Like we said last week, we'll give you a few more details on what to expect at the state tournament at Coos Bay starting the 15th of this month and running through February. This will prove especially interesting to several dozen local bowlers who will be playing in their first state tournament, as well as to a lot of us old-timers who have forgotten just how good we must be to get "in the money."

The state pays off one for four teams, one for five doubles, one for six singles and one for 10 all-events. Last year Class A doubles (and state champs) topped 1216 pins, with each man doing his full share. Bill Goetter and Al Vermeire each knocked over 608 sticks. Low to pay in Class A doubles was 1102.

Class B doubles saw 1185 as high, and only 1068 low to pay. In Class C high team was 1136 and low a slim 1024, while in Class D, 1046 took top money of \$80, and 947 took low of \$9.20.

"A" Singles: Bill Koller of Bend led off with 659 and \$70, with Bob Fuller of Eugene settling for a fin on a \$578 effort. In "B" singles Bill Malmros from Portland collected \$90 with 620, and Pendleton's Jack Schaeffer brought up the rear with a 555, good for five bucks. "C" singles started off with Gib Ripper of Coos Bay felling 591 and taking home \$95, while John Stucklin, a Salemite settled for \$5.18 on a 531. In "D" a 605 by Willis Shearer of Forest Grove was good for \$50, and it still took \$519 by John Walker of Eugene to stay in the money.

ALL-EVENTS is the place we all love to grab, as it really shows ability over the long course. A all-events called for 1812 to knock off the trophy, while low to pay was a skimpy 1682. (Skimpy that is, for the "A" class.) In "B", 1721 and 1614 were the magic figures, with Poseyville's own Ken Buskey copping two bucks for the 1614 accomplishment. Class C settled for 1728 and 1546, while in "D" 1572 and 1485 were the extremes. Again, Roseburg copped the low in the pay-off, as Joe Quant flattened 1485 maples.

Roseburg is entering 22 teams, and we believe all are scheduled. However, a number of teams from other towns had to be turned away due to the heavy entry list. Sure

proves that it pays to get your entry in early.

The following teams will participate from Roseburg. Harris Plumbing was first to send in its entry. Other teams, Roseburg Jewellers, Harmony House, Coen Supply Co., Jovin Brake Supply, Winston Mobile, Roseburg Book Store, Hardtoppers, Firmen of Myrtle Creek, Roseburg Alloys, Yoncalla Lions, Douglas County Realty, Moose Lodge, Sun Studs, Inc., Modern Furniture, American Linen Supply, Tenmile Store, Howard's Hardware (Winston), Myrtle Creek Shell Oil, The Forrester, Wiley's Lefties and M & H Market of Sutherlin. And we defy any other town in our class to duplicate an entry list like that.

LAST YEAR, with a total of 304 teams entered, Roseburg brought home over \$800. We're gonna do even better this year, with probably around 275 teams rolling.

The other day a couple ladies strolled in to the local pin emporium, and Mr. Coe, not being too busy, walked up and asked if they wanted to learn to bowl. "Oh no," one of the girls says, "It's just Gladys that wants to learn today. I learned yesterday." (And we been trying to learn for 20 years! Just trying!)

Well, this week sees us starting on the grind again, with the Town League leading off tonight, and the girls tomorrow night. Wednesday the Metro will start, and Thursday the Merchants. Three weeks of play remaining in the first half. Due to a late start last fall, there will be no break between halves, but "pay-off night," will be the first night of the second half. The only break until the end of the season, around May 20, will be the annual city tournament, to be held during the third week in March. Averages and Handicaps will carry straight through, instead of starting over for the second half as in past seasons. So get out the shoes, and polish up the old apple and "Let's go!"

PREFERS HOT GAME

DETROIT — Gordie Howe, top scorer in the National Hockey League for four consecutive seasons, started his ice career as a goalie.

He was only nine years old at the time and was playing with a school team on an outdoor rink. "I was the biggest kid in the class," says Howe, "so they made me goalie. But a goalie doesn't have a chance to move around much and it gets pretty cold in Saskatoon, sometimes 50 degrees below zero. That's when I decided that goalie was not job for me. DENVER — Bob Clackman, who coached Denver University to the Skyline Conference football championship last fall, is reported under consideration for head coach of both the professional Los Angeles Rams and a "major college."

The Rocky Mountain News said Monday Clackman, 36, is second on the list of possible candidates to succeed Hampton Pool, who resigned recently as coach of the Rams.
Blackman would not say whether he has been approached by the Rams.

He said he expects to talk with representatives of the "major college" at a coaches' meeting in New York this week.
