Oerding Leading Indian Scoring

Bill Oerding leads all team-mates in individual scoring among the Roseburg Indians, taking over the lead from Nub Beamer, who was held to 11 points in two games against Bend last week.

Oerding, a sophomore guard, pumped through 26 in the same two games for a season's total of 52. Beamer has 48.

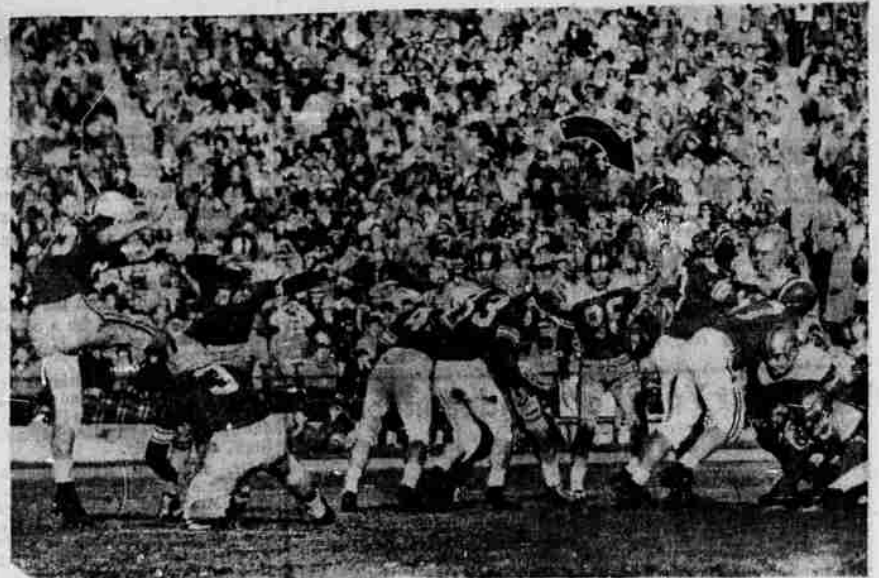
The other sophomore guard on the squad, Dick Roberts, has taken over third place on the team with 54 points. He scored 26 in the two Bend games and 41 in the past four games for his total.

The Indians now have scored 318 points in eight games for an average of 39.75 per game. Opponents have counted up 417 points for a 52.13 average.

The Indians have their first sub-district 3 test of the year Tuesday night when they travel to Myrtle Creek to combat the Umpqua Valley League Vikings, darkhorse contender for the circuit championship.

East Nudges West, 13-12 In Shrine Charity Test

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Quarterback Don Bailey of Penn State, who was expected to do little more than spell All-American Ralph Guglielmi but wound up as the game's most valuable player, credits Guglielmi with "teaching me more in 10 days than I've learned all my football life."

Bailey was a big factor in the East's 13-12 victory over the West in the New Year's Day Shrine charity football game at Kezar Stadium. He turned his team of all stars into a cohesive unit that played as if it had been a solid entry for three seasons.

The Penn State quarterback, who had never won an award before, received the William C. Hoffman Trophy as the game's most valuable player. He said he cried "for the first time since I was a kid" when it was announced he had won the trophy.

Score Ties Game

The 52,000 fans who paid a quarter of a million dollars to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children saw Bailey lead the East 60 yards to a second-period touchdown after the West had taken a 6-0 lead on California center Matt Hazeltine's runback of a pass interception in the first period.

Bailey went over for the TD on a quarterback sneak from one yard out.

The East's other touchdown came on a fourth-quarter pass from Guglielmi to Purdue end John Kerr, who snatched the ball on the five and snatched into the end zone.

Appropriately enough, it was another Penn State player—end Jim Garrity—who provided the one-point victory margin with his conversion after the East's second touchdown.

The East threatened once more, getting to the West 20. The West was never able to put on a sustained drive.

The first score was blocked by Hazeltine.

West Uses Breaks

The West, operating with the nation's No. 1 and No. 2 offensive leaders, California's Paul Larson and Oregon's George Shaw, parlayed two breaks into its 12 points.

Hazeltine, who was voted the game's top lineman, picked off a Guglielmi aerial and raced 44 yards to pay dirt to give the West a 6-0 lead.

In the third quarter the West went ahead 12-0 after SMU's Ray Berry blocked an East punt to give the West the ball on the East eight. From there fullback Duke Washington of Washington State circled right end for the touchdown.

Bucks Beat Troy In Wet Rose Tilt

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Ohioans heading home from this sun-drenched land Monday were still reeling from a 20-7 victory Saturday over Southern Cal in the water-logged Rose Bowl—eighth Big Ten conquest in nine years over the Coast entry—gave the Midwesterners their latest chest-thumping excuse.

The Buckeye backers also had the last laugh on Californians who brag about the Coast climate.

Among the Pasadena folk there was more moaning over the poor weather Saturday than over Southern Cal's loss. Rain fell on the Tournament of Roses parade in the morning, and all through the Rose Bowl game in the afternoon.

Weather Stops Fans

Only 89,000 of the 102,000 ticket holders showed up for the contest, and some 5,000 cars were hopelessly mired in the stadium parking lots. Hundreds, after driving to the bowl, stayed in their cars and listened to radio accounts of the game.

The muddy going made it a sloppy game in every way. Players were not identifiable a minute after getting on the field, and Southern Cal fumbled the slippery ball seven times, losing it three times. The Bucks scored after two of the recoveries.

Ohio showed definite superiority, piling up 22 first downs to 6 for the Trojans, the Coast team getting only one in the last half. The Bucks gained 295 yards rushing to 177 for Southern Cal, sophomore Jon Arnett getting 123 for the Coast club in 9 attempts, and All-America Hopalong Cassidy moving 92 in 21 tries to pace the victors.

Trojans Rated Low

Coach Woody Hayes of the Bucks didn't endear himself to the Coast fans with an after-game statement in which he rated Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota and Ohio State of the Big Ten ahead of Southern Cal. The Trojans finished second in the Coast Conference, losing only to UCLA in the league. The Trojans, in the bowl last year, were ineligible this time.

Woody also took exception to the Ohio State and Southern Cal bands using the soggy gridiron for maneuvers. He said they made a quagmire of the field.

A lot of the Coast writers, noting that Ohio State was named No. 1 and UCLA No. 2 in the Associated Press season-end rankings, had things to say about the game.

Buckeyes Best Team?

Dick Hyland of the Los Angeles Times, a former Rose Bowl hero, observed in print:

"The UCLA Bruins could take them both on the same afternoon."

"If the Buckeyes are the best collegiate football team in the country," then the United States Marine Corps is a bunch of sissies."

UCLA defeated the Trojans 34-0 Ohio did it 20-7 under far different conditions.

The California sun, just a day late for the big show, was out in full force Sunday.

Georgia Tech Drops Arkansas At Dallas

DALLAS, Texas (AP)—Georgia Tech took a considerable shoving around for two quarters while probing for a weakness in Arkansas' defense, but the Yellow Jackets finally found a loophole and promptly capitalized for a 14-6 Cotton Bowl triumph.

Analyzing the game, it found that ironically, the "weakness" was the result of Arkansas' well-planned defense against Tech's famed "belly series." The Southwest Conference champion Razorbacks, eager to keep Tech from moving on the outside from the "belly series," spread its line too much.

So, in the second half of Saturday's game, a covey of swift Tech backs cut through big holes in the Razorback line for two touchdowns and their sixth bowl victory in the past 10 years.

Arkansas dominated the first half after stopping Georgia Tech deep in Razorback territory. Tech tried a field goal, but failed. Arkansas took over on its 20 and drove 80 yards in 12 plays to score.

Tech wasted no time taking over after the halftime recess. A 58-yard drive ended with Paul Rotenberry slipping around right end for the first Tech touchdown. Mitchell kicked the first of two conversions and Tech went in front to stay.

Navy Swamps Miss In Sugar Tilt, 21-0

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Not many persons will believe it, especially those from Mississippi, but Navy's football team did make some mistakes in Saturday's Sugar Bowl game which the Midshipmen won handily from the Rebels, 21-0.

Eddie Erdelatz, coach of the Sailors, took a glance at a series of pictures taken by a 70 mm Associated Press sequence camera and groaned, "We missed an assignment there."

The play, despite the error, was good for nine yards with quarterback George Welsh handing the ball to fullback Joe Gattuso while Gene DuBuisson, Mississippi center, was pulling him to the ground. The camera, perched atop Tulane Stadium, equipped with a 20-inch lens, was taking eight pictures a second.

"This is one of our most simple plays and somebody should have blocked that DuBuisson out of there before he had a chance to lay a hand on Welsh," said the coach.

Gattuso, voted the game's most outstanding player, also viewed the pictures and decided "I didn't take enough advantage of my blockers or I could have gone further." Erdelatz didn't agree.

Gattuso, a 175-pounder who stretches only 5'10", carried the ball 16 times and gained 111 yards. He never was thrown for a loss. His deadly blocking freed John Weaver on several of the half-back's spectacular runs. His three punts averaged 36 yards each.

Erdelatz said that "desire" brought Navy its first major bowl victory. The Midshipmen tied in the Rose Bowl 31 years ago, their only previous post-season endeavor.

Firmco, Glide Townies Set Wednesday Game

After a holiday layoff, the Glide Town Team and Firmco of Myrtle Creek resume basketball with a feature game set at Glide's gym Wednesday evening.

Both teams are undefeated with the home club having won its only start, 59-50 over Fairhaven Monday night.

Dyson has between 25 and 30 boys working out regularly, and he has two deep in the lighter weights. However, most of the turnout consists of smaller boys, and only one entry is listed in each of the heavier classes. He has a couple of heavyweight, however.

Roseburg High School wrestlers kick off an ambitious six-game home schedule Wednesday night, rematching with Sutherlin in the old gymnasium at the high school.

The slate also includes eight tests away from home. One meet already has been held, that with Sutherlin.

Coach Bob Shewbert is rounding a seven-letterman squad into shape for one of the roughest schedules ever faced by the Indians. Besides the lettermen, 10 other athletes are up from last year's junior varsity, and four new men are vying for varsity roles this year.

Ducks, Cougars To Kick Off ND Slate

Washington State and Oregon break from the barrier Monday night, and by the end of the week the Northern Division basketball season gets in full swing with defending champion Oregon State, Idaho and Washington all in action.

The opening game at Pullman in the northern half of the Pacific Coast Conference will bring together a couple of underdogs in the WSC Cougars and Oregon Ducks. Neither was particularly impressive in pre-season play.

Washington State will be led by all-division forward Ron Bennink, veterans Al Perry and Bob Klock at guard and Bill Rehder at center. Oregon lost heavily at graduation last June, and coach Bill Borchers has been working hard training replacements for Ken Wegner, Barney Holland, Ed Halberg and Bob Hawes.

Cougars Host Ducks

The Cougars entertain the Ducks in the two-game opening series Monday night and Tuesday.

Friday night the OSC Beavers, bolstered by the return of 7-foot-3 Swede Halbrook, begin the defense of their crown with a pair against WSC at Corvallis.

In Seattle, the improved Washington Huskies take their plunge into the 16-game season with Friday and Saturday night games against the short but speedy Idaho Vandals.

Oregon State, under the tutelage of wily Slat Gill, is favored to repeat as division titlist. The Beavers are blessed with plenty of height in such performers as Halbrook, the division's leading scorer last season, and Phil Shadoin, who stretches up to an even 7 feet. Behind them is "money player" Tony Vlastelica, a 6-5 senior from Aberdeen who saved several games last season with key baskets.

Swede To Work Out

Halbrook is likely to see only limited action against WSC. He has just regained his scholastic eligibility and can begin working out with the Beavers on Wednesday.

Washington, which is expected to take the lead if OSC falters, is pinning its hopes on a team with balance and seasoning which is led by 6-8 Dean Parsons of Eugene, Ore. Parsons was the Huskies' top scorer last campaign and is a demon rebounder. He will be spelled by 7-foot Gary Nelson, a sophomore who just got back in scholastic good graces.

Tippy Dye's Huskies are expected to get by Idaho without trouble next weekend. They whipped the Vandals by 20 points in last week's pre-season Northern Division tournament. The two-game series will mark Idaho coach Harlan Hodges' debut in the conference. He took over the reins at Moscow after making a name for himself at Murray State College.
