Canadians Spurn Hard Liquor, Going For Beer

OTTAWA, Dec. 29 — Canadians are drinking more beer individually and collectively. The greatest tipplers in the country are in the Yukon.
These facts are brought out in a publication by the Dominion Brewers Assn., which reports a swing from hard liquor to beer and an increased preference for drinking at home.
Per capita consumption of beer in 1953 climbed to 13.8 gallons, compared with 5.8 in 1939. In the Yukon, the average consumption last year was 19.38 gallons.
United States consumption was 13.9 gallons.

Cigarette Use Decline Blamed On Health Scare

NEW YORK, Dec. 29 — Americans puffed 4.6 per cent fewer cigarettes this year, a leading industry expert said Tuesday. He attributed the decline to "the health scare associated with cigarette smoking."
Harry M. Wooden, consultant to the tobacco industry, said Americans will have smoked an estimated 369 billion cigarettes in the 12 months ending at midnight Dec. 31. That's 4.6 per cent less than in 1953 and a drop of 25 billion smokes, or 6.4 per cent, from the record 394 billion cigarettes consumed in 1952.
Without directly mentioning medical reports linking cigarettes with lung cancer, Wooden said, "increased public awareness of the health factor" showed up in sharply higher sales of filter-tip cigarettes and a decline in total cigarette consumption.

Candidates Tied; Lots Draw To Decide Victor

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 29 — Lots will be drawn tomorrow to determine the winner in an election in which nearly 20,000 ballots were cast.
Judge Louis E. Levinthal issued this ruling Monday in the contest for the representative's seat in Pennsylvania's General Assembly from the Second Philadelphia District.
Earlier Levinthal had ruled illegal an absentee ballot cast for incumbent Alfonso Parlante, a Democrat. With the voiding of the ballot, the totals for Parlante and Republican Abraham N. Sigman stood at 9,823 each.

Adlai's Picture On Letters O.K., P. O. Dept. Rules

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 — The Post-office Department said Tuesday there is no postal regulation which would bar the pasting of Adlai Stevenson sayings on packages and letters sent through the mails.
The department said that Norman R. Abrams, assistant postmaster general for operations, had so advised Leland Merrick, New York radio and television consultant, in response to an inquiry. Merrick was formerly executive director of "The National Executive for Stevenson," Democratic presidential nominee in 1952.

The question arose in connection with the circulation of stickers measuring about 2 1/2 by 1 1/2 inches, bearing quotes from Stevenson speeches and public statements—followed by his name—intended to be applied to mailed material.

The department said that a Washington attorney offered a package bearing such a sticker here last October, and was advised by a clerk that it was not acceptable because the sticker appeared to be advertising matter.

Merrick then wrote department officials for an opinion.
Abrams replied on Nov. 4, the department said, that there is no postal regulation preventing the mailing of postal items with such stickers so long as the stickers do not obscure the address and return address.

The Stevenson stickers were reported to include expressions by the former Illinois governor on about 20 diverse subjects on the home and world fronts.
