

10 Best Dressed Women Named

NEW YORK (AP) — The annual list of "10 best dressed women" has been announced by the couture group of the New York Dress Institute.

For 1954, however, the list includes 13 names because of the votes in three cases.

Newcomers among the names are Queen Frederica of Greece and screen actress Grace Kelly. Both tied for 10th place.

First place in the vote of some 1,500 fashion designers, society writers and socialites went to Mrs. William Paley, wife of the head of the Columbia Broad-

casting System. Others, in order, are:

Business In 1954 Generally Good, Survey Indicates

NEW YORK (AP) — How were things in 1954? Fine for some, not so good for others. Here are the highlights:

Output of goods and services totaled 356 billion dollars, second only to the 1953 peak of 364 billion. Personal income about matched 1953's record of 285 billion.

Americans kept on saving at the rate of 19 1/2 billion a year.

Life insurance companies sold 47 1/2 billion in new insurance, up 21 per cent from the year before.

Electric power output climbed 6 1/2 per cent to 471 billion kilowatt-hours.

Sales of utility gas surged to 80 1/2 billion therms, up 7 1/2 per cent.

The chemical industry completed another billion dollars of plant and ran up sales of nearly 20 billion.

Housing starts totaled 1,200,000, up slightly from 1953.

Americans consumed an esti-

mated 64 billion dollars worth of food, about a billion dollars more than in the preceding year.

Construction hit a record at 37 billion dollars.

The telephone industry added 24

million phones to bring the number in use to 52 1/2 million.

Color TV set production was small but black and white sets in use mounted to around 33 1/2 million.

The value of retail merchandise sold came close to matching 1953's high of 171 billion dollars.

Commercial exports rose 500 million dollars to 12 1/2 billion.

Automotive industry output was off slightly at 5,385,000 cars and 1,015,000 trucks.

Steel production dropped by 25 million tons to 86 million, but was headed upward as the year closed.

Coal production was down 17 per cent from 1953 at 385 million tons.

SALEM (AP) — Oregon made a big reduction in 1954 in the number of traffic accidents and traffic injuries, but the number of traffic deaths was higher.

The State Traffic Division said there were 50,010 accidents in the first 11 months of this year, and that 11,660 persons were injured.

During the same period of 1953, there were 59,880 accidents and 13,505 injuries.

The number of traffic deaths increased from 354 to 365 in the 11 months.

Testing of the world's first nuclear engine submersible, which was launched in January, originally was scheduled for last October but an error in installation of steam piping scrapped that plan.

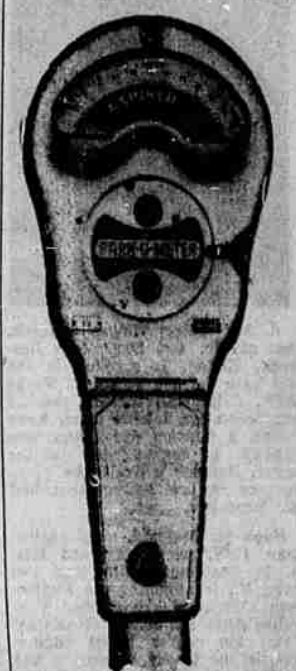
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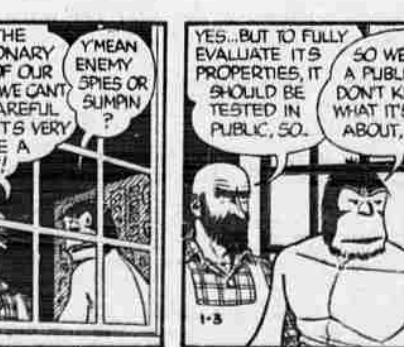
