Petersen Receives Seven-Year Term In Penitentiary

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP)—Joseph S. Petersen Jr., Tuesday received a seven-year prison sentence for storing secret government documents in his apartment.

U. S. District Judge Albert V. Bryan imposed the sentence on the one-time trusted employe of the super-secret National Security Agency. Petersen had pleaded guilty to the charge, one of three counts in an indictment against him.

Bryan said Petersen had "deliberately violated both the trust and the confidence" the government had placed in him.

The government dropped the remaining two charges against Petersen.

Petersen's wife of 18 months wept softly as Judge Bryan imposed sentence.

Petersen, 40, was taken into custody immediately to begin serving his sentence. He will be taken to a penitentiary later. He had been free under bond since his arrest in October.

Judge Bryan remarked that the documents Petersen mishandled were "gravely important" and that the information in them could have—in fact may have—very serious consequences to the security of the United States.

The count of the indictment to which Petersen admitted his guilt specifically charged that Petersen stored in his Arlington apartment notes from two documents rated top secret, and two other documents bearing lower security classifications.
