

Adult Education Classes Started For Winter Term

The adult education program in Roseburg opens new doors to prospective students during the coming winter term. Four new classes are being offered, according to AE director Richard Boss.

Two are designed for homemakers. Tailoring clothes in the home is offered, Boss said, to help women cut down expenses. The class will be given Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. for \$7.50. Along the line of savings, the course in Household Finance should spruce up the family budget. Boss said he and instructor John Searle maintain people taking it will pay for the course in income tax savings. It is offered on Tuesdays from 7 to 9 p.m. at a cost of \$5.

A do-it-yourself course in leather and plastic craft makes up part of the curriculum offered in the arts and crafts department. Students will have an opportunity to make purses, belts, pen holders, bracelets, etc. The class meets Wednesdays from 7 to 9:30 p.m. The charge is \$7.50.

Under the trade extension division the AE program is offering a practical course in engine work for auto mechanics and journeymen. Boss said problems would be presented and solved in class. Specialists and consultants will be on hand to help. The course is offered Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 at a charge of \$8.25.

Enrollment in AE classes may be made before they start next week by calling 3-5152 or by visiting the adult education office in the social arts building of Roseburg High School. All classes will be offered for 10 weeks. Registration may be made at the first class next week, Boss added.

Reasons Stated For Dismissal Of Ladejinsky

DES MOINES (AP)—The Des Moines Register said Thursday that a former Army intelligence officer, who believes a long record of anti-Communist writings might be a front for a Red agent, made the official recommendation to Ladejinsky to "security risk."

John G. Cassidy, Department of Agriculture security chief, made the recommendation to Secretary of Agriculture Benson, the newspaper said in a story from its Washington correspondent, Clark Mollenhoff.

Benson recently refused to let Ladejinsky, a Russian-born land reform specialist, continue as an agricultural attaché in Japan.

The Register said Cassidy stated there was no evidence that Ladejinsky is disloyal or that he has violated security.

"We've just taken the position that with his background he might be a security risk," Cassidy was quoted as saying.

"I feel that we've made a right decision," he added.

The story said Cassidy believes that because a man has relatives in an Iron Curtain country that alone is enough to cause fear that the man may be coerced into giving up U.S. secrets.

Earthquake, Volcanic Activities Have Eased

MESSINA, Sicily (AP)—Inhabitants of the lonely Sicilian islands of Lipari and Stromboli and on the slopes of Mt. Etna breathed easier Thursday as minor volcanic and earthquake activities eased after 72 anxious hours.

On the bleak island of Stromboli lava continued to flow down the sides of the ancient volcano but it followed well-worn paths and caused neither damage nor danger. The volcano's activity was decreasing steadily.

The eruption, which began Wednesday, was the third this year. Fishermen took to their boats but most of the islanders remained calm.

Funeral services for Orle Alden Kennerly Sr., 75, former Roseburg chief of police, who died at his home on Fair Street Dec. 29, following a prolonged illness, will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary Friday, Dec. 31, 2 p.m. The Rev. Vernon L. Klemm, of the Assembly of God Church will officiate. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Kennerly, born at Meriden, Kas., June 19, 1879, was married there on June 16, 1904, to Ethel C. Fees. He was a special police officer at Klamath Falls from 1936 to 1944 at which time he came to Roseburg to serve as chief of police until 1948. He then served as a deputy sheriff for Douglas County until his retirement in 1950. Mr. and Mrs. Kennerly celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in June 1954.

He was a member of the Full Gospel Church of Klamath Falls, the Northwest Peace Officers Assn. and the International Foot-printers Assn.

making slight changes in the various hills and sending them back to the Assembly. This could bring final passage close to the mid-May date which Mendes-France has suggested for a Big Four meeting with Soviet Russia on the German issue.

Thursday in the Assembly the Communists made a last minute attempt to drag out the issue. The Assembly went almost immediately into the vote on the operative clause of the London-Paris accords when Assembly President Andre Le Troquer called the matter up shortly after 5 p.m. (8 a.m. PST).

There were no deputies listed to speak. When Le Troquer proposed proceeding to the vote at once Jacques Duclos, floor leader of the Communist bloc, said he wanted to speak.

Le Troquer cut him off by saying there had already been enough speaking.

Mendes-France said he did not want to prevent anyone from speaking. But Le Troquer said the regulation permitted an immediate vote without debate.

Orcutt Again Appointed Judge Pro Tempore Here

PORTLAND (AP)—Army Engineers have awarded Umpqua River Navigation Co., Redport, a \$71,380 contract for dredging the Florence and North Fork shoals in the Siuslaw River.

The project will provide a depth of 12 feet at mean low water in a 150-foot wide channel over a length of about 6,000 feet.

Republicans Not Responsible For Decline Of Parks

PORTLAND (AP)—The Republicans cannot be blamed for any deterioration of national parks, Secretary of Interior McKay said here Wednesday night as he continued long-range feuding with Democratic Sen-elect Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon.

"There hasn't been much deterioration in the two years the Republicans have been in power. The big deterioration came in 20 years of Democratic administrations," McKay told 300 persons at a Republican club meeting.

McKay's remarks were in answer to Neuberger's statement at a Chicago press conference that the parks "have been allowed to deteriorate shamefully under the Republicans."

This was a continuation of the critical remarks the two exchanged at long range in the recent campaign.

McKay said he believed the parks will get more money soon because of a planned national road improvement program.

"The road program stands to free other Interior Department money for parks improvement and maintenance," he said.

McKay said that after nearly two years in office he has learned generally to ignore political criticism. He said his wife was more sensitive, but he was trying to convert her to his approach.

"I tell her that when she goes to bed she should just say her prayers, tell everybody to go to hell, and then go to sleep, as I do," he said.

Control Of Mountain Fire Expected Tonight

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP)—Complete control of a mountain fire which in its early stages menaced two Cajon Pass communities is expected by Thursday night.

Supervisor Sim E. Jarvi of the San Bernardino National Forest said the 2,300-acre fire which started Monday is two-thirds controlled but still giving fire fighters trouble along about two miles in extremely rough terrain.

The hot spots are along ridges of Cable Canyon. The area is so precipitous that fire fighters have to gouge firebreaks by hand. It is too rugged for bulldozers. Helicopters were used for reconnaissance Wednesday.

Vagaries of the winds delayed full control. But Jarvi said neither the once-threatened settlements of Devore Heights and Verdemon nor any other habitations are in danger now.

Girl Missing Since 1952; \$3,000 Reward Holds

SUNDANCE, Wyo. (AP)—Former Wyoming Gov. Nels Smith said Wednesday he would be glad to renew a \$3,000 reward for word of his granddaughter, who disappeared 30 months ago, if she is found.

The girl, Connie Smith, would have been 12 years old Tuesday. A student at Camp Sloane, Conn., she vanished July 18, 1952, a day after she was hurt in a fall. Officers have theorized she may have been an amnesia victim.

Smith said he believes the girl is alive because no body has been found. His reward offer, posted in the course of a widespread search, expired last Jan. 1.

Amid reports that Puck got "fired" or "demoted" because Godfrey previously has frowned on romances within the cast, CBS President Frank Stanton issued a statement last night quoting Godfrey as follows:

"I did not fire Larry Puck. He is a very valuable member of our setup and I regret his inability to continue all the responsibilities he has exercised for the past six years.

"I'm sorry I did not know about his engagement to Marion Marlowe. To both of them, my blessings and best wishes."

Last night on his television show Godfrey and his friends—the program for which Puck has acted as coproducer—Godfrey made two references to the romance.

As he introduced Miss Marlowe for her first song, he took her by the hand, admired her 6 1/2-carat diamond engagement ring and said:

"I sure do wish you and Larry all the happiness in the world. You are two wonderful people."

Toward the end of the show, as Janette Davis sang "If I Give My Heart to You," Godfrey nodded toward Miss Marlowe and said, "You know who I'd like to dedicate that song to—that gal's hubby-to-be. I hope he's looking in."

Contempt Trials Slated To Open On January 19

PORTLAND (AP)—The trial of four men on contempt of Congress charges will open here Jan. 19. The charges stem from their refusal to answer questions at a House Un-American Activities Committee hearing here last June.

Federal Judge George Boldt of Tacoma set the trial date after overruling a defense motion to dismiss the charges Wednesday.

The four, who refused to answer questions beyond what their names were, are Donald Wolcott, John R. MacKenzie, Herbert Simpson, and Thomas G. Moore. Moore now lives in Los Angeles. The others are Portlanders.

They contended the Fifth Amendment protected them in this situation, and the defense argued Wednesday that their indictments should therefore be dismissed.

Judge Boldt refused, saying the "questions raised in the charges are as grave as any that our generation is faced with."

He mentioned the "imperative duty of Congress to fully explore the threat of Communism and to take appropriate action," but added, "On the other hand
