Unemployment Drops In Oregon During December

Unemployment throughout Oregon for the month of December was down some 25 per cent over the corresponding month in 1953. The 30,000 claimants still outnumbered the figures for 1950-52 (December).

A roundup on employment figures in the state from the State Unemployment Compensation Commission in Salem indicated the lumber, logging and wood products industries accounted for most of the gain.

Western Oregon timber areas showed the least number of layoffs. Roseburg and other sections in the Douglas fir belt were among areas so cited.

Employment lines nearly comparable to those of 1953 were reported in Portland, Hillsboro, Salem, etc. Payments during the first half of December indicated a total of just over \$2,000,000 for the month. It was well under the record \$2,884,707 recorded a year ago.

It was the first time in 39 months when the total was below the corresponding period a year before. In Roseburg 633 benefit payments were reported issued for one week this month. Of this number 420 went to loggers and lumbermen, 86 to tradespeople and 74 to construction workers. The remaining payments went to workers listing a variety of professions.

Working hours for loggers and sawmill employees averaged about 37.1 hours a week. Average weekly earnings were \$87.82. The amount was \$4 less than October. Hourly pay remained around \$2.37, the commission reported, or nine cents higher than a year ago.

Aged Man Beaten By Friend Who Charges Theft

OTTAWA (AP)—Police are holding a 265-pound Ottawa man they accuse of repeatedly torturing and beating his 86-year-old roommate and long-time friend because he thought the old man had stolen \$800 from him.

Alex Keninski, 65, was arrested last night and charged with inflicting grievous bodily harm.

The victim, Ukrainian-born Iwan Onowichuk, was hospitalized and reported in a serious condition. He continued to deny that he had lifted the money from Keninski's pants pocket on the night of Dec. 12 while Keninski, his friend for 20 years, was sleeping.

Police said Onowichuk, from his hospital bed, told them through an interpreter that Keninski:

After discovering his loss on Dec. 13 beat him up despite the older man's denials he knew nothing of the theft.

"Ripped the house apart" in a vain search for the money; Forced a red hot iron between Onowichuk's lips Dec. 17.

"Yanked out two of his teeth with pliers Dec. 18;

Pierced his ear lobes repeatedly with wires Dec. 19, then twisted them Dec. 19;

And when he still denied the theft, beat him up again and jumped up and down on his body.

Following up on anonymous telephone call, two police officers discovered the old man Monday in a "pitiful condition" in the bedroom of the two men shared in Keninski's home.

Keninski was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, assault with intent to commit a crime, and assault.

The indictments listed five "John Does"—persons not identified by name but cited by the grand jury as involved in the case.
