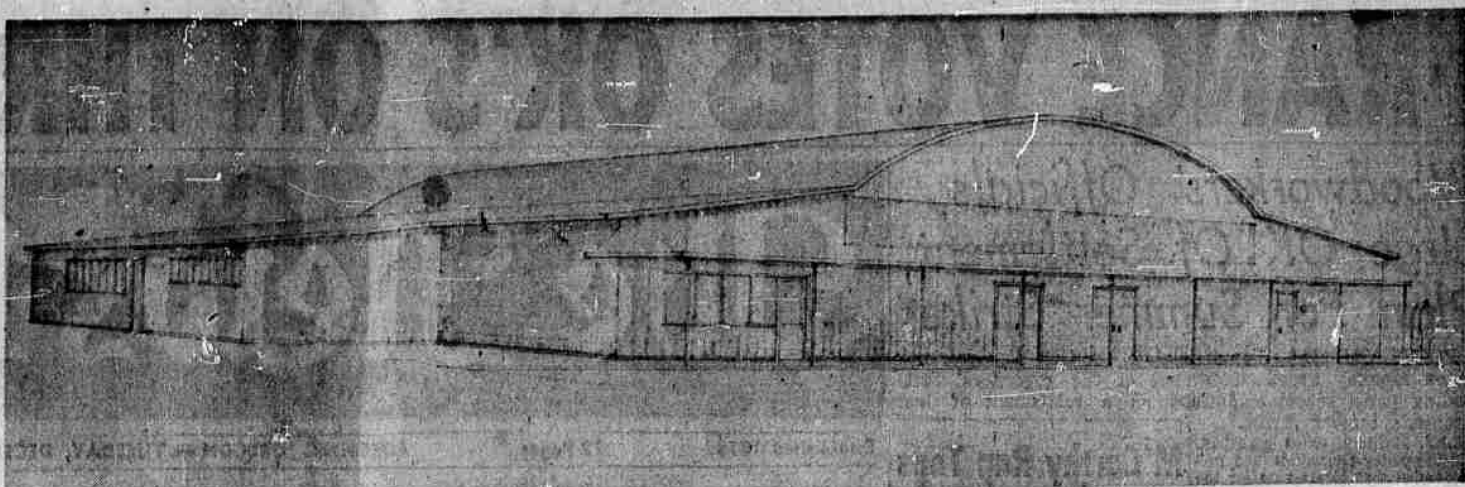

Community Building At Fairgrounds Sought

Plans for financing construction of a proposed community building at the county fairgrounds are being explained this week by persons bearing petitions to the Douglas County Court for funds.

Jim Myers, chairman of the county fair board, set estimated cost of the structure at \$75,000. That amount, according to the petitions, would be drawn from the county general fund, eventually to be replaced there through rentals and other receipts from the building.

Hostesses Used To Hike Business For Bus Lines

CINCINNATI — The lowly motor bus, the plebeian of commuter transportation, is using air line hostesses today to lure bankers, brokers and lawyers aboard.

The Cincinnati Transit Co. started the new curbside service Monday from the fashionable Mt. Lookout neighborhood to the heart of the city.

Under the company's "club plan," the commuter is picked up at the curb outside his home and taken directly to his office building. With no stops outside the Mt. Lookout area, the seven-mile ride takes about 25 minutes.

Many of the prospective riders have two cars in their garages. But the traffic congestion which plagues the nation's large cities makes driving to work a chore.

This week the club plan is on the house. But three hostesses on the buses today to sell the idea.

It will cost \$10 a month to get a guaranteed seat and then 10 cents for each ride to or from town.

The three buses, scheduled to arrive downtown at 8, 8:30 and 9 a.m., carried a total of 88 passengers Monday. If 50 or 60 sign up, the route will be profitable, a company official said.

"We see this as an opportunity to get persons out of automobiles and into buses," said John Paul Jones, "admiral" of the transit company's promotion department. Jones said the company is "not shooting at the regular bus rider."

Highway Delays In Oregon Listed

SALEM — The Oregon Highway Commission's weekly maintenance report listed the following construction projects:

Pacific Highway — For 4 miles north of Myrtle Creek, possible minor delay.

Coast Highway — Between 3 and 5 miles north of Gardiner, 5 miles of gravel surface; between 2 and 15 miles south of Port Orford, possible minor delay; Depoe Bay to White Cove, gravel surface.

Umpqua Highway — For 1.36 miles east of Reedsport, minor delays.

The following routes are closed for the winter by snow:

McKenzie Highway; Mt. Hood Loop from Warm Springs Junction to Cooper Spur; all roads in Crater Lake Park except the highway from Annie Springs to the lodge; East and West Diamond Lake highways.

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Features of the building:

1. Seating capacity, 2,500 persons.
2. Area, 120 x 175 feet, with main floor area of 120 x 155.
3. Banquet room for 700 persons.

Backers, mainly from Farm Bureau Federation and 4-H groups, claim wide adaptability for the building. They say it might be dancing and similar activities. A possibility of having Saturday night wrestling is in the air. It

also would be used for county fair exhibits and agricultural and extension meetings.

Dick Turley, fairgrounds manager and one of the supporters of the project, commented that the fairgrounds site provides easy parking and access. The building, which would be dedicated for use by all citizens in the county, also is centrally located in the Umpqua Basin, he pointed out.

Turley said about 40 civic and fraternal organizations have pledged support. The groups range from downtown fraternal clubs to farm organizations, he said.

Initial plans for the project were discussed earlier this year in a mass meeting at the fairgrounds, and it was at that time that cooperation by the various groups was pledged.

Reason for the petitions, Myers and Turley explained, is that the

county court has asked for a show of hands from among citizens in favor. The project had been mentioned before the county administrators before. But Turley commented that persons went "one at a time" to the county court, with their plea.

The court, he related, asked for a show of force before any action was taken.

Turley said he hopes to get in the neighborhood of 10,000 names. Several hundred petitions have been prepared.

Foundation of the building already has been laid. A concrete slab used in August for square dancing at the county fair is the base from which it's hoped the building will rise.

Plans also have been drawn for the building by a Eugene firm, Aluminum Builders Supply. The building would contain one main

room with sliding partitions. Heat would be from an oil furnace. The building, said Turley, has been designed for superior acoustics and lighting.

It would include a stage, kitchen and lighting.

Turley said the building could be made self-sustaining through rental fees.

The council accepted a committee and board of appeals report that the building at that location is beyond repair and should be condemned. Further action on the matter will hold up consideration of the business application.

City Finances Sound
2. Mayor Percy Croft read parts of an auditor's report on city finances in which it was noted the city's books are in excellent condition. It was recommended that money in some old funds be shifted to the general fund.

3. Applications from Roseburg Cab Co. for renewal of cab licenses, use of taxi stands and for a new rate schedule were set aside for further study. License for operation is continued on a temporary basis.

4. The council approved a recommendation from the board of appeals and committee which, in effect, denies a request from Cece Sherwood, 1140 Hamilton St., for building a carport in violation of the setback rule in the building code.

5. The council decided more study is needed in the case of a building at Sanford and Kane streets which the board and committee recommended be condemned. If the house, which has been unoccupied for more than a year, can be brought up to code specifications, permission may be granted for repair.

6. Approval was given for renewal of three commercial liquor licenses in the city — for the Club, Roseburg Cafe and Idle Hour.

Final Payments Made
7. The council approved final payment on two projects, upon recommendation of City Engineer John Loosley. They are \$1,583.73 to P. S. Lord & Co. on construction of Harvard Avenue storm sewers, a project totaling about \$18,000, and \$1,618.26 to Henry Miller on Terrace Avenue paving project, which totals about \$15,000.

8. A request from Councilman Frank Ashley that Court Street near the courthouse be made a one way thoroughfare was referred to the city planning commission.

9. The council received a letter of commendation from the Roseburg Ministerial Assn. for closing down pinball machines in the city.

Next Meeting Jan. 3
The next meeting of the council will be held Monday, Jan. 3, at 7:30 p.m., in the council chambers of the City Hall. At that time new councilmen and Mayor-elect Ernest Barker Jr. will take office and Mayor Croft and Councilmen Ashley, Cecil Hugh and Bernard Saxx will retire.
